

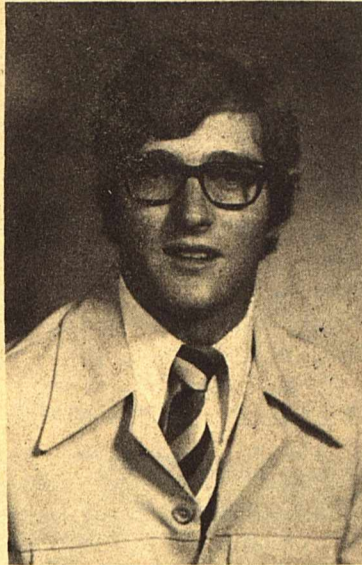

Clifton took first place at region and Reagan County was third.

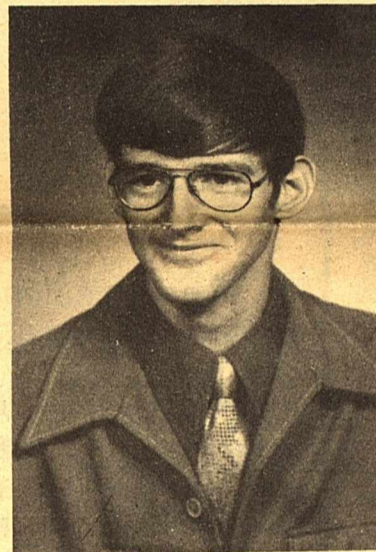

Best Use of America's Resources

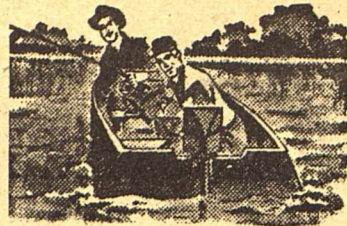
Along with several of my colleagues in Congress, I recently signed a letter to Joseph Califano, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, urging him to approve some proposed regulations which would greatly help the 28 million disabled citizens in our country. The regulations, for Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, will provide that handicapped persons will not be discriminated against or excluded from participation in, or the benefits of, any program receiving Federal assistance.

The handicapped people in the United States are subject to forms of discrimination which many of us do not recognize, or are aware of. For example, to someone in a wheel chair, a curb can be a major obstacle. For those Americans who otherwise might have limited or no use of their legs, stairs become barriers which prevent a person's full participation in many of the benefits and pleasures of our society. In recent years, our society has become more conscious of the need to involve fully these people in our society, and subtle changes, such as the creation of ramps on curbs for wheel chairs and

braille notations near elevators demonstrate the increasing awareness of the special needs of those who have some sort of physical disability.

What I and my colleagues are urging the Secretary of HEW to do is to eliminate some of the more insidious forms of discrimination which exist, namely in the participation in federally assisted programs. For example, the new regulations provide for interpreters for the deaf in health and welfare service agencies, thus eliminating the obstacle that communication has previously presented.

President Carter has taken a strong stand on the question of human rights; surely the handicapped have rights, too, and have much to offer our country. They are no less entitled to the benefits of our society than anyone else, and it would be in the best traditions of our country to knock down some of the barriers that still exist for this segment of our people. Such a stand by the Carter administration would be consistent with its own concern for human rights, and would do much toward giving disabled Americans an opportunity to participate fully in our world.

MEAT EATING NOT
REALLY SO HIGH

Consumption of red meat in America is really not as high as most people think, says a livestock marketing specialist. Although the wholesale weight of meat consumed by the average American was at a record 129 pounds in 1976, the actual amount consumed was only 67 pounds. This allows for loss from trimming the meat and from cooking. The average American consumed about two ounces of cooked beef daily last year. By including lamb, veal and pork on the same basis, consumption averaged just under three ounces of red meat daily.

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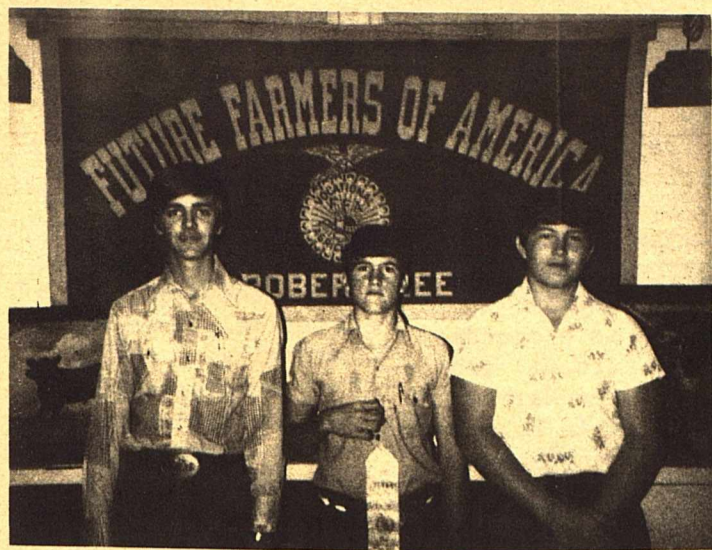

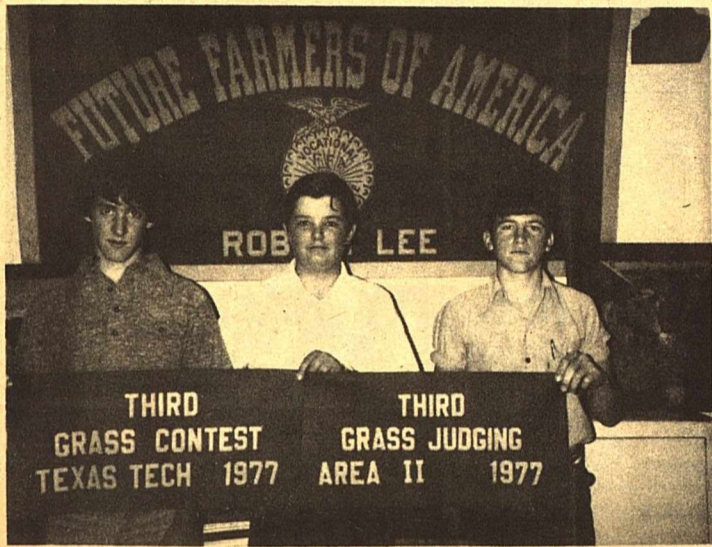

sic education. School programs which she wrote and directed, with all the grade school involved, were always a huge success and will long be remembered.

BI-CENTENNIAL

"Lucile was the moving force of the Bi-Centennial celebration in Robert Lee. She served as chairman of the Bi-Centennial committee and was primarily responsible for our being recognized as a State and National Bi-Centennial City.

"She was the "push" behind most of our Bi-Centennial projects. Robert Lee's logo was started and most of it designed by her. She promotes and urges the sale and use of the American Flag. It is her desire to make Robert Lee a city of flags.

"One project was the pageant which she wrote and directed, a play depicting early days in Coke County. The play was presented Aug. 27 and 28 to a full house each night. The play involved over 100 persons of all ages from all over the county, plus a few ex-Coke countians. It was a huge undertaking but was a real success.

NURSING HOME

"She visits and plays the piano for residents of the West Coke County Nursing Home. Until recently she scheduled the monthly birthday parties for the residents. She did the laundry for one man who did not have a family near; plus doing laundry for others as needed.

"She has collected

money and gifts for residents of the Carlsbad Center for years and takes a group of ladies to wrap Christmas gifts for the residents each year. She made arrangements for their choir to sing in Robert Lee and collects and delivers donated supplies for their craft shop.

"Among her other accomplishments: She is secretary of the Coke County Historical Committee and actively promoted and worked for the library. She is a member and immediate past president of the '64 Study Club and a member of the Federation of a district committee of the Federation of Women's Clubs.

"She is a member of the United Methodist Church where she is church organist, teaches a young children's Sunday School class, is a member of the Administrative Board and Junior Choir director. She is a member of the Coke County Senior Citizens' Advisory Committee and served as first president of the local senior citizens group. She still assists with the monthly Senior Citizens luncheons."

In addition to her many "outside" duties, Lucile is the wife of Wilson Bryan, prominent Robert Lee businessman and civic leader, and the mother of three grown children. She is also a grandmother.

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of Cisco Junior College who have been named to 'Who's Who' represent some of our very finest here on the campus, as they are representatives of some 1300

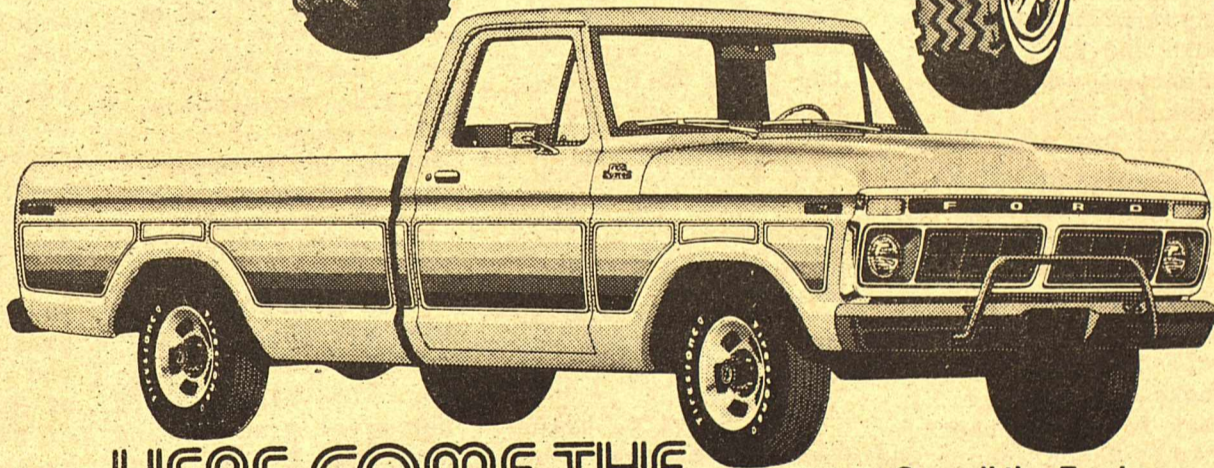
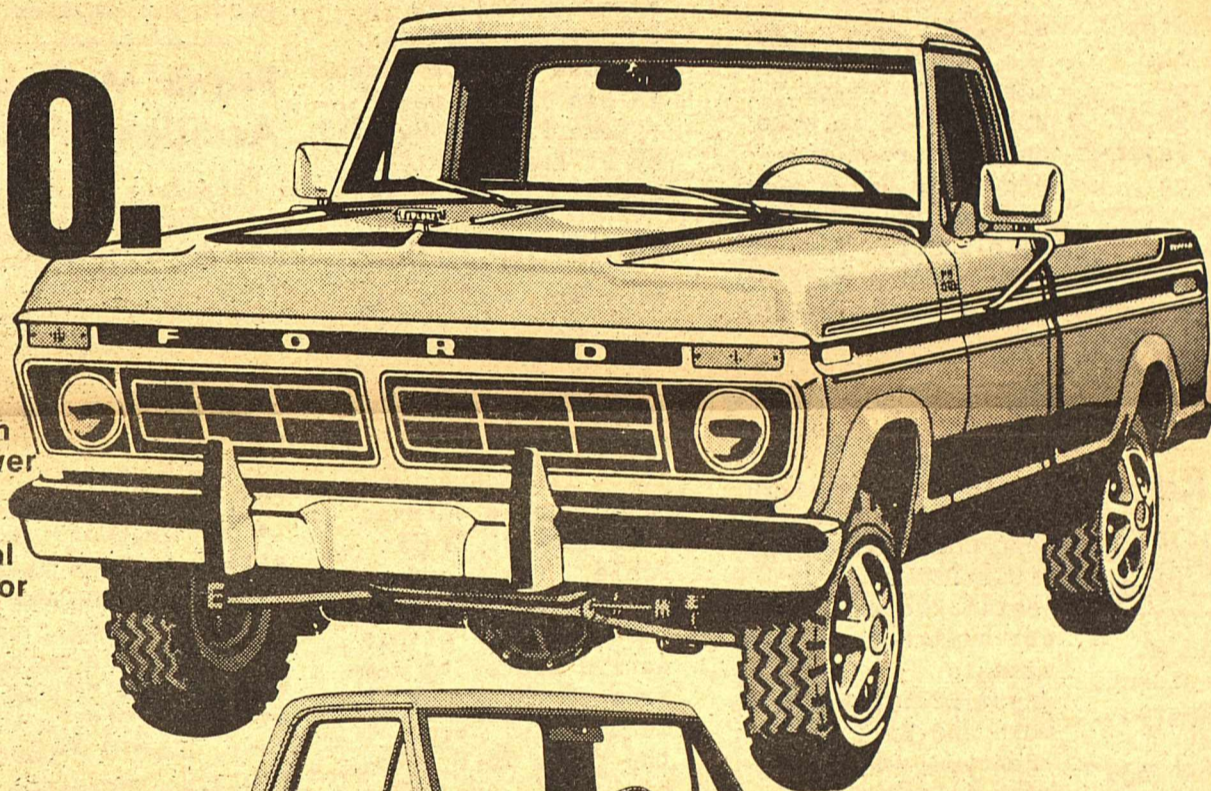

2,192 ARRESTS FOR NO FISHING LICENSE

A good indication that spring has come to Texas is the number of cases Parks and Wildlife Department game wardens make for failure to have a fishing license.

By the end of March, P&WD wardens had filed 2,192 arrests on anglers who lacked the \$4.25 license. Fines for such offenses usually average \$25, depending on local justices of the peace.

Revenue from the sale of licenses also continues to decline.

License sales officials at the Parks and Wildlife Department say a total of 386,044 fishing licenses had been sold for the period September 1976 through March 1977, a drop of 76,962 for the same period a year ago. The decline represents a loss of some \$308,000 to the P&WD.

Combination hunting and fishing licenses also have declined during the September-March period by 12,511 representing some \$106,000.

PLANT CROSSING

Home gardeners concerned about cucumbers, watermelons, cantaloupes and squash crossbreeding and producing fruit that is off-flavored and off-colored need not worry, says a specialist with the Extension Service. The interchange of pollen among members of the cucurbit family does not affect the genetic makeup or the flavor or color of the fruit as it develops. However, the genes of the seed within the fruit are affected by cross-pollination of these plant cousins, so plants grown from seed of the fruit would show the difference.

TOURISTS SPEND MONEY IN COKE

Coke County received \$587,000 of the state's \$5,306,118,000 travel receipts in 1975, a national study commissioned by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed.

In addition to gross receipts, the study found that Coke County had 11 of the state's 207,676 travel-related jobs, with an annual payroll of \$79,000.

It also estimated \$23,000 in State and \$7,000 in local taxes were paid by visitors.

The study was done by the U. S. Travel Data Center in Washington, D. C., an independent travel research organization funded jointly by public and private sectors.

It was based on the Center's Travel Economic Impact Model, which for the first time, breaks out a state's share of the national travel market on a county-by-county basis.

The model measures the economic impact of all travel involving overnight trips away from home, and day trips at least 100 miles or more from home. Thus it includes travel by Texans as well as out-of-state visitors, for all purposes. It includes estimates of the traveler's spending at home in preparation for the trip, his spending enroute, and that at his destination.

ONLY 8 SCREWORM CASES IN STATE

The eight laboratory confirmed screwworm samples collected in Texas through April this year compare to 856 for the same period of 1976, says Dr. M.E. (Cotton) Meadows Jr.

Only two known screwworm cases were treated in Texas during April, compared to 631 for the same month last year, says the veterinarian in charge of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Screwworm Eradication Program.

"All indications are that the 'Mission'77: Stamp Out Screwworms Program is working," says Meadows. He warns, however, that fly trap studies show south Texas is coming under increasing pressure from wild flies migrating north from Mexico.

"Stamp out Screwworms" (SOS) committees in most Texas counties are working in the campaign to eradicate screwworms from Texas forever this year. County SOS chairmen met with technical personnel April 28 in San Antonio to coordinate screwworm eradication efforts.

Female screwworm flies deposit their eggs on wounds in warm blooded animals. As eggs hatch the emerging maggots enter the wound to feed on living flesh. Repeated infestations, if untreated, can and often do end with death of the host animal.

The many pronged effort to eradicate screwworms in Texas is based on rancher care of animals, treatment of wounds and collection of samples; coupled with release of sterile but sexually active screwworm flies.

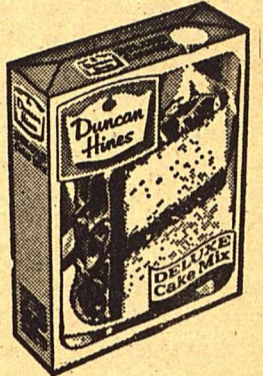

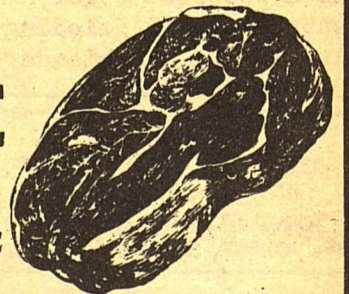
