Time is running out on the primary election campaigns.

Saturday is election day and come Saturday night, we'll know who will be the parties' representatives in the various races for the general election in November.

With the majority of the interest on the governor's race, where four candidates have good chances to make the two run-off positions, we don't need to overlook or slight the race for the U. S. Senate nomination.

Ralph Yarborough again deserves our votes and support. He has the better chance of unseating the Republican incumbent, John Tower, in the November voting.

Unless we give Yarborough a vote of confidence now by uniting behind him at the polls, we're giving Tower a plush ride back to the Senate for a six-year term. And if we want Tower re-elected we're supposed to be voting in the Republican primary, anyway.

Farmer County Republicans are, incidentally, doing a good job again this election year. They're scheduled primaries to be held at four places in the county, including Bovina. The polls here will be at the main school building.

Glenn Lust of Lazbuddie, who is retiring as chairman of the GOP in Farmer County this year, has done a good job of supporting his party in this area. He'll be difficult to replace . . . and maybe it'll turn out that he won't be and will continue to serve.

For Texas to become a two-party state, work like that done by Lust will be required throughout.

The Republicans again have a candidate on the local level. Forrest Osborn of Friona is running for the county commissioner's court in his precinct against the Democratic incumbent, Tom Lewellen.

Too often, people who run for local and county offices do so as Democrats because of tradition instead of because their thinking is more in line with that party.

That happens on the state level, too. That's one reason we're interested in seeing a stronger two-party system in this state.

A two-party system would be better, we think, than having one party with two or more factions.

The chairmanship of the county Democratic Party is also up for grabs in Saturday's elections.

Voters will have the opportunity to write-in whoever they want for the position.

Nelson Welch of Friona, who holds the office now, has submitted his resignation effective Monday -- two days after the primary. He announced his resignation several weeks ago, prior to the filing deadline, but no one filed for the position.

The job needs to be done by someone and we would be happy to accept it provided enough voters see fit to write our name in during Saturday's voting.

The job is pretty much a thankless one, we understand, and the pay is either nil or nothing, we're not sure which, but we would be glad to have it if the people of the county want us to.

Years ago, we think it was '64, we ran against Welch for the county post or at least we had our name on the ballot with his.

A total of 46 per cent of the votes across the county were marked in our favor, as we remember. That paid just like dead last, of course, since only the two of us were running.

Welch was a friend of our then and still is. We've served with him for several years on the county Democratic executive committee. Nothing personal was involved.

Except for Owen Patton, bless his heart, no one has asked us about it, but if they did, we'd tell them to vote for two Dolphs Saturday ---- Briscoe for governor and Moten for county chairman of the Demo party! We think they're both honest.

A couple of things which Briscoe has had a hand in which makes him a fine candidate for agri-business and rural Texas: 1. When he was in the state legislature, he co-authored the bill which created the farm-to-market road system; 2. He was a leader in the successful screwworm eradication program, a development which saves Texans up to \$100 million a year. Let's vote for Dolph Briscoe.

Political Parties Convene

Democratic and Republican political conventions will be held on the precinct level in Farmer County Saturday.

Democratic precinct conventions will be at 2 p.m. and will be at the site of the polls in most of the eight voting precincts in the county. In Bovina, however, the convention will be in The Blade building while the Demo polls will be in the American Legion Hall.

Bovina Republicans will have their convention at 4:30 at the school cafeteria, site of the voting. The GOP county convention will be at Lazbuddie School auditorium Saturday, May 13, at 4:30 p.m.

Bovina Democrats will elect seven delegates to the county convention which is scheduled for the following Saturday, May 13, in Friona.

Establish Fund For Eakins

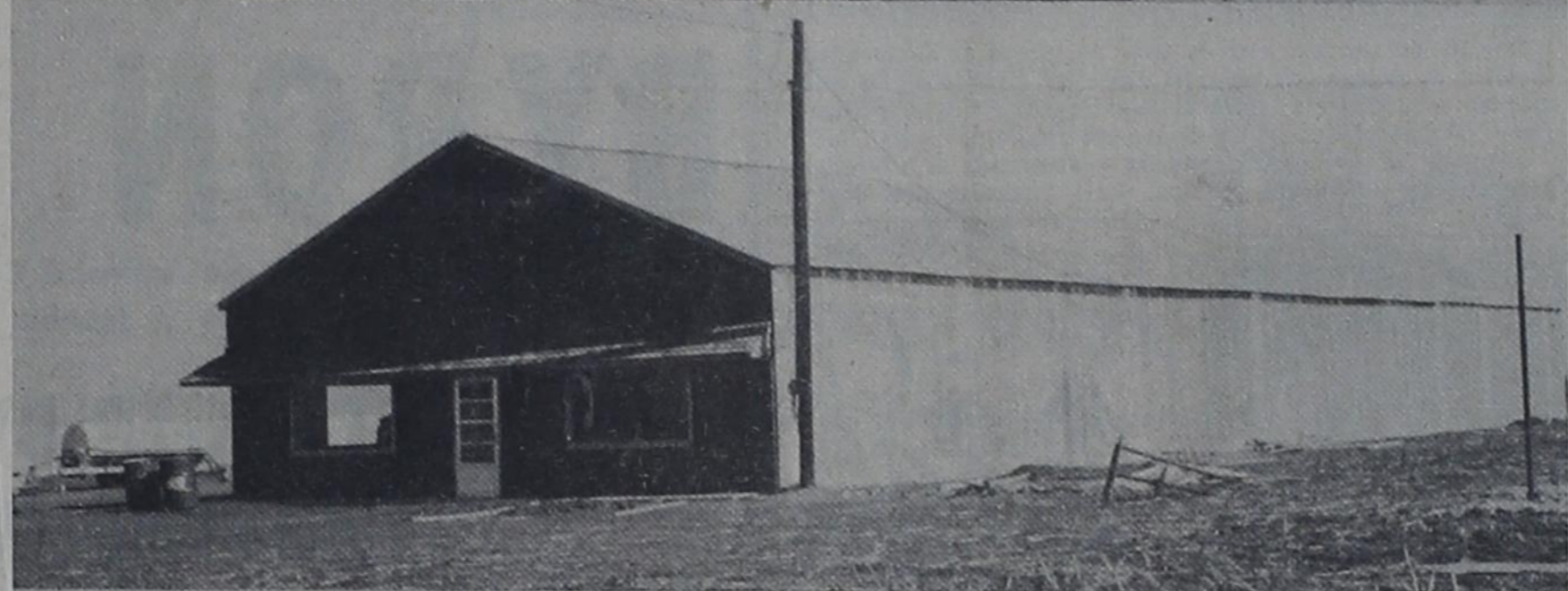

Governor's Race No. 1 Contest

Primary elections for both Democrats and Republicans will be held Saturday.

Of prime interest to Democratic voters in this area is the nomination to the U.S. Senate and the governor's race.

In the Republican Primary, the only contested spot is that of the governor's nomination with six candidates listed on the ballot.

Polling place for the Democratic Primary will be the American Legion Hall.

Republicans will cast their ballots at Bovina Schools main building.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

In the closely contested governor's race in the Demo Primary, four candidates are given a chance of making it to the run-off. They are Dolph Briscoe, Ben Barnes, incumbent Preston Smith seeking his third term and Frances (Sissie) Farenthold. Other candidates on the slate are Robert Everett L. Looney, William H. (Bill) Posey and Gordon F. Willis.

Former U.S. Senator Ralph Yarborough is seeking the nod from Texas Democrats to return to that office. His main opposition is considered to be Barefoot Sanders. Others in the race are Thomas M. Cartledge, Alfonso (Al) Veloz and Hugh Wilson.

On the Farmer County level, a county commissioner's race exists in Precinct 3 (Farwell-Oklahoma Lane) where incumbent Guy Cox is opposed by Cecil Atchley, Raymond E. Mears and Wanda Walker are vying for the post of justice of peace, Precinct 1.

Three Democratic incumbents -- Hurshel R. Harding, county attorney; Chas. Lovelace, county sheriff; and Hugh Moseley, tax assessor-collector -- are unopposed in their bids for re-election. Thomas Lewellen is the only candidate for county commissioner in Precinct No. 1.

Several races exist on a state-wide level, although only the Senate and governor's races have drawn heavy local interest.

George H. Mahon is unopposed in the Democratic Primary to return to Washington, D. C., as United States Representative from the 19th Congressional District.

Seeking the lieutenant governorship post vacated by Barnes is Joe Christie, Wayne W. Connolly, Ralph M. Hall, Bill Hobby, Bill Jones, Robert E. McCord, Troy Skates and John Armstrong Standea. For attorney general are John Hill, incumbent Crawford Martin and William Pate.

Seven men -- incumbent Robert S. Calvert, Dallas Blankenship, R. G. Pendleton, William J. Roberts, Stanford S. Smith, Vernon Smith and James Wilson -- are seeking the office of Comptroller of Public Accounts. For State treasurer are Lauro Cruz, incumbent Jesse James, Nolan Robnett, Baker Rudolph, Eric Smylie and Odie A. Weldon.

Unopposed are Bob Armstrong for Commissioner of General Land Office; Joe Greenhill for Chief Justice, Supreme Court; Price Daniel for Associate Justice Supreme Court, Place 1; Sam Johnson for Associate Justice Supreme Court, Place 2; and Wendell A. Odom for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals.

Incumbent John C. White seeks to return as Commissioner of Agriculture. He is opposed by Carl A. Bell.

State Senator Max Sherman, representing the 31st District, is unopposed in his bid to return to Austin as is Bill Clayton, State Representative from the 74th District.

James H. Whiteside is seeking election to the State Board of Education and James A. Ellis for Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 7th Supreme Judicial District.

Also on the ballot is a public opinion referendum which may be voted for or against. The referendum states: "No public school student shall because of his race, creed, or color, be assigned to or required to attend a particular school. This referendum applies to the required busing of public school students and provides for equal quality education for all public school students."

In the Republican Primary, incumbent John G. Tower is seeking re-election to the U. S. Senate.

On the ballot for governor are David Reagan, John A. Hall, Joseph Alton Jenkins, Albert Bel Fay, Henry C. Grover and B. Thomas McElroy.

Running unopposed are Maurice Angly, Jr. for state treasurer, Jim Segrest for Railroad Commissioner and Forest W. Osborn for County Commissioner, Precinct 1.

On the GOP Primary ballot is a referendum on forced school busing and a for or against vote on Daylight Savings Time.

Bank Deposits Show Increase

Deposits at Bovina's First State Bank has climbed almost half a million over this time last year as of the time of the bank's "official call" April 18.

This figure and others is revealed in the bank's official statement of condition which appears in this week's issue of The Blade.

Total deposit figures -- \$4,036,437.64 -- were up \$465,892.79 over the same period of a year ago, April 20, 1971, when total deposits were \$3,570,544.85.

Loans were up slightly from last year's \$2,510,451.92 to \$2,751,069.32.

The April 18 total deposit figure was down slightly from the total of \$4,230,141.22 at the close of business on Dec. 30, 1971, with loan figures showing a slight increase from the \$2,393,311.26 mark in Dec. '71.

Jack Kassahn, president of the bank, attributed the increase in deposits to general agricultural conditions, including cattle prices.

The bank's official statement of conditions will appear in next week's issue of The Blade.

She is a graduate of Bovina High School and has attended Texas Tech University and Commercial College of Lubbock.

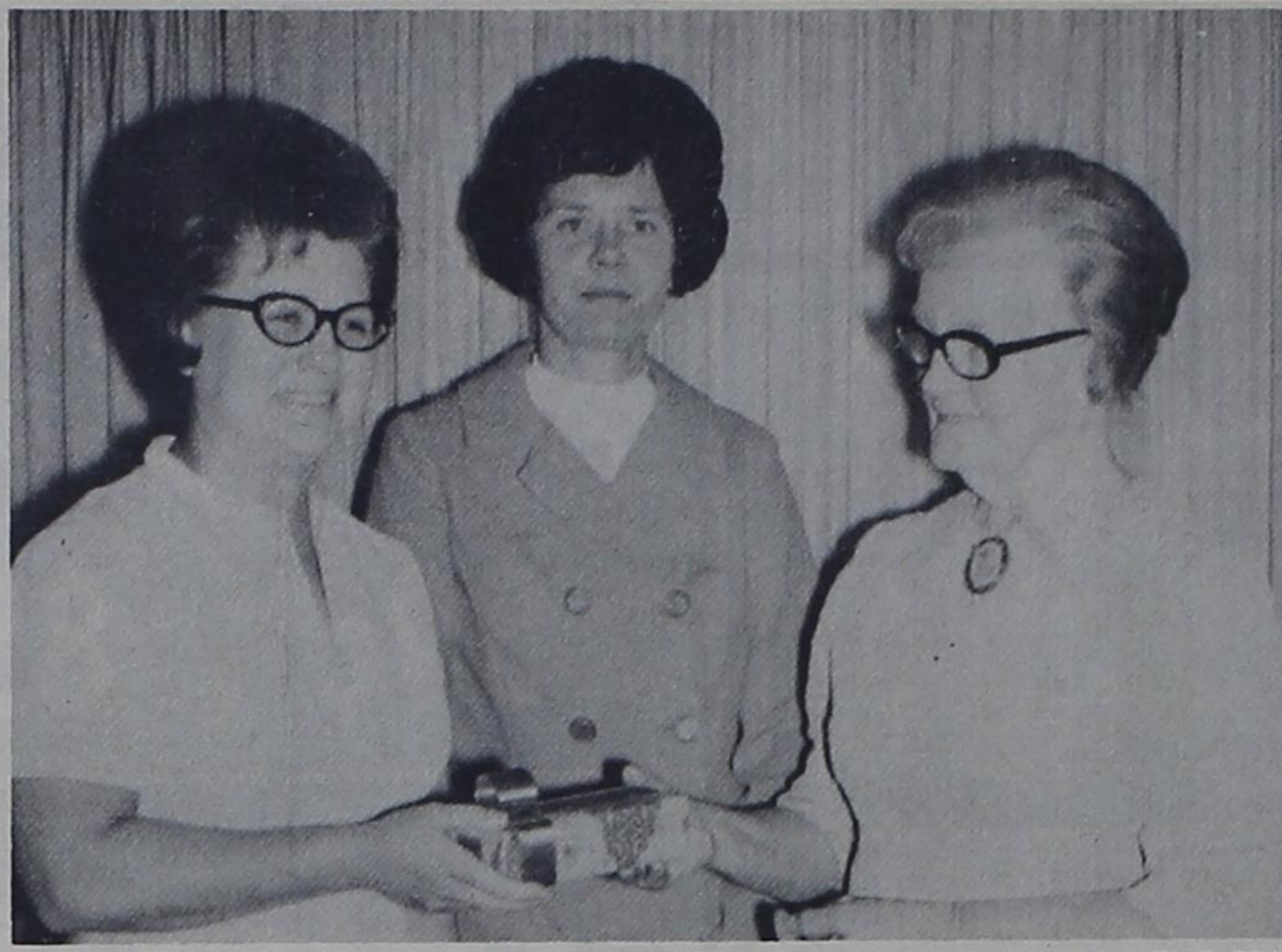
Sudderth attended Bovina Schools and is employed at Stewart & Stevenson's Company in Lubbock.

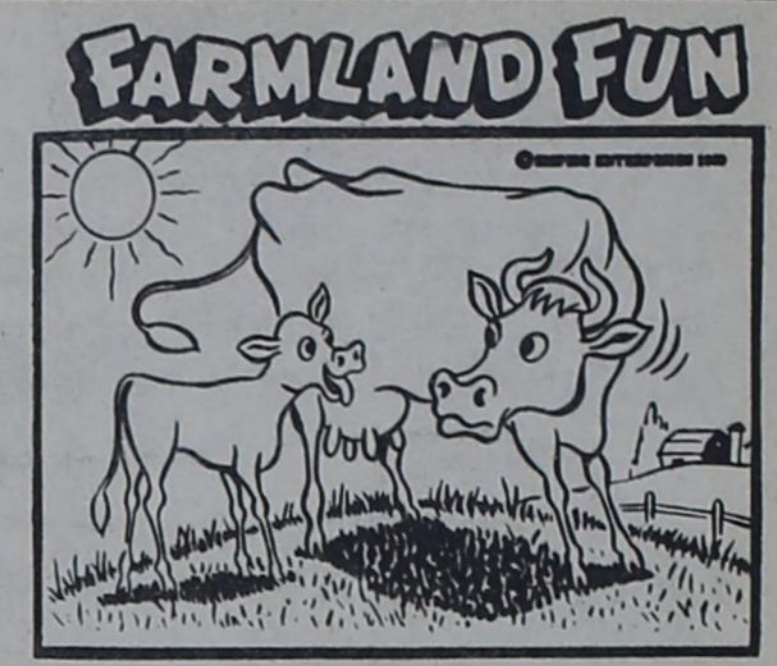
3 Special Ed Students Win Blue Ribbons

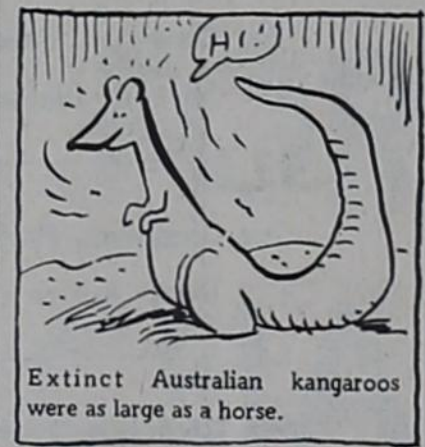

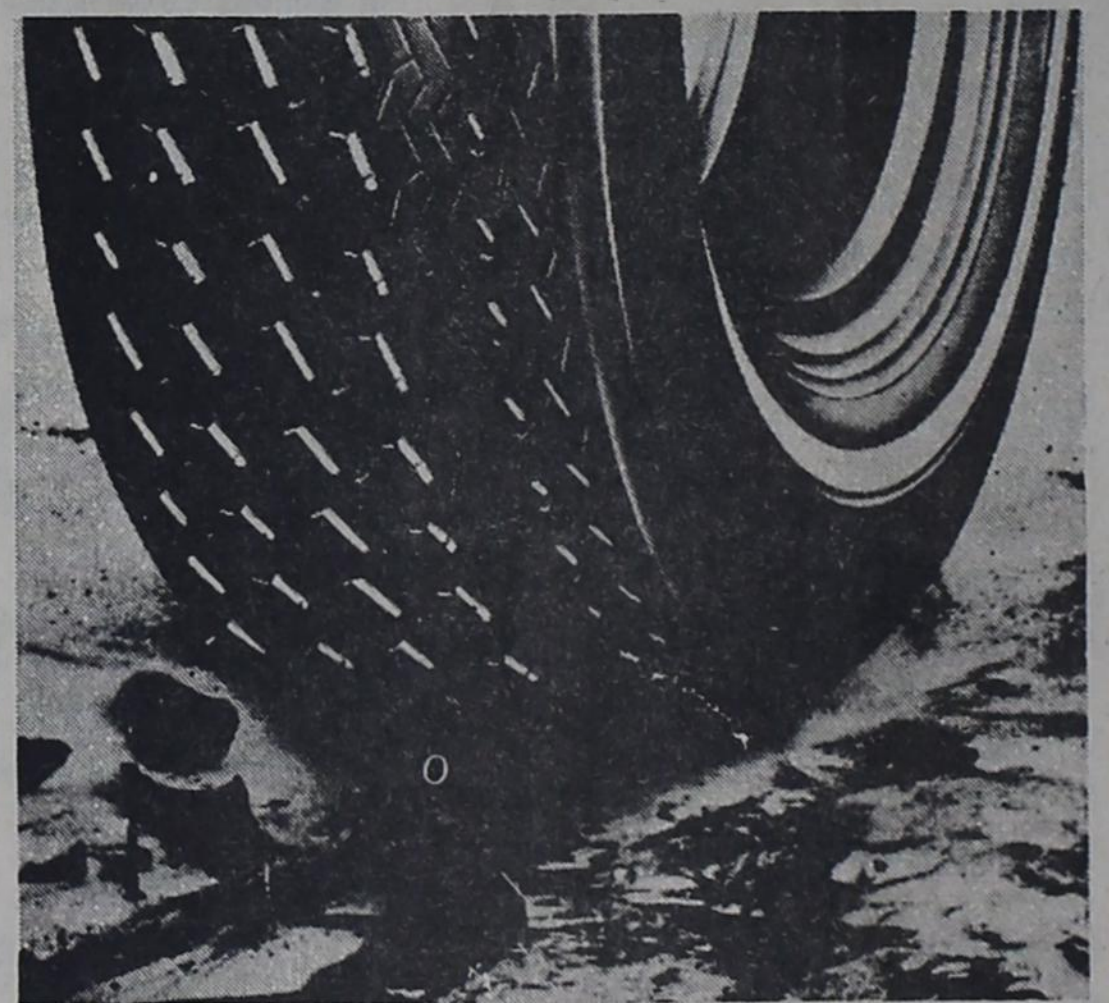
