



Henlein Asks Annexation by Nazis

BERCHTESGADEN, Sept. 15 (P).—Prime Minister Chamberlain of Great Britain arrived here this afternoon for a talk with Reichsfuehrer Hitler in search of means to assure European peace.

Chamberlain was given a warm welcome by German crowds Hitler, standing in the rain at the entrance of his mountain retreat, welcomed the elderly British statesman who dashed from London by plane and train to speak for the British empire on the Czechoslovak crisis. Hitler greeted his guests with cordial hand-

Before getting down to business, Hitler invited the Chamberlain party to tea, during which Chamberlain admired the Alpine view

Nazi officials, pleased with the unexpected turn of the situation, were unwilling, however, to even guess on what proposals Chamberlain might make to end the crisis.

MEXICO, D. F., Sept. 15 (UP) .-Two-day festivities celebrating the 128th anniversary of independence of Mexico from Spain began today. Thousands of people from the surrounding villages came to see the big "frestas," which this year also are being attended by prominent foreign labor leaders visiting the country.

Although the yoke of Spain was not finally thrown off until 1821, the Mexican official independence day is Sept. 16, 1810. At a. m. that morning, the priest, Miguel Hidalgo, curate of the town of Dolores (State of Guanajuato) gave the cry ("El Grito") of independence, and rang the local parish bell. The historic liberty bell was brought to Mexico City and placed over the center balcony of the presidential palace, on the
