



A GOLDEN RULE COMMUNITY

There is one residential section of Kerrville that typifies a perfect community spirit insofar as the relationship of one neighbor to the other is concerned. That is the general rule in the Hill Country, where people are noted for their hospitality and sociability, and this instance is recited by The Sun not as an exception to the general rule but as just one instance of co-operation that can be found on

In this particular instance there is a group of families living in a somewhat isolated section of the city, spirit. Some time since one man suggested to his neighbor that if he were to move his front fence back a few feet it would improve the value of all property on the street because of the widening of the street, as well as making a more symmetrical connection with the adjoining property. The owner consented and in place of the old dilapidated fence he erected a new modern enclosure around his premises, that greatly enhanced the looks not only of his own property but also of all property on the street.

A little later the man that had moved his fence suggested to his next door neighbor that an old windmill tower in his yard, together with a shed that had been used for a wash house by previous owners was unsightly and that the property would be more valuable by their removal. The owner agreed to remove the ob-

Still another neighbor was approached by some crusader and requested to cut down an old dead tree in the interests of civic beauty, and the owner not only improved the looks of his premises, but secured a large supply of fire wood by complying with

Streets and alleys have been cleared of weeds, and tin cans and trash removed by the united efforts of these citizens. No man has stopped when he got to his own property line but has continued in the good work just as long as there remained any cleaning up to be done in the streets and alleys of the neighborhood. The result: A community pride in the cleanliness of the neighborhood and a per-sonal feeling of pride by each inhabi-tant occasioned by the part he or she

has had in making same possible. In this section the residents enjoy to the fullest sense the term neigh-In this section the residents enjoy to the fullest sense the term neighbor and the companionship and association that should go with same. Children play together, not always in harmony, for that is an impossibility where a group of healthy youngsters are concerned, but usually so, and when the little disagreements of children hood arise the parents are neighborly and broad minded enough to make commending a further raise of about 75 per cent from the rates put into effect as a "war-time" measure. This is because they have not health. The secretary placed in charge of this work is Mrs. C. R. Fields, who has done much efficient service as an educator and as a journalist, and has besides had training through service in the Health Department.



Texas An "All Other" State

Farm and Ranch: Texas leads in the production of cotton, wool, and mohair, producing 45 per cent of the Nation's cotton, 70 per cent of the Nation's mohair and more wool than any other State. Yet, in the listing of spindles, the Department of Commerce and Labor puts Texas with "All Other States," which means that the industry has not yet attained sufficient importance to name the State. There are 37,786,464 cotton spindles in the United States, all of which are found in fourteen States, except 1,-218,700 listed as in "All Other States."

Texts, with its preponderance of raw material, its abundance of natural gas, oil, and lignite, should find a place in the list of States manufacturing cotton and wool into coarse and fine fabrics, and that, too, within the next few years. It does not profit the State to ship this raw material across the continent, and even to Europe, to be manufactured into goods and then ship back the finished arthem going forward while yours is to the source of supply. If Texas hesitating? Have the citizens of your has any tax or other law that is interfering with or discouraging the building of these industries, that law should be repealed. Let Texas de velop its natural resources and at the same time keep pace with other States in manufacturing.

About Pecans

Weimar Mercury: At San Saba Texas, a pecan tree owned by J. (for many years past has vielded the owner a crop that has paid \$250 to \$400. As far back as the World's Fair in St. Louis, the crops from this tree have been famous, the crop having been sold at that time in St. Louis at 40 cents per

At this same place a rural carrier paid \$7,000 for a 20-acre pecan orchard. In less than 12 months he marketed a crop of \$5,500, besides a good feed crop, and he sold his or-chard for \$11,000. He figured that his net profit for the transaction was a little less than \$12,000. Sounds like oil business, doesn't it?

The man who bought the orchard was no fool either, for he only paid \$550 per acre for it, and the crop just harvested had paid \$400 per acre, at which rate it would nearly pay for itself in one year.

At Winona, Texas, is the larges pecan grove in the State, planted of the paper shell variety. There is an orchard of 1,000 acres which is spoken of as the million dollar pecan orchard. At Cuero, Texas, is a pecan tree for which \$1,000 has been offered, it hav-

How can this be done? is the question that is asked every day—and that is just what the publisher of The Commercial World has asked me to tell in method!

If you want to see your town grow, there is just one way to accomplish it and that is by advertising its advantages in your local newspaper.

Advertising Does Pay Whether you believe it or not, advertising does pay-and it pays the city in a greater measure even than it does the individual business man.

Of course there is advertising andadvertising. It is not meant to suggest that you have the city government or the Chamber of Commerce run display advertisements in your local paper. That probably would be a paying investment, but there are tor can build a city on an empty other ways of advertising in the local stomach. Put some dollars in his newspaper that beat display advertispocket—even if you have to chloroing a city block—that is, for a city.

In the first place, let me emphasize that people judge every town by the newspaper published there. newspaper is just like your letter that can trade with him. The man who you write a stranger. When I get a letter from a stranger and read it through, I have a pretty good index to that man. And I can certainly tell a lot about a town by the time I finish reading the weekly or daily newspaper published there.

Must Carry Advertising

In judging your town by its newspaper, the first thing to look at is the amount of advertising carried. If the ads are few, ill arranged, and the copy not up-to-date, you know the town is behind the times and that must not be a very attractive place in which to live. That is the fault of the merchants-and proves that they need waking up.

The second thing in judging a town by its paper is the reading matter and the spirit of optimism—or maybe de-pression manifest by its editor. If the paper is full of interesting local news, written in breezy manner, and printed readably, you can always bet that the town is a good place in which to live. If there is plenty of school news and the teachers are mentioned in friendly ways, you can be assured that the town has good schools and that children reared there will have a chance to grow into good citizens. If the churches and pastors get their share of publicity, that is another credit to the town.

The third thing is the mechanical excellence thereof as a piece of printing. A poorly printed paper is some-times the fault of the editor and publisher. More often, however, it is the fault of the advertisers and subscrib-It always proves that the town and the section in which that town is located are mighty poor patrons of the local paper-and you give such a town a big black mark.






