## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### Johnson for President

The big question so far as state politics are concerned at the present is whom will Texas Democrats send to the National Convention as a spokesman.

Will be it Lyndon Johnson or Republican-acting Allan Shivers?

Shivers, as you will remember, led the delegation in 1952. After the convention, he returned home and campaigned for the Republican Party and had his name placed on the Republican ticket.

Do you, as a Democrat, want a man who has betrayed the party in such a manner to represent you at the National Convention?

Shivers has said and some local people agree with him that precedent is violated when a favorite son is also chairman of the delegation.

Former Congressman Charles L. South, who is director of the Lyndon Johnson state headquarters, answers this statement by "Veteran Land Scandals" Shivers by saying, "The man whose memory was so conveniently short was himself present at the 1952 convention when no less than four favorite sons were actively on the floor and chairmen of their delegations. Paul Devers of Massachusetts not only was favorite son and chairman, but was keynote speaker. Brian McMahon of Connecticut, James Murray of Montana, and G. Mennen Williams all held dual roles in 1952. Further back in the party's history, William Jennings Bryan led his delegation and was nominated for the presidency in 1896."

Shivers' coming out with a statement like that, which is so easily proven incorrect, is proof enough to us that he is "grabbing at straws."

Something that is of interest is the fact that Democratic leaders don't seem to be angry with Shivers. They have an attitude of "Let's welcome Mr. Shivers to the Republican Party and forget him."

We're for it.

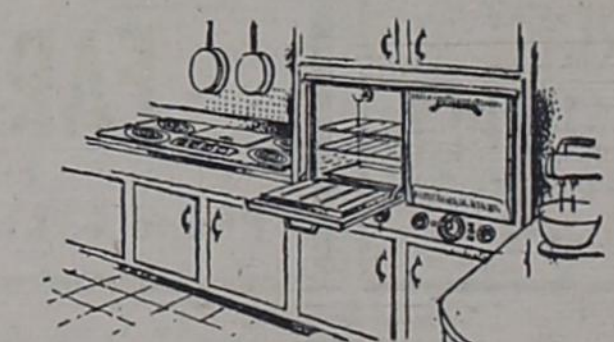
