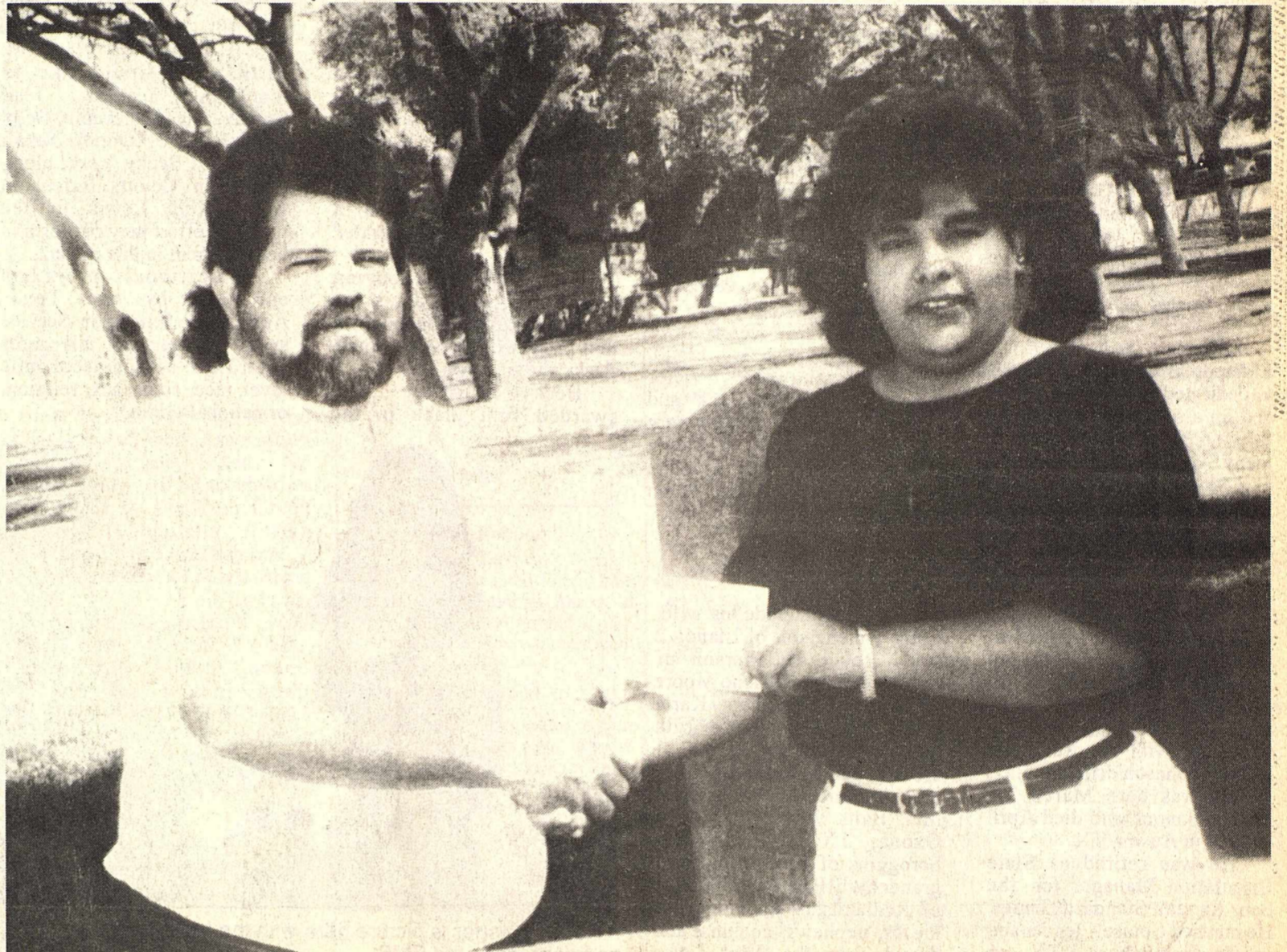
High School Rodeo

In March, 1994, St. John's Episcopal Church, Sonora, Texas, through its Mission Endowment Fund, awarded grants to various organizations throughout The Episcopal Diocese of West Texas and other locations. The grants totaled \$99,000. Of local interest, recipients included the Sonora Ministerial Alliance, The Sutton County Child Protective Board, E.L.K.S. (the after-school program for

latch key children in Sonora), the Concho Valley Home for Girls and The West Texas Boys Ranch. Some of the other recipients included Heifer Project International, The Presiding Bishop's Fund for the Relief of Hunger, Mi Refugio School in Guatemala, Nuestras Pequeñas Rosas Orphanage in Honduras and numerous programs run by churches for feeding the hungry. St. John's Mission

Endowment Fund was established and funded by Joseph & Mabel Vanderstucken with the express goal of feeding hungry children. The fund accepts grant requests in December and tries to make the awards in January, although the process was somewhat delayed this year. Anyone who operates a program with an emphasis on feeding the hungry is invited to apply in December of this

year. Also, anyone wishing to contribute to the fund may rest assured that all monies received go into the corpus of the fund and only income from invested money is awarded, assuring that the fund will continue to meet its goals for the foreseeable future. Accident Kills Two From Fort Worth Outside Sonora

Two members of a Fort Worth family were killed and five others were injured when a pickup rolled over on U.S. Highway 277 south of Sonora Monday afternoon.

Maria Isidra Maldonado, 74, was pronounced dead at the scene by Sutton County Justice of the Peace Adelita Smalling.

Maldonado, the matriarch of the family, was from Acuna. The remaining passengers, all from Fort Worth, were the wife, children and grandchild

of her son, Rolando Maldonado, 45, who was driving when the accident occurred, a spokesman for the Department of Public Safety said.

The driver's 20-year-old son, Jesus Rolando Maldonado, also died. He was pronounced dead at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital in Sonora.

Rolando Maldonado was in serious condition with broken bones and internal injuries at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital, the DPS reported. His wife, Rosalba Maldonado, 44, was transported to Shannon

Medical Center in San Angelo with head and internal injuries. She was listed in critical condition Monday evening, the DPS reported.

Their 10-year-old son, Mauro Maldonado, also was listed in critical condition at Shannon with head and internal injuries. His 18-year-old sister, Maria Isidra Maldonado, who was named for her grandmother, was listed in serious condition at Hudspeth Memorial Hospital with head injuries. Maria's 2-year-old daughter, Maria Gomez, was in

good condition with minor injuries at Hudspeth.

Rolando Maldonado was driving a 1984 half-ton Ford pickup north on Highway 277 when he lost control and struck a guardrail, causing the truck to overturn twice about 11.1 miles south of Sonora.

All of the occupants with the exception of Jesus Rolando Maldonado were ejected when the accident occurred at about 1:15 p.m., the DPS reported.

Trooper Donald Van Zandt of the THP office in Ozona, investigated.

Neria had lived in Eldorado all of her life. She was a dedicated wife and mother, and an asset to the community. She was an active volunteer for many organizations including Girl Scouts, Band-Aiders, Meals on Wheels and the VIP program in the Schleicher County School District for seven years (serving for four years as coordinator). She planted flowers with the Pride Committee, was instrumental in getting redistricting for single-member districts for the school board, and had taught in adult education classes. She was very active in her church, teaching CCD classes and Vacation Bible School, participating in the Altar Society and serving on the committee for the new CCD building. Upon her departure, Neria worked as a teacher's aide in Eldorado Elementary. She was very well liked by all the children and her colleagues. We will all miss her very much.

Neria wanted everyone to know she appreciated the visits, flowers, food for Felipe and the boys, and especially all your prayers. She requested that donations be given to the Eagle Excellence Academic Scholarship Awards.

Becky Whitaker was awarded first place in the

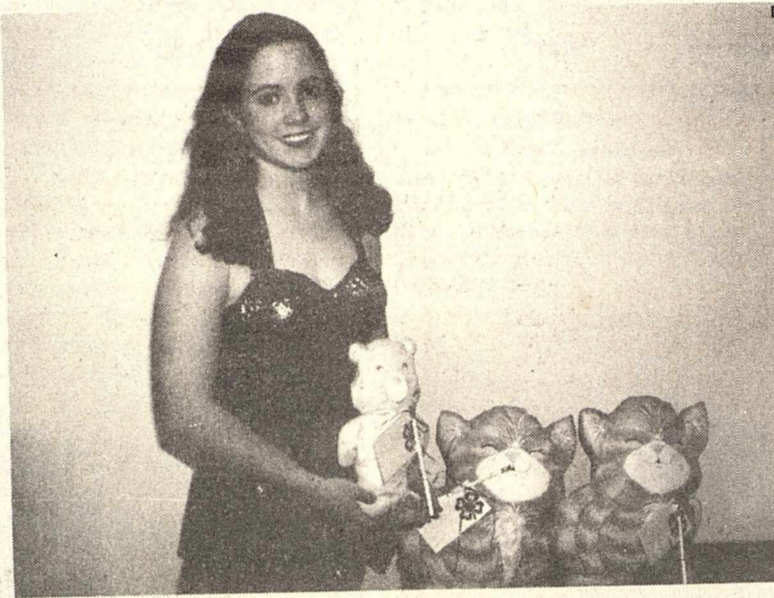
junior buying category dressy division with the black and white formal she purchased.

The Tom Green County Community Action Council Head Start Program is currently distributing applications for Head Start Scholarship Awards. The scholarship is available to any Alumni of the Head Start Program.

There will be six scholarships awarded to former Head Start program participants in the State of Texas by the Texas Head Start Association. Each scholarship award is \$700.00.

The Gerald Hastings scholarship award will be presented to a former Head

Start enrollee. A former Head Start enrollee is defined as any child that attended a Head Start Program in the State of Texas. To apply a student (1) Must be a former Head Start enrollee, (2) Must have a grade point average of 2.0 and above, (3) Must supply the needed documentation of these criteria and letters of recommendation from (a) the former Head Start Director of the program they attended, (b) their parent, (c) a community member, school counselor, etc.

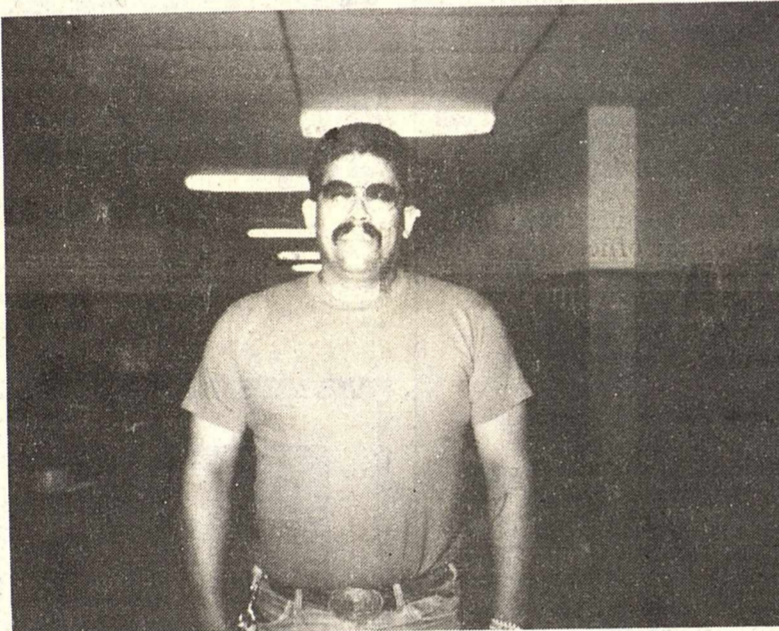

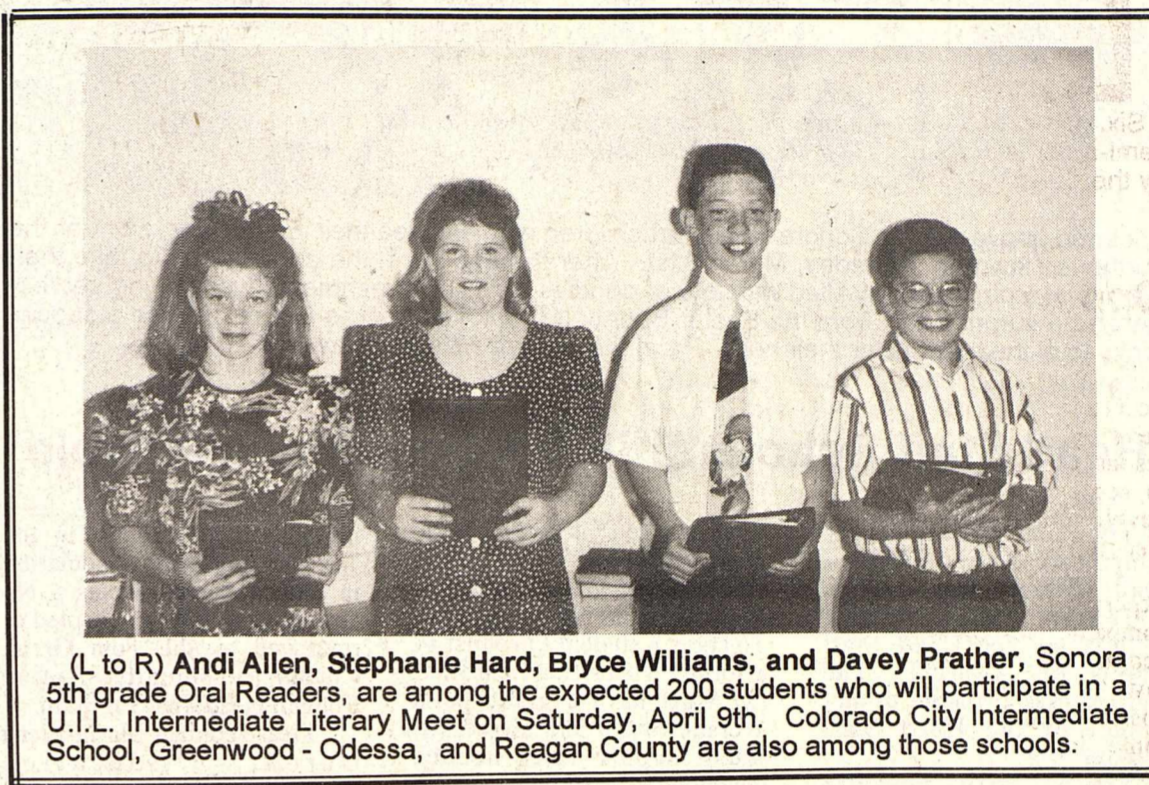

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Gunshots Fired

Wind Power Development Opportunities For Texas Landowners

• Portions of West Texas contain significant developable wind energy resource potential. The rush to secure resource rights by development companies and electric utilities has begun.

• The California experience shows that wind companies will naturally try to acquire the resource for as low a fee or royalty as possible. Such tactics lead to some landowners obtaining more lucrative contracts than others, sometimes to a significant degree.

• The landowner and his representatives will not understand the intricacies of the contracts, resulting in a high likelihood of contract disputes over time, at significant cost.

• Coming "up to speed" on the contractual nature of the relationship between resource owner and developer takes time and experience, even for experienced commercial attorneys. This is particularly true about non-monetary clauses delineating contract operating criteria and protections to the landowners.

• Such potential conflict translates into less revenue to the landowner from the resource than is reasonable,

and greater costs of monitoring a contract and resolving disputes.

• Errors made by California landowners should not be repeated in Texas.

• Texas resource owners, particularly ranchers and farmers should take advantage of the lessons learned by their counterparts in California. There is a window of opportunity for structuring deals reasonable to both parties, stimulating development to occur economically. Though there are similarities between wind power and oil & gas deals, there are significant differences. For example, assessing the resource takes a minimum of several years prior to development. Further, a wide spectrum of technical reliability spans the equipment horizon.

• Texas landowners should not enter into wind power deals proposed by either developers or utilities without a full understanding of the consequences of such long term relationships. With such understanding the vast potential of the Texas resource can be realized to the benefit of all involved.

Grazing Period Ends

The official grazing period on land designated as acreage conservation reserve and conservation use acreage for pay (including the 8% or 15% qualifying acreage) ended March 15, 1994.

ASCS official also reminds ranchers/farmers to be sure that cropland designated for acreage conservation reserve and conservation use for payment acreage meets the eligibility requirements.

Under the 1994 Wheat and Feed Grains Programs, designated cropland cannot be hayed or grazed during

the principal growing months. Farmers/Ranchers who do not adhere to grazing, haying or harvesting restrictions on this acreage will be out of compliance and could lose program benefits.

Sutton County ASCS office also announces payments for the 1993 Wool, Unshorn Lambs, and Mohair market year will be issued on April 13, 1994.

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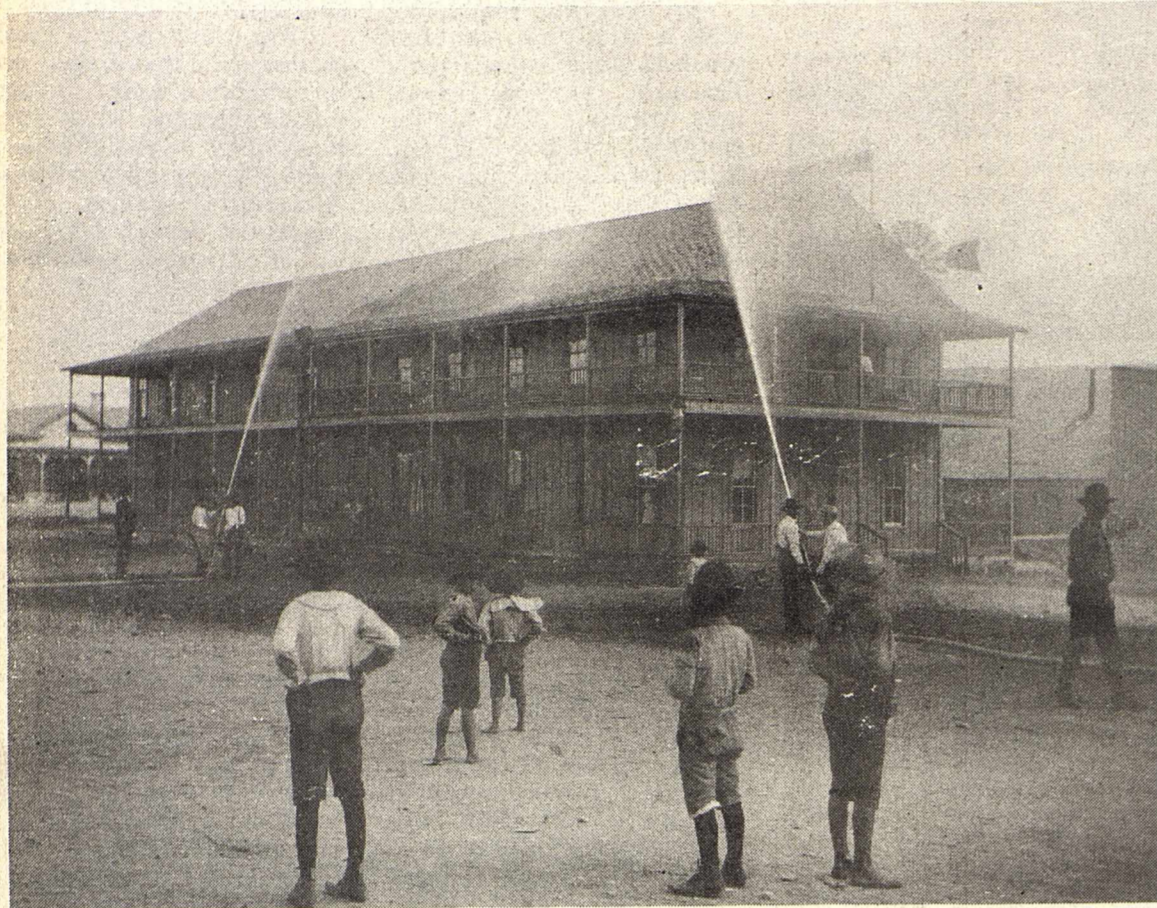

Q. I recently overheard a comment that "women haven't been in business in Sonora that long." Is this true?

A. NO!! There was an article in the March 20, 1936 issue of the Devil's River News that honored local women on National Business Women's Week. The following women were given special mention:

Miss Clara Allison and Miss Sally Wardlaw - the first a native of Sutton, the other of Reagan County - "graduated" from confectionery to drug business - and have been in business quite a few years. A. & W. Drug Store.

Mrs. Totsie Barton - native of Menard County but reared in Sutton - in ranch business several years - in food business in Sonora since May, 1935. Riverside Cafe

Miss Gracie Draper -

born Mason County - reared, McCulloch County - Sonora since 1928 when came to teach - in beauty business year and a half. Grace Draper's Beauty Shop

Mrs. Tom Driskell - born and reared in Kimble County - four years Sonora teacher - in laundry business several years. Sonora Laundry

Mrs. Josie McDonald - born and reared, Lampas county - serving Sutton people and traveling public in hotel business since 1896. Hotel McDonald

Mrs. Birdie Rutledge - born Colorado County, reared Lavaca County - to Sutton in 1925 in food business. Rutledge Cafe

Mrs. Ardena Speed - born Marion County, Tenn, but a Texan since she was 13 - to Sutton 1918 - in dairy business here since 1922. Speed Laundry

Mrs. Troy White - born Atascosa County, reared Tom Green and Sutton, here since

early 1900's - in business for self since 1923. White Beauty Parlor

We know that the Decker Hotel was run by Mrs. Decker-Masters until it was sold. Mrs. Murphy contributed greatly to the Devil's River News with her reports of weddings, parties, funerals, etc. Many hotels, motels and boarding houses throughout the years have been run by women. There are ranches that have been run by women through the years. Women have been in the education business in Sutton County since it's earliest days and have worked in banking since the early 1900's. For all these reasons I have to say that the statement you overheard is definitely incorrect.

Elderly Can Postpone Taxes

Texans ages 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homes. They can take advantage of tax option called "over 65-deferral" by signing an affidavit at the Sutton County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief also can halt a lawsuit filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's home, according to Rex Ann Friess, chief appraiser of the Sutton County Appraisal District. To stop a delinquent tax suit, the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

"If the affidavit is on file,

an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Friess said. Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home.

Friess stressed that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home; it does not cancel them. During the deferral time, taxes and interest of eight percent continue to add up. When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns and lives in the home, the taxes become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred taxes

and interest. There is no penalty on the delinquent taxes during the deferral time. However, filing the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties that were already due. Also, if the taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends, a taxing unit may charge an added penalty if the account goes to a delinquent tax attorney.

Tax deferral forms are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Friess said. For more information, taxpayers may contact the Sutton County Appraisal District, 300 E. Oak St., 387-2809.

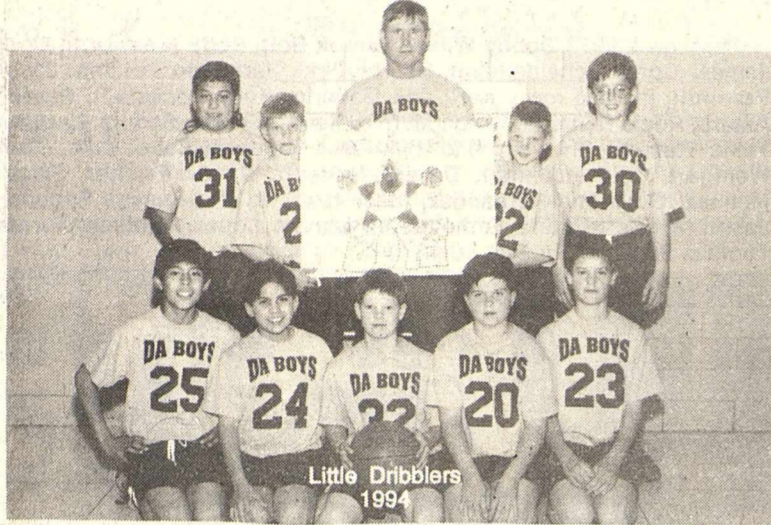

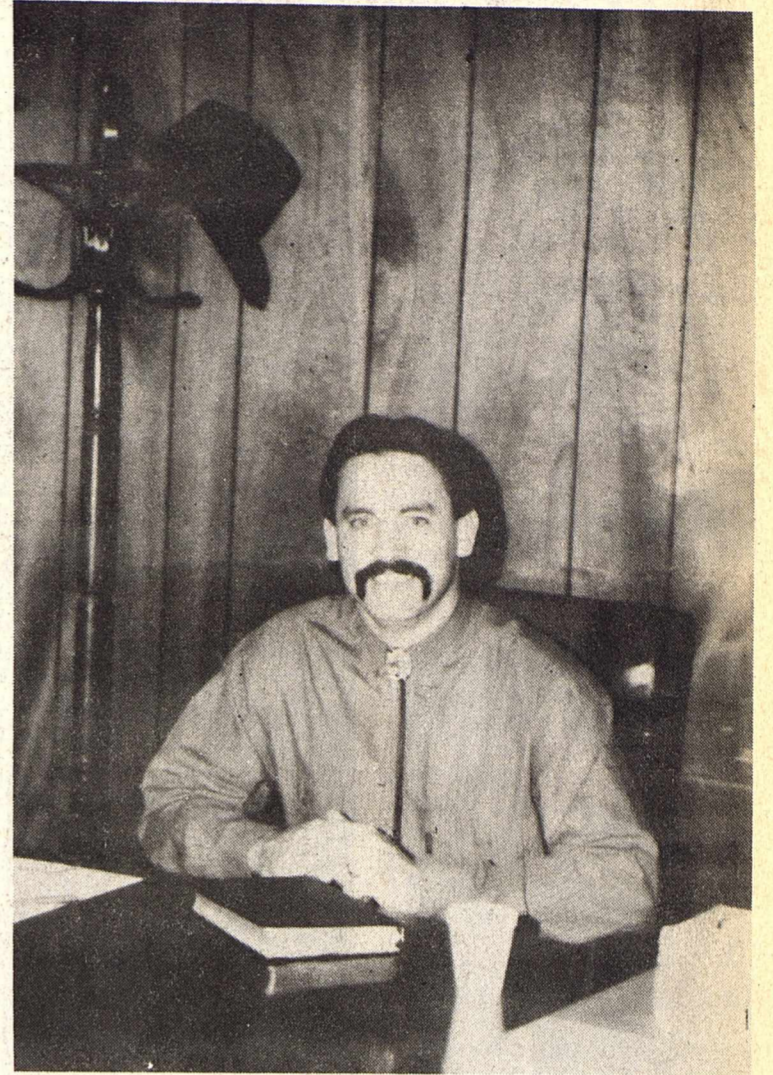
Avoid Postal Congestion By Mailing Tax Returns Early

With the deadline for filing income tax returns rapidly approaching, the U.S. Postal Service is bracing itself for the annual onslaught of last-minute tax filers.

On Friday, April 15th, we expect things to get intersecting around the middle of the afternoon. That's when you can count on all roads leading to the post office. Postal customers can easily avoid some congestion by mailing their returns or extensions request early in the day at the post office or collection boxes. I would emphasize, however, tax filers should double-check the pick-up schedule if they elect to use a streetside collection box to insure their tax documents will be collected and postmarked before the deadline. Last minute returns and extension requests may be deposited until midnight April 15th using the in-town Sonora drop at the post office. "This certainly can be a hectic time," Eisenhut said, "and in

the hustle and bustle of completing and signing forms, it's easy to overlook the simple things." Try to mail as early in the day as possible. Be certain to weigh your returns or extensions on a postal scale to calculate the proper amount of postage. This is especially true if you are filing extra forms or schedules this year. Tax agencies will not pay postage due, so short-paid tax filing must be returned to you for additional postage. Ordinarily that means you'll miss the deadline. Insure all documents are signed and placed inside the envelope prior to sealing and mailing. The Sonora postal employees assures the community that each and every tax filing will

receive an official April 15th postmark if it is properly prepared for mailing and deposited by the designated cut-off times. "Just like Christmas, you get it here and we'll get it there."

Applications For Farm Loans Available

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive drought are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Eden, FmHA County Supervisor Fred Greenway said today.

Kimble, Menard, Sutton and Schleicher Counties, are 4 of 8 in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the excessive drought.

Fred Greenway said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Greenway said. Farmers participating in the PIK or

Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until November 17, 1994 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Greenway said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.


The FmHA office in Eden is open from 8 to 5 Monday through Friday.

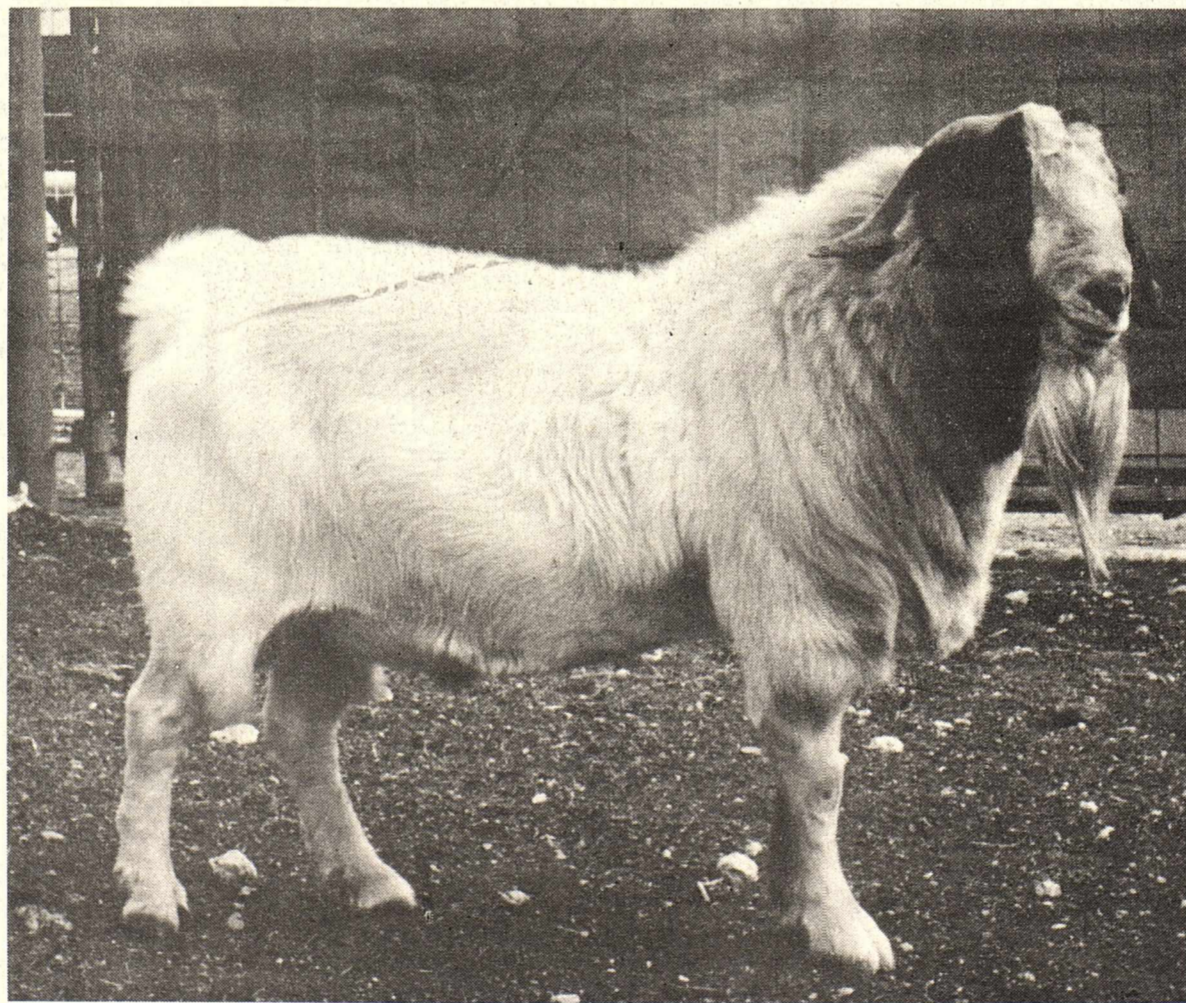
Newly created sessions for 1994 include "Teddy Bear Overnights" for girls entering grades 2-3. These sessions provide an introductory experience for
