#### Slight Rally Made By Former State Secretary Today

SAINT PAUL. Dec. 20. (A) - Dr. J. A. Lepak said today that Frank Kellogg, co-author of the Kellogg peace pact, critically ill here of pneumonia, had rallied.

Kellogg, whose 81st birthday anniversary is just two days away was stricken with cerebral thrombosis six weeks ago but rallied several times. Saturday night Dr. Lapak said, pneumonia set in and he lapsed into a coma. The physician said Kellogg had regained consciousness for brief periods.

Kellogg has been afflicted at times with partial paralysis of the body as a result of the stroke. #### Housing Bill Is Rushed to The Senate

#### Hopes of Passage Ere Adjournment Voiced by Leaders

WASHINGTON. Dec. 20. (AP) congressional leaders rushed the ousing bill to the senate today in an attempt to enact one major measure before mid-week adjournment. Leaders talked with President Roosevelt but would not discuss details of the conference.

The latter, intended to stimulate a gigantic boom in home building by decreasing the cost of financing home purchases, was passed Saturday by the House. To all intents and purposes the House ended the special session as far as it was concerned with the action.

Although the special session has fallen far short of the four-bill goal which President Roosevelt set for it, congressional leaders expressed satisfaction that the farm bill had been advanced to the conference stage and predicted easy sailing for the housing measure.

Meanwhile a Senate sub-committee voted unanimously Sunday to report the administration's new housing bill to the full committee Mon-The Senate draft was substantially the same as the bill the House adopted.

The legislation proposes to carry

out President Roosevelt's recent request for liberalization of the National Housing Act, a move he estimated would encourage investment of much private capital in construction work over a five-year period. The full committee expects to rush the bill to the Senate floor

with a view to enactment before adjournment. Should it fail to pass by Wednesday, a Thursday session probably would be ordered.



#### Boarding of The Panay Admitted

#### Version Accepted By Japanese Will **Determine Apology**

SHANGHAI, Dec. 20 (AP).-Conradictory versions of the Japanese combardment of the American gunboat Panay served today to confuse and delay an amicable settlement of the threatened crisis.

A Japanese military attache at Shanghai said Japanese soldiers had been killed by their own planes which bombed the Panay and three oil vessels.

The Japanese foreign office in Tokyo acknowledged soldiers aboard river vessels fired on the Panay. The military attache said they did not. Those aboard the Panay said

The version Japan accepts may be an important factor in determining the final attitude of the Washington State Department in accepting an apology.

In Washington, Secretary of State Hull said the government had long expected to withdraw American ships and citizens from the far east "when their appropriate function no longer is called for" but the present "does not seem an opportune moment."

#### U. S. Gunboats Taunt War Gods in China

If you will dig out your atlas, you will learn that the city of Nanking is upwards of 100 miles up the Yangtze

Having acquired that fact, you may next wonder just what an American man-of-war was doing that far in the interior of a supposedly independent nation with which America has friendly but quite neutral relations.

Your wonder might be increased slightly by the fact that that independent nation is now up to its neck in a full-dress war with another nation, with which our country also has friendly but neutral relations.

The American gunboat Panay, sunk by Japanese bombs some 25 miles upstream from Nanking, was a long, long way from home when the accident happened. It was right in the middle of a lot of trouble. The Japanese were shooting at practically everything in the river. A foreign vessel wandering around in those parts obviously did so at its own peril.

Now it is perfectly true that the Panay was up there to rescue American nationals and to render what protection it might to American property.

It is also true that a treaty signed in 1858 gives American and other warships the right to patrol the river for the suppression of piracy, banditry, and so on. They frequently offer protection to Chinese as well as to west-

But these times are different. It is war, not piracy, that is troubling the Yangtze these days. A nation that wants to stay out of trouble might well keep its ships out of the waters where trouble is brewing.

Suppose a British warship had gone up the Mississippi river in the fall of 1862 or the spring of 1863, bent on resuing certain British citizens and protecting British in-estments in Vicksburg. Suppose it had been cruising up and down the river before Vicksburg at that time.

That cruiser would have been hit, sooner or later, for the air along the Vicksburg waterfront was full of shells most of the time in those days. Presumably it would have gone to the bottom. Would the British have been justified in going into a furor of indignation against the side that fired the shells? Would not the proper retort have been that Vicksburg was a long way from the high seas, that a war was going on on the Mississippi and that in the face of business recession a nation which didn't want its warships mistreated ought and rising unemployment, consists to keep them out of the river entirely?

Much the same sort of thing applies to us in China. We have had ample warning of the trouble there. Might it not be smart for us to get our warships out of there?

We have learned something, in the last generation. In 1898, a somewhat similar incident put us straight into a war. We are reacting differently now. We are not urging ourselves to "Remember the Panay" the way we once remembered the Maine

But the danger remains. Every tragedy like this of the Panay increases, by at least a little, the possibility of our getting involved in this war. We can't figure that our interests in China are worth a war. So why not get our warships away, before it is too late?

#### Soviet Pole Pioneers

Those four Russian scientists who were plunked down on an ice floe at the North Pole last May and told to stay there until they were called for have done a good deal of traveling just by sitting still. The latest messages from their floating base show that they have drifted 745 miles, and are now off the northeast coast of Greenland, nearly eight degrees of latitude from the pole.

If they have done nothing else, they have at least reversed one of the traditions of polar exploration. The old-timers went to the pole, or as close to it as they could get, by slow and painful stages; the Russians went there in a hurry, but have taken longer getting back than any other group on record.

And while they will undoubtedly bring back much scientific data on ocean currents, water temperatures, and so on, it is probable that one thing by which the public will remember them—that they flew to the pole and then drifted away on an ice cake.

#### Audience Etiquet

The good people of Pittsburgh got a slight jolt the other day when Serge Koussevitzky, conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, stopped his players in the middle of a number and strode indignantly off the stage because late-comers were bustling in their seats while the music was being played.

This, probably, was a display of the much talked-of artistic temperament; but it was also a richly-deserved rebuke for the tardy, and if more performers would show the same sort of temperament the lot of the average concert-goer would be much pleasanter.

The starting-time of any concert is always announced in advance. If a patron can't get there in time, it's up to him to stand and wait until there is an intermission before

hunting for his seat. By barging in while the music is being played he makes an unmitigated nuisance of himself. Mr. Koussevitzky did a good job in dramatizing the annovance that the tardy arrival causes.

#### Behind The Scenes In Washington

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. - To a greater degree than many of the President's advisers find comfortable, present administration policy of sitting tight and waiting for something to turn up.
