

Wedemeyer Says More GIs Needed

Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer said Saturday the United States would help pour Chinese National troops into Manchuria and would have to increase American forces in China by possibly 4,000 men.

The commander of U.S. forces in China did not specify whether ships or planes would be used, telling a press conference that details still were "under consideration."

Wedemeyer declared, however that American troops would go along with Central Government to supervise debarkation, handle supply problems and give other aid in line with America's broadened China policy.

NUERNBERG -(P)- Details of the Mussolini kidnapping were dis-closed by Lt. Col. Otto Skorzeny, Gestapo hatchetman who was assigned personally by Adolf Hitler to abduct his Axis partner from the forces of Marshal Pietro Bado-

Skorzeny, a six - foot - four - inch giant, is a prisoner here.

Fifty paratroopers were assigned to him by Col. Gen. Kurt Student, he said, and they took off from Rome Sept. 12, 1943 in a number of planes during an Allied air at-

Their destination was the Sports Hotel on Gran Sasso Mountan, where Il Duce was being held pri-

"A parachute jump from such heights on such a small target seemed not feasible," Skorzeny "x x x Although this was against strict orders from Gen. Student, we decided that a crash was the only possible solution. We landed, partly damaged, 15 meters from the hotel. Two more planes followed our example.

The guards were overcome. A few shots were fired, but the Ita-lian colonel in command realized numerical superiority and did not put up much resistance."



Winters Foresees No Immediate Pension Cut

AUSTIN - (A) - John Winters, executive director of the Depart-Soak rusty garden tools in kero-ment of Public Welfare foresees no immediate cut in average Texas pension payments but expressed doubt as to how long a cut can be stalled off.

Checks to 175,804 pensioners, averaging approximately \$24.65, will e placed in the mails Jan. 2, Winters said after a conference with Gov. Coke R. Stevenson. There has been an increase of 1,355 pension-ers this month but Winters said enough funds were in sight to pay January checks without a reduc-Stevenson told a press conference

that a 40 cent cut in the average check might soon be necessary, probably for February. Winters agreed that this was likely but that factors bearing on future payments were still uncertain.
Increased payments in January amount to \$62,812, Winters said.







If this Nation is to remain great t must bear in mind now and in the future that war is not the choice of those who wish passionately for peace. It is the choice of those who are willing to resort to violence for political advantage. We can fortify ourselves against disaster. I am convinced by the measures I have here outlined. In these protections we can face the future with a reasonable hope for that even though the worst may come, we are prepared for it.

As President Washington said in his message to Congress of 3 December 1793:

"I cannot recommend to your notice measures for the fulfillment of our duties to the rest of the world, without again pressing upon you the necessity of placing ourselves in a position of complete defense, and of exacting from them the fulfillment of the duties towards us. The United States ought not to indulge a persuasion that contrary to the order of human efforts, they will forever keep at a distance those painful appeals to arms, with which the history of every other nation abounds. There is a rank due to the United States among nations, which will be withheld, if not absolutely lost, by the reputation of weakness-if we desire to avoid insult we must be ready to repel it; if we desire to secure peace, one of the most powerful institutions of our rising prosperity, it must be known that we are at all times ready for war."

Physicians To Care For Michigan Vets At U. S. Expense

WASHINGTON-(AP)- The Vetrans Administration announced Friday an arrangement under which Michigan war veterans may receive "home town care" by doctors of their choice at government expense. Limited to veterans with service-

onnected disabilities, the contract with the Michigan State Medical Society is the first of its kind, said Gen. Omar N. Bradley, veterans administrator. If the plan succeeds n Michigan he added, it will be extended to other states. A primary purpose is to ease

critical pressure on Veterans Administration hospitals The announcement said the Veterans Administration also is arranging for veterans to enter Michi-

gan private hospitals.

Physicians' fees have been standardized and will be paid by the Veterans' Administration. More than 400 are on an approved list. Federal law specifies that veterans with disabilities not traceable to military service can be treated only if space is available for them in Veterans Administration institutions and they have no money with which to pay a private physician. Of 88,000 veterans now receiving government care, about 60,000 have non-service ailments.



How Farm Land Prices Have Gone Up



The map above shows how farm real estate values have steadily moved up, according to figures of the U. S. Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Figures on map show the percentage change in average value per acre from the 1935-39 average to the level of November 1945. The average increase for the United States as a whole was 60 per cent, putting farm land values less than one-fourth below the 1920 inflation peak. In South Carolina, Kentucky and Colorado average acre values are more than double the 1935-39 averages. Values are up more than 90 per cent in Tennessee and 80 per cent in Indiana, North Carolina, Georgia, Arkansas, Montana and Wyoming.







The Gas Is Conditioned for

In the previous chapter we saw how natural gas travels from a well through a meter house, through a field gathering line, and through a compressor station where it was squeezed into smaller space. Now what happens to it next?

Before starting on its long journey, the gas passes through a Gasoline and Dehydration Plant adjacent to the field compressor station. This plant removes gasoline and moisture from the gas to increase the efficiency of the pipe line system. If the gasoline were not removed, it would condense out in low spots in the pipe line and decrease the line's capacity. If the moisture, which is produced in vapor form with the gas, were not removed, it would, under certain pressure and temperature conditions, form "hydrates" which are similar to slushy ice. When formed, these hydrates accumulate in the pipe line, regulators and other facilities and restrict or stop the flow of gas.

The most important piece of equipment at the Gasoline and Dehydration Plant is the highpressure absorption tower, 75 feet tall and

weighing 123,000 pounds, which is used in our sketch to represent the plant. Actually, the plant consists of several buildings, steam boilers, heat exchangers, stabilizers, dephlegmators, generating plant, compressors, many pumps, and other auxiliary equipment, all quite complicated and scientific. The gas itself passes through only the absorption tower where the gasoline is removed by the use of absorption oil and the moisture is removed by the use of diethylene glycol, a liquid chemical which has a strong affinity for water. The absorption oil and the diethylene glycol are purified and used again, in continuous cycles.

Another advantage gained by drying or "dehydrating" the gas is that internal corrosion of the pipe line is held to a minimum, thereby reducing the roughening of pipe walls and the formation of scale and dust.

After passing through the Gasoline and Dehydration Plant, the gas flows into the highpressure pipe line. This is the main transmission line which brings the gas across the country to your city and other cities, passing through one or more additional compressor stations on its






