Finn Claims Of New Wins Are Advanced

Patrol of Nine Men Said to Have Wiped Out 700 Russians

COPENHAGEN, Dec. 18. (AP). Norwegian reports from Northern Finland today described forest fighting in which a patrol of nine Finnish soldiers was said to have killed 700 Russians in an exposed

highway position.
Exhausted Finnish soldiers crossing into Norway told how small patrols equipped with machine guns and light field guns were harassing the Russian advance in the north.

HELSINKI, De. 18. (AP) - Destruction of three Soviet "land battleships"-30-ton tanks-was reported last night by a Finnish army communique which said three other tanks and a motorized column had been smashed by field batteries on the shores of Lake Ladoga.

The communique, reporting bitter fighting, declared 30 Russian tanks had been sent to the scrap heap in the past two days.

Fighting was particularly intense north of Lake Ladoga, where the Red army has attempted to outflank Finland's "Mannerheim line," but the Finnish army declared all the attacks had been repulsed. Success on other fronts also was reported by the communique which

"In the vicinity of Limola two enemy battalions were dispersed. In the vicinity of Tolvajarvi our own advance slowly continued. Fierce fighting took place all day in the area of Aeglaejarvi.

"Certain batteries along Ladoga destroyed three tanks and an enemy

motorized column. bombing raids were undertaken. Our own air forces during the day bombing, among other things, an enemy tank detach-

ment near the firing line." Battle reports encouraging to Finland came from the frigid northern front where Russian forces were said to have faltered before the fortifications of Salmijarvi near the Norwegian frontier.

Finnish troops were making a determined stand there in Arctic darkness with the temperature 13 degrees below zero.

President Kyosti Kallio, broadcasting to Finland's armed forces, appealed to the world for "substantial aid" against the Russian in-

"There is , no need of protesting our innocence regarding the out-break of this war," the President

"The League of Nations, in which 49 nations are represented, unanimously branded Russia the aggressor and 40 of these states condemned the Soviets with expulsion. Not a voice was raised in their defense.
"We note these circumstances

with great satisfaction and await measures against the aggressor by states which are members of the League. We are deeply grateful for the sympathy accorded us, but everyone grasps that in modern warfare the decision lies with in-struments of defense and the men ahead below 3,150 feet in anhywho use them.

"We need more active help than that so far obtained."

Officers May Be Released By Officials

Personal Pledges to Remain Out of War Will Be Necessary

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 18 (AP)-A high Argentine official said today that 1,039 crewmen of the sunken German battleship Graf Spee, who arrived here today, would be interned.

Officers of the battleship, now a mass of tangled wreckage in the Plate river, near Montevideo, the official said, probably would be released on their personal pledges not to participate in the European

Officers recalled a similar case in 1914 when Argentina interned the crew of a German ship but released the officers

A German embassy spokesman announced "more than 1,000" members of the battleship's crew had arrived in port.



by waiting allied warships. Captain Langsdorff, in a state-ment issued through the German said the refusal of the Uruguayan government to give him ample time left him no alternative but to sink the Graf Spee and save the crew from British warship guns.

Whether all were saved was not immediately known. The Graf Spee sank in 25 feet of water, her upper works still show-ed above the surface after she had settled to the bottom.
