CITY WATER WORKS MAKING MANY IMPROVEMENTS IN WHOLE SYSTEM

Old Wells Being Cleaned and Motors Installed on Pumps-New Pipe Lines to Meet Needs.

Work on improvements in the machinery and pipe lines of the Kerr-ville Water Works is progressing rap-idly, according to Robt. Saenger Sr., secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Included in the improvements in the system are the cleaning out of the old wells, installation of the new pipe lines in various parts of the city, and replacement of old lines with new.

The cleaning out of the wells has been progressing rapidly and will be finished within a short time. One of the wells has been thoroughly cleaned and work on the other is well

The old oil engines are being over hauled and put in first class condition and new electric motors are to be installed on the pumps. The oil engines will be held for use in an emergency. Two 20-horsepower electric motors are being put in.

MOTHER OF LOCAL MAN WAS ONCE PRISONER OF INDIANS

Captured by the Comanche Indians at the age of 10 years, carried away into captivity, forced to see her own sister stabbed by the redmen and thrown aside to die, fed upon horse flesh and nuts and then to be rescued and still live to tell the tale, such is the history of Mrs. Sarah Strauch, of Refugio, mother of Anthony Strauch of this city, according to Mrs. I. N. Dunbar of Refugio, who furnished the following information to to the Houston Chroniele recently:

Mrs. Sarah Strauch was born in Switzerland in 1841. Came to this country with her parents, Jacob and Elizabeth Thomas, and their five children, in 1844, landing at New Or-Thence the journey overland to Galveston. Thomas walked from there to Corpus Christi, the family following in a sail boat.

After one year in Corpus the family removed to St. Joseph's Island and, five years later, to Salt Creek, where they made a permanent home. It was at the latter place that Sarah, then about ten years old, was taken captive by a band of Comanche Indians raiding cattle ranches in Sarah and her older sister, Eve, were captured about a mile from their home while looking for milk cows one evening. The Indians put the girls each on a horse with an Indian rider and galloped away.

About 9 o'clock they came to the San Antonio River. There Eve tried to escape and as punishment the Indians cut her hair off with knives and stabbed her with dirks (finally dropping her for dead on the banks of the river. Sarah was forced to go on, leaving her sister alone and wounded. A serching party found Eve and took her home, where she fully recovered.

The Indians stopped at San Saba, where they remained a month. All this time Sarah was enduring untold hardships-she was forced to sleep on the ground with no clothing except a thin slip (the Indians had taken her clothes the day she was captured). She had nothing to eat save horse flesh and nuts.

An Indian agent, Church Rollins, located the band and brought about her release by exchanging an Indian boy for her and, two weeks later, she returned home. She afterward married Anthony Strauch and to this union were born five children, three of whom are still living, George and Henry of Refugio, and Anthony of

"Grandma" Strauch, as she is better known, lives alone in a modest little cottage in Refugio, where she has resided for forty years. She does







Captured by the Comanche Indians at the age of 10 years, carried away into captivity, forced to see her own sister stabbed by the redmen and thrown aside to die, fed upon horse flesh and nuts and then to be rescued and still live to tell the tale, such is the history of Mrs. Sarah Strauch, 83, of Refugio, mother of Anthony Strauch of this city, according to Mrs. I. N. Dunbar of Refugio, who furnished the following information to to the Houston Chronicle recently:

Mrs. Sarah Strauch was born in Switzerland in 1841. Came to this country with her parents, Jacob and Elizabeth Thomas, and their five children, in 1844, landing at New Or-Thence the journey overland to Galveston. Thomas walked from

Indians raiding cattle ranches in house. Texas. Sarah and her older sister, Eve, were captured about a mile from their home while looking for milk cows one evening. The Indians put the girls each on a horse with an Indian rider and galloped away.

About 9 o'clock they came to the San Antonio River. There Eve tried to escape and as punishment the Indians cut her hair off with knives and AGENT. stabbed her with dirks (finally dropping her for dead on the banks of the river. Sarah was forced to go on, leaving her sister alone and wounded. A serching party found Eve and took

her home, where she fully recovered. The Indians stopped at San Saba, where they remained a month. All this time Sarah was enduring untold hardships-she was forced to sleep on the ground with no clothing except a thin slip (the Indians had taken her clothes the day she was captured). She had nothing to eat save horse

An Indian agent, Church Rollins, located the band and brought about her release by exchanging an Indian boy for her and, two weeks later, she returned home. She afterward mar-ried Anthony Strauch and to this union were born five children, three of whom are still living, George and Henry of Refugio, and Anthony of

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
