Historic Document Approved

French and British Warships Speeding To Mediterranean
GENEVA, Sept. 14. (AP)—Envoys of nine nations signed today a historic document to suppress submarine piracy in the Mediterranean with warships of Britain and France already steaming toward that area. The document is the first of its kind ever planned.
The accord deals solely with submarine attacks. The League of Nations will consider how to deal with other forms of Mediterranean aggression.
Britain has more than doubled her fighting strength in the Mediterranean.
The powers await Italy's decision on an invitation to share arrangements for patrolling off the Italian western coast.
Diplomats also were encouraged by reports that Italy had accepted the principle of the "power plan" for the Mediterranean.
The Italian note was said to ask "clarification" of the zone which Italy would control, and what obligations there would be to extend port facilities to the cooperating powers, including Russia.
Russia also instructed her delegate, foreign minister Maxim Litvinov, to state that the league offer "friendly mediation" in the Sino-Japanese conflict was declared by diplomats to be not only consistent with the league's role as peacemaker but "the most practical measure it could adopt."
China's attitude toward the league was said to be "unaffected by the Sino-Japanese conflict."
China's appeal asked that the situation be dealt with under three articles of the league covenant designed to protect league members against external aggression and a matter of concern to the whole league.

Babson Foresees 20-Cent Dollar For the Country

BOSTON, Sept. 14. (AP)—Roger Babson stated that "the chances are six to four that we are headed toward a twenty-cent dollar." "Inflation or revaluation," may be resorted to as a means of wiping out huge public debts, he told the Boston Chamber of Commerce.
"Central banks are expected to be better off than last fall. Farmers are wage earners and stockholders. I am forecasting no boom, but I do promise business improvement."
"We are in a gradually declining bond market."
"People who are now buying currencies will gradually get the most out of them. The price of money has always gone up and down, the laws of economics and reaction are far more reliable than the laws of progress."
"As to stocks, if the country enters a period of real inflation, the market has only just started. Although there are no technical reasons why there should be a bull market, it is very dangerous to go short on stock today."
