Omaha, Neb., April 12.—Nebraska today is leading the other six States of the Tenth Federal Reserve Bank District in the sale of the Government's 4 1/2 per cent Treasury saving certificates, and it is all due, in the opinion of L. H. Earhart, cashier of the local Federal Reserve branch bank, to advertising.

As a governmental experiment in the value of printer's ink, Omaha was selected as one of the four cities in which space was purchased in local newspapers, boosting the sale of certificates. Page "ads" appeared in Omaha papers last week, and in addition the city was circularized by carriers on their regular mail routes. Results show, Mr. Earhart said, that Government advertising, the same as that of private corporations, pays.

**MICHIGAN NORMAL BARS
WOMEN FROM SMOKING**

Ypsilanti, Mich., April 12.—Seventeen women students at the Michigan State Normal College have been asked to leave the institution and thirteen others have been placed on probation, it was learned today, as the result of alleged infractions of school regulations.

Coincident with this information a proclamation was issued by Charles McKinney, president, and Mrs. Bessie Leach Priddy, dean of women, to faculty members, citing a list of things that are forbidden at the

school. "The college will not knowingly permit any young woman to remain in the school, much less graduate her, who smokes tobacco," the proclamation stated.

Evasions of closing hours, automobile riding without permission, attentions from strange men and "gaining access to rooming houses by way of windows" also are on the list of forbidden adventures.

Congressman Wurzbach of San Antonio made a speech to the "high-toned" negro population of Washington City recently, and he told them that he is the representative of a negro in Texas, as he lived in a county where there are more negroes than any other race. He also promised to aid the negroes in any way he could. Some of the speakers then asked him to have the "Jim Crow Law" in Texas repealed. Well, whenever Congressman Wurzbach tries that he will not be representing his Seguin negroes any longer, much less the negroes of the whole country, as he desires to do.

Under the agreement at the Arms Conference the United States was to reduce its armament, but there is a strong protest to also reduce the personnel of the navy, and there has just been voted a measure in the Lower House which maintains a large number. President Harding gave the deciding influence in favor of the larger personnel, which action is not in harmony with his professed pleas for economy. The trouble is, that the navy "higher ups" wield too much influence among the politicians, Congressmen and Senators to permit the reduction that should be made. With a smaller number of war vessels and no possibility of war for at least ten years, why retain this large personnel?

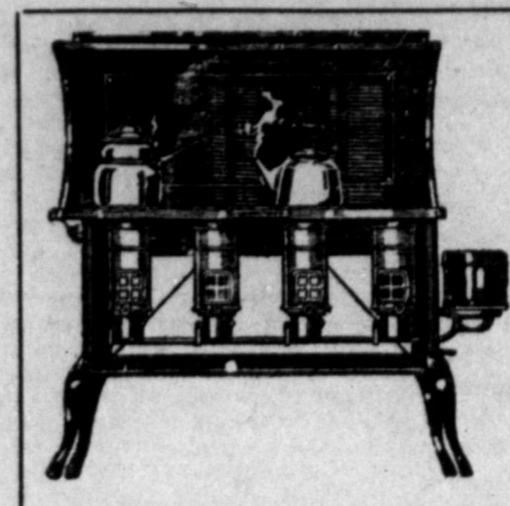
Ex-President Wilson and Ex-Secretary Tumulty are said to be at "outs" and that it has been growing for a number of years. It is claimed that while Mr. Wilson was in Europe, Mr. Tumulty assumed some of the presidential prerogatives, which he also kept up after the serious illness of the then President. Well, let them be at "outs" as it doesn't make any difference now. Somebody made a "bust" at management of the country and caused a majority of seven million against the Democratic party and left a record that it may take a quarter of a century to overcome. However, if the Republicans keep up their antics, the people may wake up sooner to the fact that they also got "bit" when they put those fellows in power.

PROHIBITION IN JAPAN

San Antonio News: Japan has enacted its first prohibition law, which forbids the sale or gift of liquor to minors. It is not likely the Japanese consider this act particularly important. Perhaps the majority does not even know such a prohibition has come to pass. The act is "something, nothing." There are plenty of people in the United States who remember the beginnings of prohibition here. Measures like this Japanese act were put into force, but seemed to have no effect on the growing consumption of liquor. These first assaults on the reign of King Alcohol were regarded as impudent, futile attempts to regulate a business which generally knew no law. The liquor men's error was that they measured such attacks by the effect on their business. What they should have noted was the effect on the American people. More and more, as gains were made the people became aggressive and confident. They curbed here and pinched off there. The outlying and neglected posts were attacked, and through the years strength was accumulated for the onslaught on the citadel. The Japanese may not have considered the fact that, having admitted the need of prohibition for the minor, they have opened the way for prohibition for all. There is no argument for the minor which does not obtain for the adult. The logic of this measure has an inevitable end. It may take years and much contention, but the end is seen from the beginning.

The inevitability of the process is in the fact that prohibition gains never are lost. In the United States, where there was a local-option gain or a State gain it was nearly 100 per cent permanent. Even where a county going "dry" was menaced by a neighboring "wet" county, and the actual drinking hardly was reduced, the dry county stuck to its decision. It is a compliment to the whole prohibition

LONG DELAY EXPECTED IN ACTION OF CONGRESS ON TEXAS HARBOR PLAN

Washington, D. C., April 18.—Another meeting without action on the Texas deep water harbor project reports was held today by the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors. Officers of the board said the reports were considered but decision was not made as to what city would be selected for the harbor improvement.

The next meeting of the board will be held May 16th when it is possible but not certain, said officers, that the city will be selected. It seems to be the general opinion here that Corpus Christi has the best chance. Even if the board reports to Congress at this session with a recommendation that Corpus Christi or any other city be selected it is considered certain that this session of Congress will not make an appropriation for a new Texas port. A special appropriation may be secured at the next session of Congress but this is doubtful. The improvement in all probability will have to wait until the 1924 rivers and harbors appropriation bill and then even Congress may refuse to appropriate money for a new project.

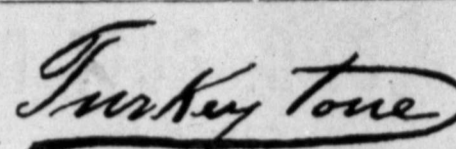

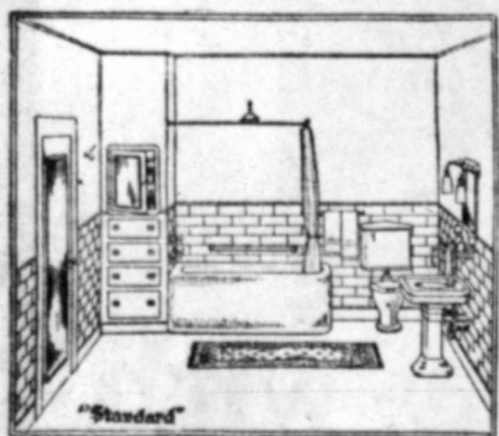

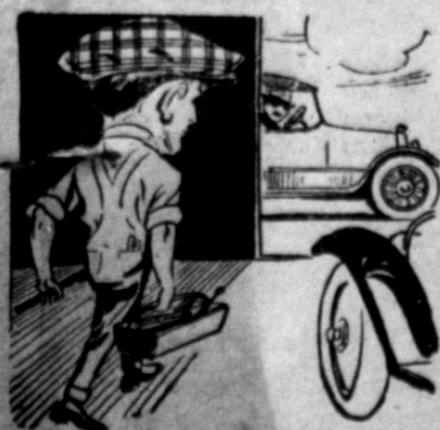

ALL SHOWINGS OF "FATTY" ARBUCKLE FILMS CANCELLED

New York, April 18.—Cancellation of all contracts for the showing of films in which Roscoe (Fatty) Arbuckle appears, was announced today by Will H. Hays, head of the Motion Picture Producers' Association. This action, he said, affected only 10,000 contracts.

"After a consultation with Mr. Nichols Schenck, representing Joseph Schenck, the producers, and Adolph Zukor and Mr. Lasky of the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation, the distributors," Mr. Hays' statement said, "I will state that at my request they have cancelled all showings and all bookings of the Arbuckle films. They do this that the whole matter may have the consideration that its importance warrants, and action is taken notwithstanding the fact that they had nearly 10,000 contracts in force for the Arbuckle pictures."

Fatty's Case Costly

San Francisco, April 15.—The defense of Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle, in the three manslaughter trials in connection with the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, cost more than \$110,000, including attorney's fees, it was learned Friday.

No fees have been received by defense attorneys as yet, it was explained by Gavin McNab, chief coun-

sel for Arbuckle. It was arranged that no financial matters were to be considered "until Arbuckle had been cleared," McNab said.

It is planned to release all of the Arbuckle films that were completed at the time he met with his difficulties here, it was learned. Arbuckle himself has no immediate plans. He refuses to appear in a monologue in theaters here. The offer was made after his acquittal.

"There is a sentimentalism attached to the experience of acquittal that must come before any commercialism. I will return to my profession whenever I consider it proper to do so."

GOVERNMENT WOULD RECOVER MILLIONS FROM LINCOLN MOTOR CO.

Detroit, Mich., April 17.—Suit for \$9,188,561.98 will be entered here today in the Federal Court by the United States Government against the bankrupt Lincoln Motor Company, which brought \$8,000,000 at a receiver's sale recently.

The Government claims the amount asked in the suit was the sum on which the Lincoln Motors was overpaid on war contracts.

Henry Ford purchased the defunct company. The suit does not affect him and is filed against the Detroit Trust Company, receivers for the Lincoln Motors.

ENTIRE \$20,000,000 NOT TO BE USED IN RUSSIAN FAMINE

Washington, D. C., April 18.—Secretary Hoover was understood to have advised President Harding and his Cabinet today that it was probable that not all of the \$20,000,000 appropriation provided by Congress for Russian relief would be needed.

Famine conditions in Russia were reported by Mr. Hoover as improving greatly.

SIXTY-FIVE POUND CATFISH IS CAUGHT NEAR JUNCTION

Junction, Tex., April 18.—A 65-pound catfish was caught here Monday for Porter Hodges, who lives six miles down the river.

This is the largest fish that has been caught in the Llano this year. It is now in cold storage and will be used for a community fish fry Sunday.

MISTAKES WIFE FOR BURGLAR; KILLS HER

Henderson, Tex., April 17.—Mrs. Cliff Donigan, 25, formerly Mrs. Fannie Hendricks of Tatum, Texas, was mistaken for a burglar at 2 o'clock Sunday morning by her husband and was shot once through the stomach, dying in a few moments.

Besides the husband, she leaves a small child.
