There is, Mr. Cordell Hull says, no doubt of it. So that ends it. It is all over. In every State, the report says, Mr. Hull was in conference with the Democratic leaders. At night there would be a dinner, or a banquet, or a mass meeting, or something or other, or all combined. And in every instance the local leaders assured him that there is a revolt against President Harding, a riot against Congress and a wild clamor for the return of one of those old-time Democratic majorities in Congress.

Consequently, Mr. Hull went back to Washington all jazzed up over the outlook, which shows that Mr. Hull is the right sort of a chap for chairman of the Democratic National Committee. He gets right down to bedrock and brass tacks. He knows how to size up a situation and get out of town on the next train. Some chairmen are not like that. We have known politicians who would spend a whole day in consultation with local leaders, attend a banquet with them, speak at a mass meeting or something, and then admit that they didn't know what to think about it. Not that for Mr. Hull. When the Democratic committeeman from Sacketsville was admitted to his room in the hotel and the National Chairman asked him to give him the "inside" on the political situation, Mr. Hull got what he was looking for.

It is customary—as we all knowfor local leaders to tell the National Chairman that there is no chance whatever. Local leaders, in the presence of their superior officers in the party organization, have the habit of putting the darkest possible look on political situations.
