Pineapple Egg Nog: Beat the yolk of one egg slightly, add one-eighth tea-spoon salt, one-half tablespoon powdered sugar and one-half cup of syrup drained from crushed Hawaiian pineapple. Add one-half of the stiffly beaten egg white, and, when well mixed, pour into a glass. Heap remainder of egg white on top and sprinkle with nutmeg and drained crushed pineapple. This makes an individual serving.

Society Punch: Mix three-fourths cup sugar and one cup water and boil for five minutes. Chill and add one waiian pineapple, the juice of two oranges, and one cup ice water. Add



This is a seven-room house with a breakfast porch which, to all pur poses, is really an additional room. In true colonial style, the front entrance leads into a central reception hall with arched openings at either side admitting one to the living room and dining room. The former occupies one entire end of the building. It has a large fireplace, served by the outside chimney seen in the exterior view. Two doors open from it onto the open porch which, placed
