Rain, snow and sleet fell in the north and west today and freezing temperatures were registered in all

Midland citizens awoke this morning to find a blanket of snow covering everything visible. The snow started falling about 8:30 last night and after a lapse of an hour or two between 9:30 and midnight during which only very little fell settled natural resources. down to snowing in earnest and kept it up until about 7 this morning.

## **EMPEROR ACCEPTS** CABINET FORMED BY GEN. HAYASHI

Crisis Is Averted By Success In Naming Suitable Group

AGREE ON TRUCE

Army Opposition Had Blocked Efforts Of Gen. Ugaki

TOKYO. Feb. 2. (A)-Emperor Hirohito today ended Japan's constitutional crisis with the acceptance of General Hayashi's compromise cabinet, making a truce beween military bureaucracy and parliamentary leaders and climaxing a fight by army extremists for a strong rightist regime.

Financial and industrial circles reacted favorably expressing belief the appointment of Toyotarouki as Finance Minister had dispelled fears of outright Fascist control.

The success of Hayashi, a moderate, is considered to have resulted from public displeasure when army opposition blocked efforts of General Ugaki, resigned, to form a cab-

Major General E. B. Markham, chief of army engineers, saying such an eventuality might be disastrous, emphasized he did not expect it. At Cairo, 4,500 men kept the sandbags mounting and ready to defend any strained section of a 60-foot

ADELAIDE, Australia. (U.P.) A new species of fish, which eats on its head, has just been discovered T. Marshall, noted ichthyologist of the Queensland Museum.

To date, some 36 members of this branch of the finny tribe have been netted. They range from 16 to 33 pounds in weight.

According to Marshall, the fish is of the oyster-eating variety and while raiding oyster beds it eats in a perpendicular position, with its head on the bed of the ocean and its tail protruding out of the water. Teh fish have been classed as belonging to the carangidae group,

More Centralization?

Whether the entire water-flow problem of the nation will eventually gravitate to a central board of control at Washington, or to state "authorities" created in the watersheds of the various river systems, remains to be seen.

In the few tentative experiments made in Ohio, Pennsylvania, and New York, with such "authorities" the general arrangement has been that the state puts up the mony to buy the land and pay damages accruing to people whose property is flooded, while the federal government approves plans and then builds the actual dams with PWA and WPA appropriations.

Congress' authorization of \$320. 000,000 worth of flood control projects last year, anticlimaxed by failure to appropriate any of the money, is not likely to be repeated this year, as pressure on Congress mounts higher than the flood waters themselves.
