# **Broncos Scrimmage Braves**

There is an old adage in football that goes something like "When you play hard you don't get hurt." With that in mind it isn't surprising that the Sonora Broncos emerged from their controlled scrimmage with the Iraan Braves at Iraan with some bumps and bruises but no significant injuries; the Broncos dominated the scrimmage until the closing minutes when an oh-by-theway score by Iraan managed to tie the final score.

Against a team that Head Coach Bob Bellard said was "comparable to some of our early opponents during the regular season," particularly Eldorado and Ozona, the Broncos were able to move the ball consistently on offense and suffered few turnovers.

The Bronco defense was also the same stingy unit which played in last Friday's intrasquad scrimmage,

allowing Iraan only two penetrations past the fifty-yard line during the course of the scrimmage.

The Broncos began the scrimmage on offense for the first twenty-minute period, and moved the ball efficiently down the field with some steady running and accurate passing, effectively keeping the Iraan defense off-balance and frustrated. After a six-play series which featured a third and eight twenty yard Jason Morley to sophomore Andy Mirike, the Broncos returned to their own thirty yard line to begin what would be the most impressive drive for either team the remainder of the evening.














# Ask The Historical Society



Ft. McKavett

O. When was Fort McKavett occupied by troops and were them "buffalo soldiers"?

A. Fort McKavett, frontier outpost in Menard County near the Schleicher County line was established in 1852, abandoned in 1860, reoccupied in 1868 and officially closed on June

Supplies were mainly transported by contract with the nearest subsistence depot being in San Antonio, 180 miles away. A four months' supply was generally kept on hand. Wood was supplied by contract and water was obtained from the nearby San Saba and hauled about 500 yards.

Indians as well as a few Apaches were in this area and the soldiers were desperately needed.

Communications were by private conveyance to Menardville (later called Menard) and from there by mail coach east and west.

Fresh meat was purchased nearby, fresh fish caught in the river and wild game hunted locally. Irish potatoes were hauled in and listed as "green food". Butter cost 50 cents a 1st Infantry - August 13, pound, chickens 50 cents each, 1855 to March 22, 1859 milk 10 cents a quart. The quantity of eggs needed could 1868 to March 19, 1869 only be obtained in Fredericksburg, occasionally, and cost 30 cents a dozen. There was a post garden of about 30 acres which produced a crop of watermelons, 1869 to October 1, 1869 cantaloupes, tomatoes, squash, pumpkins and sweet potatoes. It 1869 to September 28, 1872 was found that Irish potatoes

would not grow. The Fort McKavett stage ran tri-weekly and met larger stages, to pick up passengers for the post, at Coglin's stage stand about 16 miles below the

Fort McKayett was named after Captain Henry McKavett, 8th Infantry, who was killed in the Battle of Monterey during the War with Mexico.

Four regiments of black troops, called "buffalo soldiers" by the Indians, served in the West: the 24th and 25th Infantry and the 9th and 10th Cavalry. The 24th Infantry was organized at Fort McKavett in 1869, made up of troops from the 38th and 41st Infantry. Units of all four regiments served at Fort McKavett during the 1870's. Comanche and Kickapoo In addition to the four black regiments and the 4th Cavalry, contingents of the 1st, 10th, 16th and 22nd Infantry regiments served at Fort McKavett in the post-Civil War- period.

We found the following list of troops stationed at Fort McKavett in a book called "The Free State of Menard":

8th Infantry - March 14, 1852 to September 9, 1853

2nd Dragoons - January 26, 1854 to August 15, 1855

4th Cavalry - March 30, 35th Infantry - April 22,

1868 to March 19, 1869 9th Cavalry - October 1, 1868 to November 25, 1879

24th Infantry - October 1, 10th Infantry - September

21, 1872 to May 11, 1879 4th Cavalry - February 1, 1874 to August 18, 1874

22nd Infantry - May 8, 1879 to January 8, 1881

1st Infantry - December 8, 1880 to March 14, 1881

16th Infantry - March 7, 1881 to August 21, 1882 Company D. 16th Infantry

remained at the fort until it was evacuated June 30, 1883. During the 1870's troops

from Fort McKavett participated in most of the important campaigns which removed the Indian threat and opened West Texas to settlement.

Fort McKavett was designated a State Historic Site on May 17, 1968.

For more information on Fort McKavett we suggest you call the fort at 915-396-2358. A great deal of restoration work has been done at the fort. The fort is now open 7 days a week from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. There are limited camping facilities and there are some bunks rented to visitors. Fort McKavett makes a really nice day trip for anyone visiting Sonora. They have wonderful exhibits and we strongly recommend that anyone having the time pay them a visit.





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

remained high; the most dependable factor on the drive. however, was the powerful running of Bronco tail back Gilbert Vara, who slashed through the Iraan defense for 40 yards during this drive. Quarterback duties rotated between Morley and Josh Burnham, with both completing quality passes for first downs, Morley to Justin House to pick up a third and one, Burnham to Adrian Mata for an 11 yard gain, then, on the next play from scrimmage, a twenty-one yard strike to Louis Massey fro the lone Bronco score of the night.

The touchdown play from Burnham to Massey demonstrates just how effective the Bronco offense was during this drive. Burnham faked the ball to his tail back, and the Iraan defense, already having been punished by Vara's running for 40 yards, rushed the line of scrimmage. Burnham rolled out to his right under pressure, then fired a pass into traffic which hit Louis Massey right between the numbers. Massey took a solid hit on the play, but held onto the ball in the end zone for the touchdown.

The first offensive series for Sonora came to a close

of play at that position soon after the touchdown. The series is notable in several areas; the Broncos featured solid blocking, particularly from Trini Banda, and perhaps most importantly a wellbalanced attack, both passing and running the football very effectively. The Bronco defense, when it took the field for the second twenty minutes of the scrimmage, obviously did not want to be outdone they too dominated the Iraan line of scrimmage.

> The Bronco defensive unit got itself off to a rousing start by forcing Iraan to start over at its own thirty yard line before allowing a first down. Linebackers Jason Morley and Josh Burnham played very well during this series, with Morley recording 3 tackles for losses (7 tackles for the series) and recovering a fumble. Iraan consistently tried to go to the air against the Broncos, a weak spot for the Bronco defense last year. This year, however, the Bronco defense made the Braves pay; Burnham, tackles Cody Gann and Trini Banda, and end Marcus Montez all recorded quarterback sacks and pressures, frequently forcing the Iraan quarterback to throw before his play had developed.

The Bronco secondary also played well during this Iraan possession, with Gabriel Perez and Caleb Barker supporting the run well from their secondary positions with some hard hits on runners trying to break runs outside. Perez also earned a very fine interception by breaking on a poorly thrown ball and taking it right out of the receiver's hands,

forcing Iraan to start over yet

again. The middle of the Bronco defense was tough all night. Iraan experienced various difficulties running through the middle throughout most of the scrimmage, but most of those problems were caused by interior lineman Shane Deel (3 tackles for losses), Trini Banda, Cody Gann, Linebacker Jason Morley, and Safety Caleb Barker. The entire Bronco defense, once again, looked very sharp; team members broke to the ball and pursued

well, frequently trapping Iraan ball carriers for losses because there were so many Bronco defenders in the Iraan backfield.

The second Bronco offensive possession featured many reserves, many of whom played very well, and as a result the second Bronco offense moved the ball well.Caleb Barker at quarterback and Marcus Montez at running back were the workhorses during this possession, with Gabriel Perez also seeing some playing time on offense and running the ball well. The second team offense experienced some difficulty throwing the ball during its twenty-minute period, but the line blocked well and the Broncos were able to control the line of scrimmage consistently while playing tough, ball-control offense.

Several offensive players distinguished themselves during this possession, with Caleb Barker running option keepers for 48 yards, Montez rushing for 30 yards on 5 carries, and fullback Mike House rushing for a 13 yard gain up the middle while carrying tacklers. The Bronco second team offense played well, and while still demonstrating a few problems with turnovers (1 fumble and 2 interceptions), was able to move the ball against a fired-

up Iraan defense. The Bronco defense put on another display aggressiveness in its second twenty-minute period, allowing Iraan only two earned first downs and frequently penetrating into the Brave backfield to disrupt plays before they got started. During this defensive series several players performed particularly well, including Gilbert Vara,

Barker, and Raymond Rainer. Peter Noriega also recorded a quarterback sack during this series. During this series Iraan again attempted to go to the air in order to move the football, but defensive end Cody Renfro, linebacker Atkins, and tackle Pool harassed Iraan quarterbacks into frequently arrant throws, which were defended very well by alert Bronco secondary players Andy Mirike, Caleb Barker, and Joel Salazar. The second defensive series ended much as the first had; Iraan was unable to move the ball past the fifty yard line and the Bronco defense pursued to the ball well and made sure tackles for very small gains.


The last Bronco offensive series, while featuring fine runs from scrimmage by Jason Morley and Gilbert Vara, both off-tackle on the right side of the line, was not successful in moving the ball into the end zone. Iraan took over possession, and running a first team offense against secondand third-team Bronco defenders, managed to break a 40 yard touchdown run on only their second penetration across the fifty yard line of the night. The Iraan touchdown tied the score, and the


scrimmage ended in a tie. Coach Bob Bellard, 


after the interviewed scrimmage, said "This was a good first scrimmage for us. It really helped us to go full speed against somebody else." He reserved special praise for Jason Morley, Cody Gann, and Josh Burnham on defense during the first Bronco defensive series, and for Levi Pool during the second Bronco defensive series.

Offensively, Bellard was pleased as well. When asked about the three quarterbacks (Jason Morley, Josh Burnham, Caleb Barker) who rotated play throughout the scrimmage, he commented that "all three quarterbacks played well - and all three can play the position well enough for us to win." Bellard also praised the play of Trini Banda on the offensive line, T.J. Harris, who stepped in at center and did a fine job all night, and Gilbert Vara, who ended the scrimmage with over 100 rushing yards.

The next Bronco Scrimmage is in Sonora on Friday, August 26, against the Coahoma Bulldogs. The Broncos, Coach Bellard, and the Bronco Booster Club would like to invite Bronco fans, old and new, to Bronco Stadium on the 26th to watch this scrimmage, and to all Bronco games this year, beginning in Wall on September 2nd.







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
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



in Brownwood, TX, recently participated in a surgical training symposium in San Francisco on a new advanced surgical technique known as Plantar Endoscopic Fasciotomy. This procedure is used to treat heel pain caused from Heel Spur Syndrome. Prior to the development of this advanced technique, patients would be required to go through a sometimes painful, and long recovery period, up to six months in some cases, with the traditional surgery. This new surgical technique uses very tiny incisions and all of the work is done by the surgeon via endoscopy, where the procedure is performed off of a TV screen.

When comparing this new

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Dr. Nichols, who practices technique to traditional heel spur surgery, there are obviously many advantages for the patient. The endoscopic procedure can be done comfortably under a local anesthetic, and allows immediate weight-bearing for the patient. Dr. Stephen Barrett and Dr. Stephen Day, both of the Houston, Texas area, are credited with the development of this new surgical technique. Dr. Barrett states, "in our series of patients, all of them returned to a regular shoe on the third day after surgery. Most required little, if any pain medication. Many patients missed very little time from work, if any at all. This is extraordinary if you compare this to the traditional type of heel spur surgery, where it was

The Sutton County Underground Water Conservation District board of directors held their regular monthly meeting August 10, 1994 in the conference room of the Mercantile Building! Among other items on the agenda, a tax rate for the 1994-95 fiscal year was discussed at length. Due to the directors' concerted efforts to keep the tax rate at a minimum, a tax rate of \$0.0146/\$100 valuation for the maintenance and operation of the Water District. 


#### **Boyd Polhamus**




