

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

year the entire penitentiary system been greatly improved. Many leaks have been stopped, inhuman punishment has been abolished, a system of education has been established. and the entire penitentiary has been permeated with the idea of obedience to law and service to humanity. After a fair trial, these Commissioners will either make a success of the penitentiary or explain the reason why."

Conversion of flood waters was given attention next. He declared not one bucket of rain water that falls on Texas soil should ever find its way to the sea. This immense volume of water, he said, should be saved for the irrigation of at least 12,000,000 acres of land through a system of lakes that could be established.

He is proud, he said, of the work done recently in extending the State's Highway System. Texas has, he said, 180,000 miles of public roads and 1,-600 miles of this has been highly improved during the past year at a cost of \$21,000,000. Contracts for the building of 1,750 miles of additional high class roadway have been let at a cost of \$27,0000,000. He called for a steady and a rapid progress in highway extension work.

The Governor stoutly defended the cause of labor and called attention to the work of his appointees in the enforcement of all laws passed for the protection of the men and women who toil. The farmer and the stockman, he stated, in a major portion of his speech, must have open markets and everything possible done to aid them to receive full value for their work of production. "I am willing to either push or pull," he said. He recommended additional State parks and praised the National Guard and the Rangers.

Law enforcement was discussed from this well known angle. In connection with this he said there is no such thing as local self government in counties where the laws are violated and the officers unable or unwilling to enforce them. Every law violation, he said, is against the State and not against any county. He admonished his hearers that there must be a stricter regard for the prohibition law and said loose views of the 18th amendment are responsible for st of the crime of the day.

No part of his speech was listened to more carefully than his comments on public officers and his description of the conditions that impelled him to declare martial law at Mexia. He

When the laws in a county are not enforced it is because the local lawenforcing officers are incompetent or, for some reason, are unwilling to enforce them. As to whether a law is a good law or a bad one, is a matter of no official interest to the officer. He makes no laws; he executes them. If he fails in this, he has no business holding office.

"Martial law should be invoked only as a last resort to maintain law and order. During the first of this year, at Mexia, Tex., thieves, robbers, gamblers, bootleggers, thugs and crooks mobilized to ply their trade of lawlessness. These outlaws opened on, unmolested and unhindered. Local officers made no pretense of enforcing the law. Neither property nor life was safe. Therefore martial law was declared. The day after the procla-mation was issued declaring martial law, more than 2,000 outlaws, fearing the consequences, left Mexia. I was informed that on that day 1,100 railroad tickets were sold at Mexia to say nothing of those who left by freight train, by automobile and on foot. During the following weeks, more than 600 arrests were made; 27 stills
