BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Feb. 2.—A vast new New Deal program with flood control, conservation of both natural and human resources and cheap electric power as primary objectives—may be launched as a result of America's great flood of 1937. The administration has as yet no long-time proposal to apply in the wake of the catastrophe. But a certain strong, active group which in the past has often exerted great influence in its policies will urge plans for high dams on the headwaters of the Ohio and other rivers for a continued big federal works program with emphasis on flood and conservation work and for simultaneous development of federal power projects along with the dams.

Yast "Protective Army"
It is proposed to maintain workers on the federal payroll in numbers equal to current WPA, PWA, and CCC armies, not only for those specific aims, but also to keep up the volume of government-fed purchasing power and to maintain a theoretical "floor" to wages which will permit organized labor in private industry to better or at least hold its wage scales despite the presence of millions of unemployed.

There is a reason to believe that such a general program will appeal to Roosevelt, if he is not already considering it.

Its promotion means a struggle between progressive, liberal forces here and in the conservative Democrats in Congress and the treasury who are responsible for the current administration deficiency relief bill which at least theoretically cuts 600,000 persons off WPA rolls in the next four months.

Already Chairman Jim Buchanan of the House appropriations committee, dour official penny-pincher though he is, admits that the flood with its hundreds of thousands of homeless persons probably has made it impossible to cut relief rolls.

Power Lobby Assailed
Foes of the "power trust" are prepared to charge that opposition of power companies to erection of

high dams in headwaters of the Ohio has been a factor in the recent flood damage. This opposition is attributed to fear that presence of dams adaptable for the purpose would be a temptation for public power development. Also, whenever dams were erected for water control purposes companies lobbied against any attempt to make them productive of electricity.

Since money invested could not be recovered through power sales, success of such lobbying naturally discouraged building of dams which could have ameliorated floods. On the other hand, dams built by private power companies have been constructed as cheaply as possible and for the sole purpose of generating electricity.

Chairman Arthur Morgan of TVA, whose amiable attitude toward private power companies has been repudiated by Roosevelt, during a long career in handling flood control projects always insisted his dams must not be used for power. Army engineers have insisted so firmly on "one purpose dams" that it took Roosevelt six months to make them put pen-troughs in the Tygart dam in West Virginia.

Many-Angled Attack
Under an Ohio state law the dams erected for flood control there since the Dayton flood cannot be used for power purposes, but already one hears here private suggestions for an "Ohio Valley Authority" with a "yard-stick" phase.

Rural Electrification Administrator Morris L. Cooke, who headed the Mississippi Valley Committee during its exhaustive study of land and water resources, is an outstanding apostle of the "all-purpose" dam. He tells this writer that some dams can be built simultaneously for flood control, navigation, power, recreation, irrigation, a potable water supply, and even other purposes.

But dams are not enough, he says, and "we should make every day a reservoir."

Goldfish Seem to Like Freezing as Experience

ALFRED N. Y. (U.P.)—Dr. Paul C. Saunders, of Alfred University, has found in experimenting with goldfish that the fish are not injured by being frozen solid, but rather seem to enjoy the experience. The professor freezes the goldfish by dropping them in a breaker containing liquid air. He then places the frozen fish into a beaker of cold water and within a few moments it begins to wiggle. Soon it is swimming actively. The oxygen in the liquid air is highly exhilarating, according to Dr. Saunders. He said the same fish has been frozen as often as four times a day without permanent injury, and that most of his specimens die of old age.

LONDON (U.P.)—The Rev. L. A. Ewart, of Earl's Barton, Northamptonshire, is Great Britain's most versatile vicar.

The pastor, a friend of the late Houdini and student of the world-famous magician's escape methods,

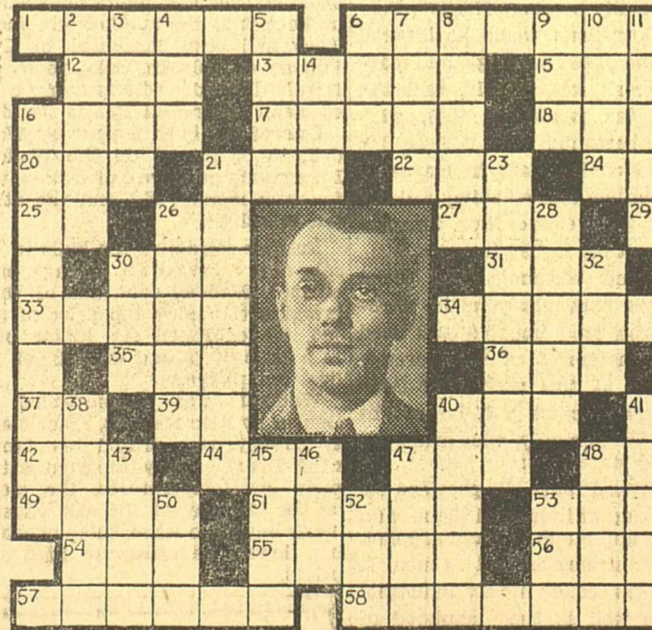

The Town Quack



While I don't set myself up as a political commentator, I feel constrained to offer a few remarks from my limited study of yesterday's action by the lower house of the legislature, in which they propose to give the counties the state's general fund portion of the state ad valorem tax.

On the basis of 35 cents per \$100 valuation, Midland county pays the state's general fund about \$20,000 a year. If this measure gets through, both houses, it will cost the state about \$9,000,000 a year because the counties would retain that portion of the ad valorem tax for use in their own boundaries.

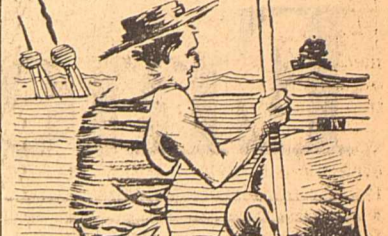
In addition to that \$9,000,000 shortage to the state, it is claimed that about \$13,000,000 of new revenues already are needed to balance the budget.

With necessity for raising a new \$22,000,000 per year, there is no doubt that a sales tax or similar plan will have to be started immediately.

If we are going to have a sales tax, let's get on the sales tax basis instead of the ad valorem. If we are to

HE MADE SEA SAFE FROM PIRATES



TRIPOLITAN corsairs were stopping American and foreign vessels, early in the 19th century, enslaving the passengers and seamen, burning the vessels, forcing the nations to pay tribute. Against these sailed Lieut. (later Capt.) Stephen Decatur. When an American ship was captured and placed under the guns of Tripoli, Decatur, in the dead of night, stole into the harbor and put fire to it. The Pascha of Tripoli and the Dey of Algiers soon made peace, and piracy of the Barbary powers ended. Decatur, born in 1779, was only 22 when he began his exploits against piracy. He became commodore in 1810, was cited by President Madison in 1815 for his bravery. He it was who offered the famous toast, "My country, may she always be right; but right or wrong, my country." His death came at the early age of 41, as a result of a fatal duel with Commodore Barron. His portrait appears, with that of Thomas MacDonough, on the new two-cent navy stamp.

Pneumonia Often Follows a Cold

AUSTIN—Pneumonia is always a serious disease, and early treatment is of paramount importance to lessen the severity of the disease and prevent death. Is the warning issued by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"A person previously well may develop pneumonia suddenly," he said, "but most often it occurs in persons who have, or who recently have had a cold. Yet many people do not take the cold seriously enough. Suspect every cold. Go to bed immediately, if you have fever with a cold, call your physician, and do exactly what he says. By intelligently following your physician's advice at the beginning of the attack, you may ward off the after effects which so often follow neglected colds—pneumonia among them.

"Almost any part of the air passage may sometimes be attacked by bacteria. When the nose is affected we call the condition a cold. The tissues of the nose react to such infection by a profuse mucous discharge or mucous liquid. This discharge is really an attempt on the part of the body to get rid of the germs and their poisons. If the infection is lower down, it causes a sore throat. If the voice box is affected, the con-

dition is called Laryngitis. If the germs reach the bronchi, the disease is known as Bronchitis. If the germs get down to the lungs, the person affected has pneumonia. Thus it may be seen that the common cold may be the beginning of one of the most serious complications of the respiratory tract.

"These respiratory diseases may be avoided many times by establishing individual health measures. Help prevent colds and pneumonia by proper personal hygiene. Eat moderately, drink plenty of pure water, and sleep 8 to 10 hours every night with windows open. Do not allow the temperature of your home or working place to exceed 70 degrees Fahrenheit. Wash your hands frequently, especially before eating. Take some exercises out of doors every day, but avoid fatigue and unnecessary exposure to cold weather and rain.

"Watch your health habits and avoid a cold if possible—but if colds develop, take care of them and avoid complications of pneumonia."

Continued From Page One Gulf Oil Corporation No. 11 Goldsmith, in the center of the south-east quarter of section 27, block 44, township 1 south, T. & P. survey, is drilling below 4,035 feet in lime, with no oil or gas showing.

Sinclair-Prairie No. 2-A Johnson, test north of the Foster pool in Ector, is drilling at 4,074 feet in lime, no shows reported.

Gaines Wildcat

Stanford Oil & Gas Company No. 1 J. A. Morrow, Gaines wildcat west and slightly north of the Landreth No. 1 Kirk area, this morning was bailing off bottom. Bottomed at 4,206, it was bailed down after drilling plug from 7-inch casing set at 4,558, and a two-hour bailing test showed a barrel of fluid per hour, 25% oil and the rest salty sulphur water. The water is not believed coming from formation, but is probably drilling water contaminated by gas and oil.

Texas Company No. 1 Bob Slaughter, wildcat in labour 83, league 38, Zavalla county school land, Hockley county, is drilling at 4,110 feet in anhydrite.

Mason No. 2 Kyle, recent Delaware discovery 18 miles northwest of the Wheat pool in Loving county, is still averaging around 300 barrels of high-gravity oil daily while cleaning out cavings near bottom. 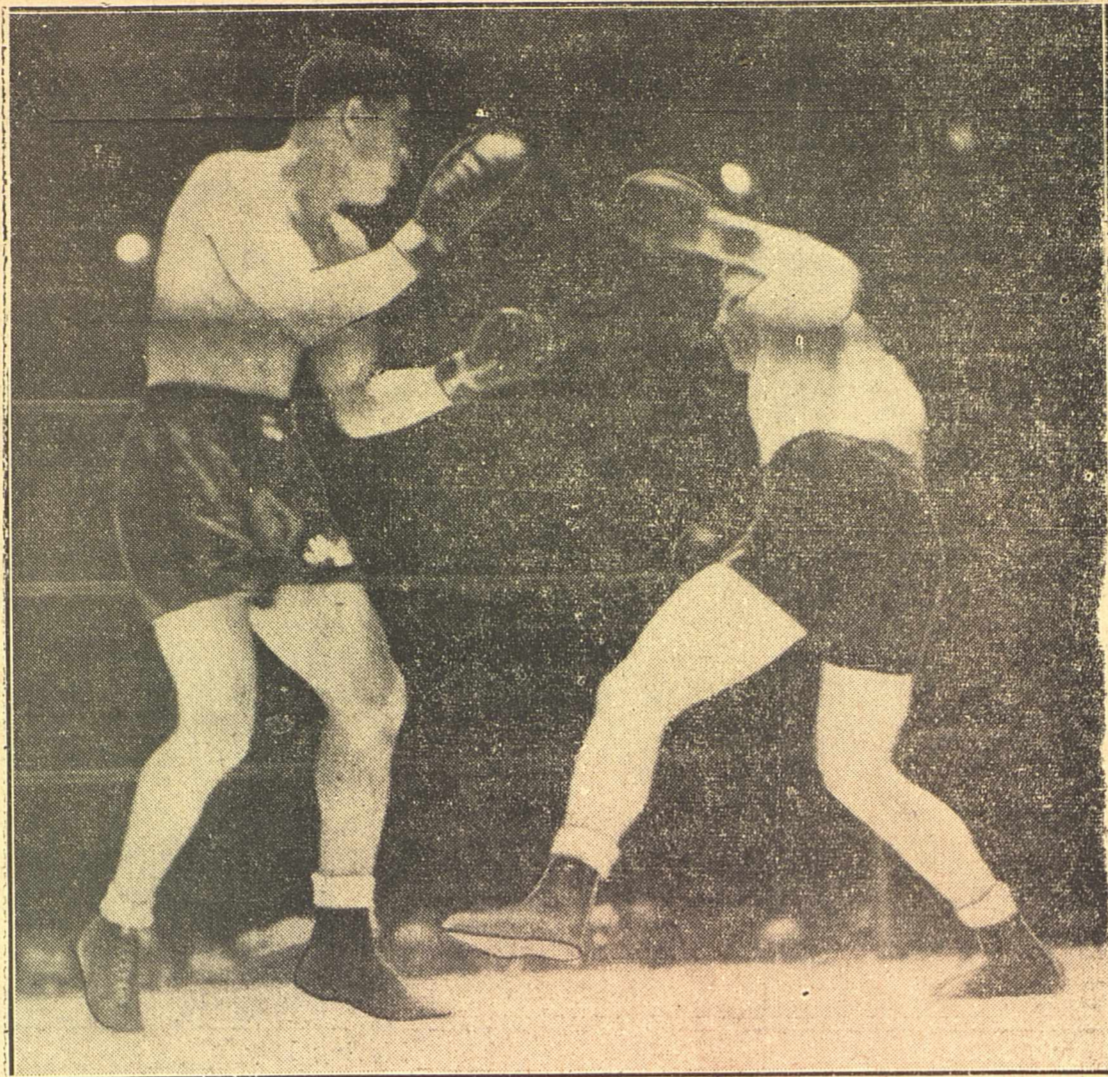

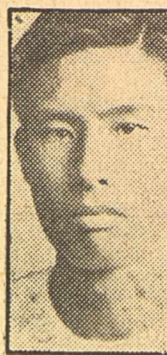
