MICE DAMAGE YOUNG TREES

Expert of Ohio College of Agriculture Recommends Removal of All Litter Around Trunks.

such position that it may thoroughly The damage to trees, particularly young trees, from the gnawing of mice during the winter time is very great. Last winter in particular there was an unusual abundance of field mice. When the snow thawed, the burrows. of mice could be seen extending in all directions.

Many young trees planted in sod or where manure or mulch came closely around their bases, were completely girdled by these pests. As a precautionary measure Professor Paddock of the Ohio College of Agriculture recommends that litter of all kinds be removed from around the trunks of young trees, and that a six-inch mound of earth be thrown about the trunks of such trees. This protection of earth drain with the mouth portion open or also safeguards to a certain extent free, and whereby the bottle may be against winter injury.

HOSPITAL IN HISTORY

INSTITUTIONS HAVE KNOWN FROM EARLY TIMES.

Before the Christian Era the Care of the Afflicted Was Considered a Public Duty - Philadelphia Had First in America.

The first hospital established in America was opened in Philadelphia on February 7, 1750. For nearly two years Benjamin Franklin and other influential men were working for the establishment of such an institution. A charter was granted in May, 1751, and the first board of trustees was elected the July following.

The day of the opening a number of patients were admitted who were regularly attended and given their medicine free. Joshua Crosby was the first president and Benjamin Franklin the first clerk.

The second hospital established was in New York in 1771. From these early beginnings there has now grown up in the United States a veritable forest of hospitals. Every city, town and village has its duly appointed institutions of this character, and the hospitals of the United States are now acknowledged the most handsomely and thoroughly equipped in the world, and serve as models for European ar-

Hospitals were founded in very early times. India, Persia and Arabia had hospitals supported by their kings and rulers before the Christian era. As far back as the earliest period in Greek history the sick are said to have been treated in the Temple of Aesculapius at Epidaurus. In the early Jewish period a house



Some trees and shrubs are loaded every season with plant lice. On those affected last year one is likely to find now small, black, shiny eggs at the end of twigs. These can be eeen on fruit and other trees, various ornamental shrubs, and particularly on the buckthorn. As soon as the ten der leaves begin to unfold on this shrub the eggs batch, and the leaves shortly become loaded with lice.

> Why not, therefore, trim hedges and shrubs now, and burn the trimmings burn as well all prunings of fruit trees? It is very well known that plant lice increase at a tremendous rate when once started, therefore each egg destroyed now means the death of hundreds of lice and the consequent lessening of the work of spraying later.

First Point Is to Remove All Weeds. Brush and Trees.

Excellent Results Can Be Obtained by Pasturing Goats and Sheep--Source of Income Themselves and Save Much Labor.

The first point in improving the pasture is to rid it of all weeds, brush and shade trees or some other purpose. H. W. Swope writes in Farm Life.

This can be done by grubbing, firing and pasturing by goats and sheep. Excellent grazing lands can be made to produce which otherwise are only a burden to the farmer. The practice of pasturing with goats to clean up the weeds, brush and to kill the stripling trees can be profitably managed. They not only save the cost of labor, but are an increasing source of income

themselves. I have seen hundreds of acres of pasture land reclaimed in this way and with a profit to the farmer. Another method of improvement

which could be practiced much more than it is, would be to mow the pasfore they go to seed, and, secondly, to get rid of the overripe and undesirable

pasture grass. Often the weeds can be controlled in this way, except those that reproduce by means of underground stems. In this case continuous grubbing is the only sure method of complete eradica-

Mowing down the ripe or dry grass not only rids the pasture of food that the cattle will not eat in most cases, but invigorates a new growth of green leaves at a time when otherwise there would be but little good grass obtainable. More general mowing of our pasture lands where mowing is needed would result in more available pasture during harvest time or shortly after when there is often a lack of green grazing.

SELECTING WOOD LOT TREES

Straight, Quick-Growing. Clear-Boled deep straw and are either crushed by Trees Should Be Kept to Grow to Large Size.

The trees selected for fuel should poor trees.

The straight, quick-growing, long, clear-boled trees should be kept to grow to large size, and the crooked, and pigs. broken, dead-topped, suppressed and diseased individuals, which will not be missed, should be removed.

It is common to see in wood lots old trees of poor form occupying space a half-dozen thrifty trees should occupy because no one had the courage to re move them. Such trees should be the first to be cut.

Mulch Furnishes Splendid Nest for Rodents Which Are Sure to Injure Young Trees.

One of the indispensable things in transplanting is mulching, always to done in spring. Straw of any kind placed on the surface of the ground eight or ten inches thick and extending three or four feet on each side of the tree will retain the moisture and help it to grow-save its life even, in a very dry summer. But in the winter the mulch furnishes a good trees which are not to be used for abiding place for ground mice which are sure to injure the young trees, or such as protection, windbreak, etc., kill them, by gnawing the bark. In fall or early winter this must be looked after and the mulch removed a foot or more from the stem of the tree. A few shovelfuls of earthnothing but earth, no grass or weeds with it-placed around the tree will be a perfect protection, as the little animals do not work in fresh soil.





The ears. are slightly larger and the face longer in some strains than in others, but the best type has ears of moderate fineness and with a rather short, slightly dished face.

Chester White swine, also a United States breed, are of the lard or fat They have pendent ears and large, long bodies, and reach heavy weights. They are good feeders and breeders. The Chester White is one of the most proline of the lard breeds.

The Berkshire breed is of a medium to lard type, having length and depth with less width of body. They have erect ears and strongly dished face. This breed is of English origin and is black, with white feet and a little white in face and on tail, making "six white points."

It will pay to remember that it is best to plant-Large pieces, at least from

Products Properly Belong in Any Thorough System of Mixed Farming-Should Pay Well.

It is time for progressive farmers, especially those with small places near town, to get ready for money-making with fruits. These products properly belong in any thorough system of mixed farming, and they can be made

to pay \$200 to \$400 an acre net. Small-fruit growing is peculiarly adapted to those having large families. Small fruits well planted in perfectly straight rows and kept well cultivated make a most pleasing picture as well as a profitable crop. A fruit garden connected with any home can be made an attractive object. Many people would be more pleased with such a garden than they would with an art gallery, a church organ or daily concerts.

From a commercial standpoint, for the beginner, there is no crop that will roll back the corners of a mortgage quicker than the strawberry bed if enough is planted so that the whole family and neighbors can be employed especially in picking time. Fit the ground early in April the same as for corn. Mark one way as for corn; then set the plants about sixteen inches apart and cultivate as for corn, and hoe whenever there is a sign of weeds or crusty soil. It takes about seven thousand plants per acre when set as directed. When the blossoms appear the first summer pinch them off. Do not try to secure fruit until the second season .- Green's Fruit Grower.

HOW TO SELECT SEED BEANS

Where There Are No Clean Pods In Your Own Crop Try and Secure Some From Your Neighbor.

Get seed from your own crop if possible. If there are no clean pods in your own crop, try to secure clean pods from a more fortunate neighbor. Select in the pod, not after thresh-

Pick pods free from all spots. Spots on the pods mean that anthracnose or bacterial blight may be hidden in the seemingly clean bean.

Thresh selected pods separately. Examine your threshed seed carefully and throw out all doubtful looking beans, especially those that are spotted or shriveled.

Rotate. Den't plant old bean ground next year. Clean seed and rotation are the best crop insurance.

If you have to buy your seed, make sure that it has been selected by the grower from disease-free pods. Examine purchased seed. Do not plant if the threshed seed looks suspicious,





They have also benefited the owners of sound purebred sires because they discourage the use of the unsound, grade, and mongrei stallion.

The results thus far show a gradual increase in the percentage of purebred stallions in service and a decrease in the percentage of grades and mongrels. At the present time there are approximately 58,000 stallions in service in these states, of which more than 50 per cent are licensed as purebred. This indicates that breeders are becoming more particular in the matters of soundness and breeding, and that the owners of stallions who at first were, in some instances, inclined to oppose are now aiding in the en-

FEED FOR FATTENING STEERS

South Dakota Station With Silage and Mill Products.

The South Dakota station reports a test made in which three lots of yearling steers of four head each were fed during a 145-day feeding period, each lot receiving all the silage the steers would eat and 12 pounds of a by-product, this being for lot one oil meal, lot two cotton seed meal, and lot three dried distillers' grains. The average daily gains per head were 2.45, 1.95, and 2.17 pounds, respectively; and during the first ninety days 2.69, 2.08, and 2.48 pounds. The estimated Importance of Good Feeding Is cost per pound of gain was 5.86, 6.44, and 5.5 cents. In two other lots grain was substi-

tuted for one-half, by weight, of the silage fed in the former lots, lot four receiving oats and lot five, corn. The former lot made average daily gains of 2.18 pounds per head, the latter 2.09, and during the first ninety days 2.3 and 2.01 pounds, respectively, costing 6.88 and 8.22 cents per pound of animals without giving them an abun- gain. The average amount of gain for the 146-day feeding period was as follows: Lot one, 19.7 pounds of silage and 1.2 pounds of oil meal; lot two. 21.2 pounds of silage and 1.5 pounds of cotton seed meal; lot three, 20.3 pounds of silage and 1.3 pounds of dried distilled grains; lot four, 10.9 pounds of silage and 4.7 pounds of oats; and lot five, 11.6 pounds of silage and 5.9 pounds of shelled corn.


