

Mr. Nance quoted Mr. Maynard as

"I am not going to invest aynthing until after the election.

"If Mr. Neff is elected I will not want an investment in Texas." The statement was made in Mr. Nance's office in the presence of a number of Plainview people and several of them have reiterated Mr. Nance's declaration to that effect.

Instances are Cited "Mr. Maynard purchased 320 acres of land through my real estate department in February last and came here Monday of this week to buy more Hale County land," Mr. Nance said. "He learned of the proposed graduated land tax advocated by Mr. Neff, one of the candidates for Governor, and be declined to buy a section, consisting of 640 acres, which he came here to close a deal on.

"He left here Wednesday for Kansas, where he has purchased some land and where he said he would buy more. He left me a note which reads, Good-bye Nance.' I suppose he also intends this note to mean good-bye Texas, if Mr. Neff is elected.

"The land Maynard came here to buy is raw undeveloped land and it was priced to him at \$32.50 per acre. He said that he intended buying the land, dividing it into farms and placing outside farmers on it."

A similar situation is reported by men from Castor County who said a party of Pennsylvania men called to that county last week to look at seven section of undeveloped land comprising 4,480 acres. They had agreed to accept the land, but on learning of the proposal to put an extra tax on excess land holding, departed. It was stated in Plainview Thursday that after the election, if Mr. Neff is defeated and the land is still unstold, they will return and make the pur-

Section Developed Fast This section of the State has been largely developed during the past fourteen years. Prior to that time the town of Plainview was fifty miles from a railroad and the lands were barren prairie. They have been settled by outside farmers, many of whom were brought here by the Pierson Syndicate which first settled this district and which bought thousands of acres of land, dug water wells on each tract and sold the land on long

term payments. The people here recognize that this section owes its development to the land companies. Particularly the Pierson Syndicate which blazed the trails, and that any hardship put on outside investments will halt the development of the thousands of remaining acres. This section obtains water at 300 feet and every farm has a well pumped by motors for irrigation, and crops seldom fail. Few farmers are in position to buy undeveloped lands, sink wells and equip the land for cultivation and water supply without the help of outside and abundant capital, which permits them to buy on long terms.

The land plank advocated by Mr. Neff, they say, whether he intends to apply it as he first said to all lands or as he later said to only lands owned by non-residents will handicap the natural growth of this part of the State.
