T. N. Jones Says Prohibition Question Is Not the Issue

(BY T. N. JONES)

It is not known by many men that the personal and political relationship between ex-Governor Ferguson and myself has been unfriendly, but for the welfare of the state I have laid aside all differences and will give my support and vote for Mrs. Ferguson on August 23. I so advised some of my friends immediately after the first primary.

She possesses the fundamental prerequisites which should exist before a Democrat should support anyone for office. She is a noble woman and is familiar with the needs of the people, and is generally in sympathy with the masses. She is a Democrat and understands the principles and policies of true democracy.

I have become thoroughly acquainted with the ability and efficiency of women orators and on the many occasions they are at least as efficient and as intelligent as the men who have held offices. One woman filled an elective office in this State for four years. Her administration of Public Instruction was equal if not superior to that of any man who has served in it in all the years of the best of Governors this State ever had.

Prohibition Not Issue

It is charged that the cause of prohibitions will be abandoned by the nomination and election of Mrs. Ferguson. Prohibition is not an issue in this campaign. Her election or the election of any other candidate to the Governor's office cannot affect directly or indirectly, the prohibition amendments to the Constitution of the State or Nation, or the statutes enacted by virtue of them. Every intelligent voter knows this to be true.

Against the Klan

"There is a commanding reason why I am for Mrs. Ferguson. She is opposed to the Ku Klux Klan. I am now and have been from the first consistently opposed to that organization. It could not be a Democrat if the Democratic Party in Mississippi when I was a boy 13 years old and when I youth was taught the fundamental principles of that party by Lamar, Walthall, George, Money, Jeff Davis, and other giants in statesmanship. I came to Texas in 1880 and here I heard Richard Coke, Sam Bell Maxey, John H. Reagan, Dave Cullerson and many other statesmen, principles that I learned in Mississippi.

I am a member of the Baptist Church. I could not be a Baptist and endorse the Ku Klux Klan. My party and my church are fundamentally opposed to secret religious political organizations. They believe in proclaiming the truth from the house-tops, unmasked and with uncovered heads. They believe in Christian tolerance. They believe in and teach that in this Nation every man has the inalienable right to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience. They believe in and teach complete obedience to the Constitution and laws of the State and Nation. They believe in and teach that the rights and the liberties of the people guaranteed in the Bill of Rights of the State and Nation must be obeyed and preserved. They believe in the separation of Church and State. They are forever opposed to any form of imperialistic government. They favor a government by, of and for the people, organizing with and controlled by the masses. They believe that truth and love and not hate and intolerance should control the actions of all men.

What the Klan Stands For

The Ku Klux Klan, as I understand it, is opposed to each and all of these. It's record of crime, hate, and intolerance throughout the South demonstrates

strates the correctness of this indictment against it. Its very existence in a community is a constant menace to the happiness, character, the life and property of the people. It is seeking in Texas, to control the Government from the office of constable to that of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

The appointive power of the Governor of Texas is so great that during four years of incumbency in that office he would appoint the majority of the boards, which control the institutions of the State, including the State Board of Education, and his Secretary of State would appoint the heads of the banking, the insurance departments, the majority of the Board of Control, and the Commissioners of Markets, and other State offices.

I cannot vote for the nomination of any Ku Klux Klan candidate for Governor and thereby give to that candidate the right to control the affairs of this State for two or four years. No greater disaster could happen to the people of this State, I cannot under any circumstances contribute to that disaster.

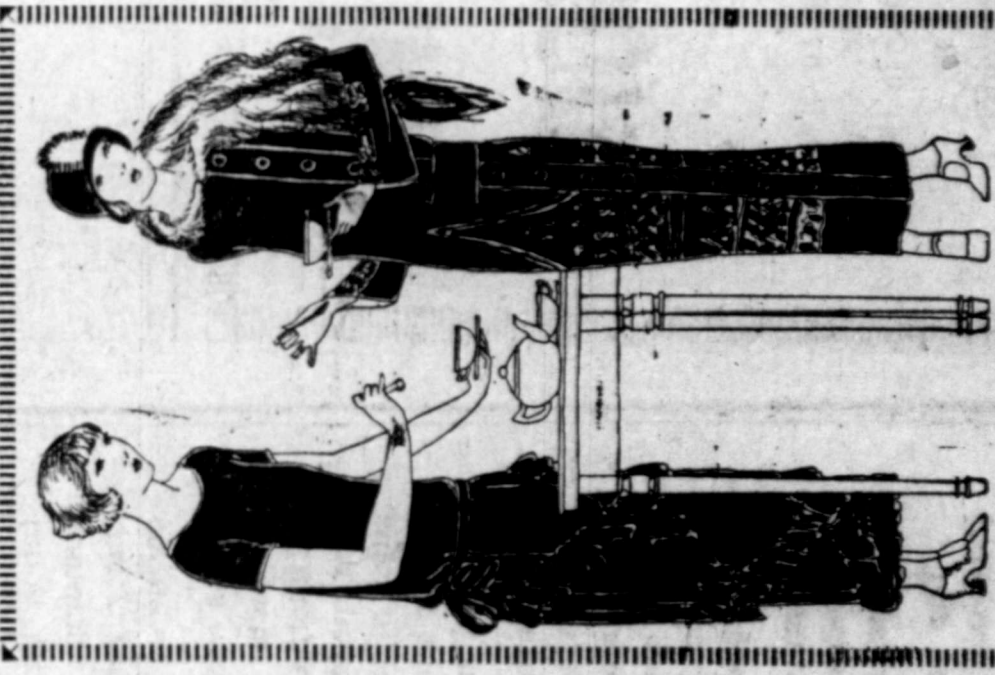

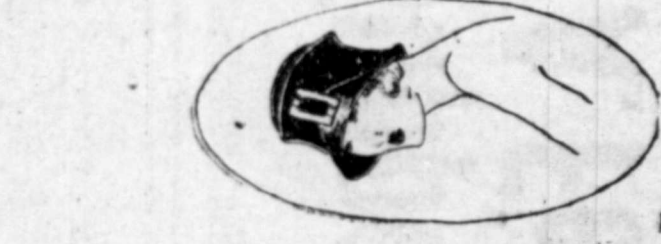

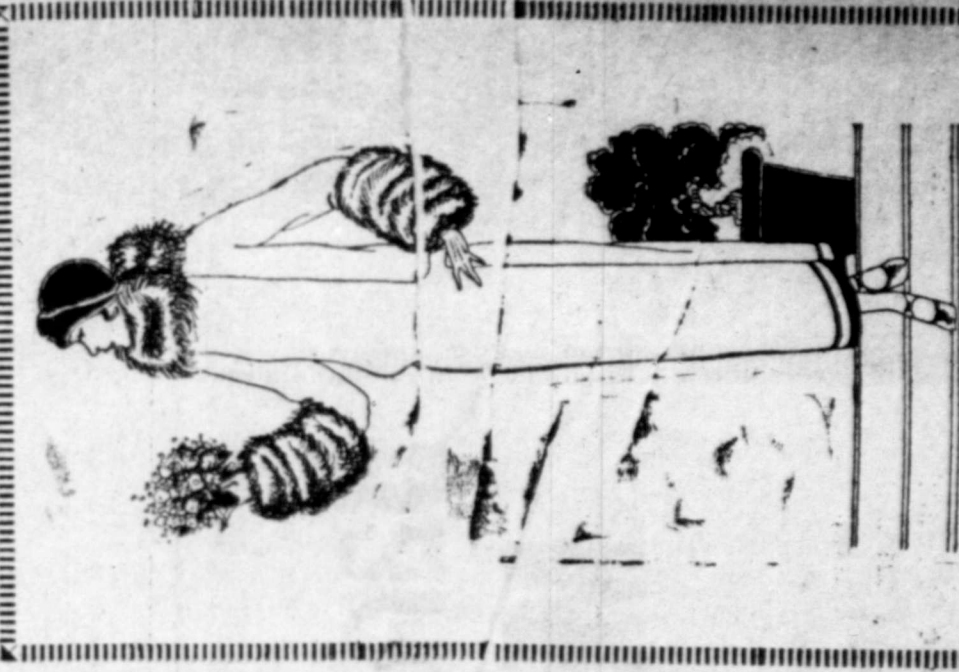

A. S. Burleson Is Supporting Mrs. M. Ferguson in Race

Austin, Aug. 12.—Declaring that the only issue between the two Democratic candidates for Governor of Texas is whether the law shall be administered in court house in the light of day or shall creek bottom trials in the dead of night by hooded men be the order of the day, Albert S. Burleson, former Postmaster General in Wilson's Cabinet, cast his lot here today with Mrs. Miriam Ferguson for Governor.

In a statement, which he said was written at the request of friends, Mr. Burleson analyzed the State political situation from his point of view. He denounced the primary system which he said could nearly always "be relied upon to thrust peewees into high and important places."

"Without Hesitation" "Without hesitation, I make my choice—I shall vote for Mrs. Ferguson," said Mr. Burleson. "There is no attempted denial than an oath-bound secret organization, through orders from its high officials, has obtruded itself upon the Democratic primary, and seeks to control its action."

"However regrettable it may be, candor compels us to admit that the only issue between these two candidates is: Shall the affairs of this State be administered by a Governor confessedly blinded by intolerance and saturated with sectarian and racial prejudice; shall liberty of conscience and freedom of religion be upheld, or shall narrow bigotry be given full sway. Shall the law be administered through regular channels in our court houses, in the light of open day, or shall creek bottom trials, by hooded men, in the dead of night, followed by whippings, tar and feathers and lynchings, be the order of the day."

"Judge Felix D. Robertson of Dallas, candidate for Governor, confesses that the secret order referred to is in democratic politics," Mr. Burleson charged. "At one time he boasted of its support," said the former cabinet member.

Assails Order "This organization exists only through sectarian and racial antagonism," continues the statement. "It is opposed to the spirit of both our Federal and State Constitutions. It is in direct conflict with the teachings of Thomas Jefferson, the father of the Democratic party. It runs counter to the traditional policy and principles of our party, as exemplified in 1856, when it was the one party with courage to denounce 'Know-nothingism,' which stood for the same vicious principles now upheld by the present oath-bound, secret Klan."

"Our last platform, adopted at New York, denounces the bigotry and intolerance of such organizations, using as strong language as possible without signifying it by name. "Such being the case, how can a real Democrat give his support to Judge Robertson? Members of this oath-bound, secret organization have no right to participate in our primaries, as such members. The truth is, members of the Protestant churches, or Catholic churches, or any organization, clan or bloc, have no right to enter our primaries, as such; but should only enter as Democrats, without prefix, with the single purpose to promote the welfare of our State, and thereby increase the respect of the people for our party."

"Judge Robertson now insists that prohibition is the issue, and that it is in danger. Everyone knows that this is not true. Prohibition is the fixed policy of our country. But, suppose prohibition was the issue. Mrs. Ferguson was never drunk in her life; her name was never carried in the brewers' blue book, as their hired agent and tool; she has never partitioned a bootlegger."

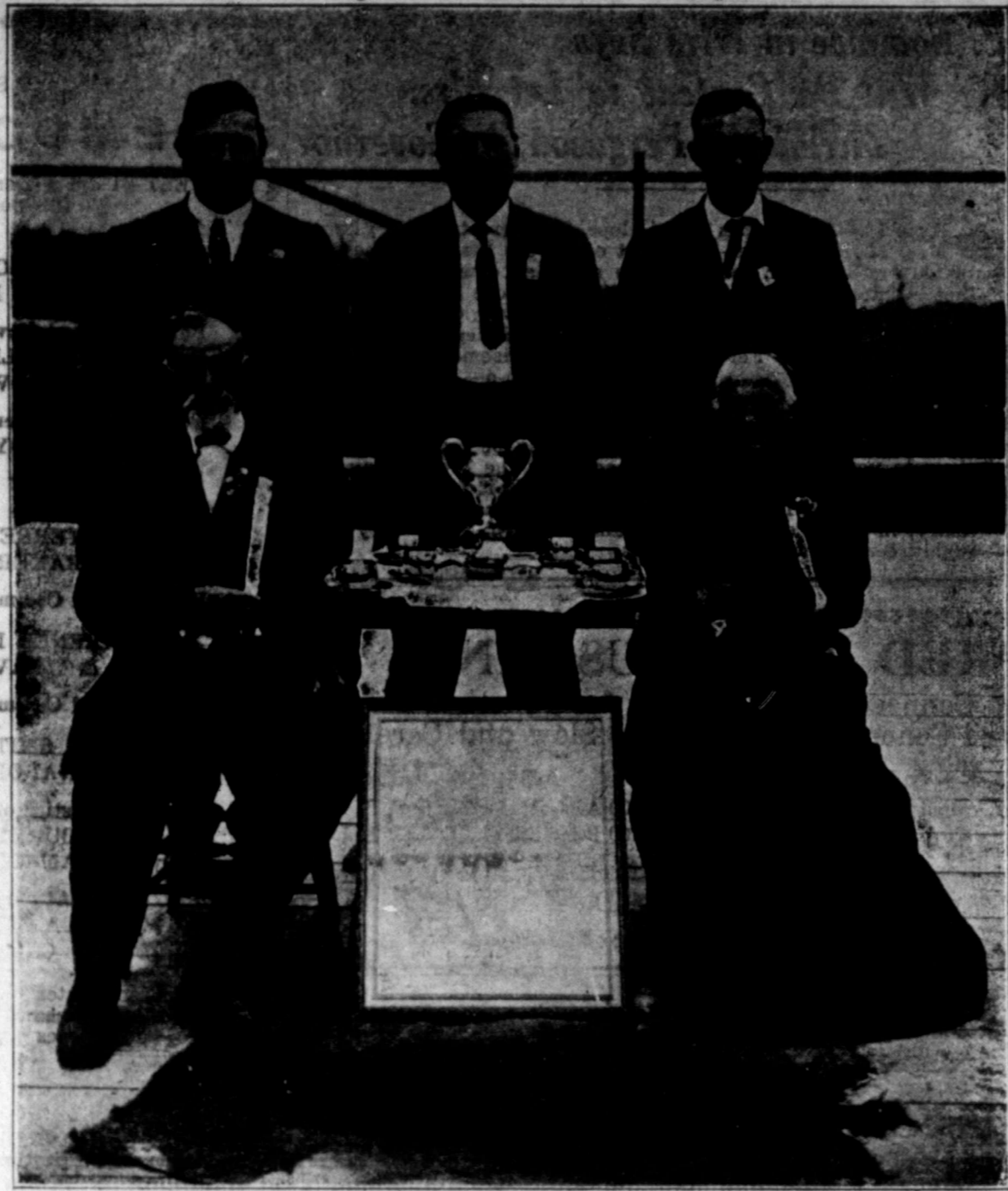
DEFEATED CANDIDATES FOR COMPTROLLER TO SUPPORT S. H. TERRELL

In his letter to Terrell, Smith said: "As you are high man on what I consider my side of the question now at issue in this State as well as others, I am doing all I can for you through this section of the State. It will afford me pleasure to co-operate with you in all matters."

Sterling P. Strong of Dallas Tells Why He and Others Quit Klan

Brady Standard: The Hon. Sterling P. Strong of Dallas, Texas, who has long been one of the leaders in and prominently identified in this State with the prohibition cause, and who at one time was a candidate for U. S. Senator, and who has always stood for clean government in state, in a recent letter to a friend in Brady, written before the first primary, uses the following language:

"When the organization was first mentioned here, by the organizers, who were expert salesmen, they sold the organization to the very best men here. They showed how the Klan was organized after the war between the States to take care of the situation, and how the organization had been revived to care for the situation after the World War, and to put the bootleggers out of business. This appealed to the best of people, and men joined by the thousands. My neighbors, and men of my church, were in to it before I knew it was here. Then I was solicited, and joined. I had not attended but few of the meetings here and at other places, until I found that the leaders for the saloon cause were in absolute control of the organization. Thousands of other good men learned this and did as I did—quit. It is now an organization absolutely

dominated by as corrupt a bunch politically, as the State has ever known. They are not using the barkeeps, Mexicans and negroes to get political power, as they did in the days of the saloon; for they know they could not get anywhere with them now, but they are using ministers of the gospel and Christian men and women to put their tools in power. The man who is at the head of the Klan in Texas, pleaded guilty in the Federal Court here to bootlegging, and told me on one occasion, that he was making one thousand dollars per month selling liquor, but he wanted to see the saloons opened up again.

"When the saloons were closed in Texas, this tore up the organization of the liquor bunch, which has been controlling the politics of Texas for years, and they were at sea, but the same bunch now have control of the Klan and have a full ticket in the

field for all the State offices, and in many places have candidates for the various district and county offices. A lot of these leaders you know, and they even have the nerve or the gall to go into the churches and speak from the pulpit. In most of the smaller towns of the State, the Klan is made up of the very best men, but in the larger cities, if there is a bootlegger or other criminal who is not a member of the Klan, it's the bootlegger's fault, and the trouble is the city Klans control the organization throughout the State. I am not guessing at a word I am saying about this; I am speaking from what I absolutely know. It is sad that good men will be led by such an unholy bunch."

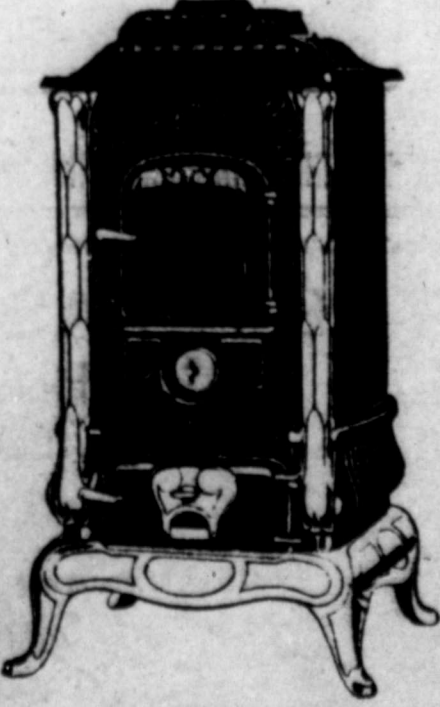
