> **Over 4 Million** Is Reported by **Officials** Today

Deposits reached a new high in the two Midland banks today when a total of \$4,309,187.47 were reported by bank officials.

Deposits in the First National bank had passed the \$3,000,000 mark for the first time in history a total of \$3, 109,453.87 being reported. Deposits in the Midiand National were reported at \$1,199,733.60. The total amount of money in the banks at present totals \$110,721.28 more than the total on July 1, when the comptroller of currency made his last call.

The First National bank reported loans and discounts of \$1,370,823.14 and cash and exchange at \$1,972,-787.83. The Midland national bank reported loans and discounts of \$468,108.32 and cash and exchange at \$684,829.69.



An analysis of employment has been made on a national scale by an insurance company to determine what, -if any, changes in the proportionate age groups at work and out of work have taken place since 1929.

What came out of the analysis was, very briefly, the fact that the employment, unemployment, and placement ratios between the age groups under and over 40 have international stable during the entire period-through every ase of the depression, the recession, and whatever it is we're having now.

The same proportion has held among the men at wwork, among the men looking for work, and among the men being absorbed into the employment ranks. The over 40, by the figures of this survey, is wanted by business, sought by it, and absorbed by it exactly as much as he was last year, or the year before, or any year in the ...past eight.
