H. B. Holt would support the policies of President Hoover. Senator Bratton opposes them. If the Democrats should have a majority in the senate, none of the president's policies could be carried out. That would be unfair to him and bad for the country.

#### Holt And Simms For New Mexico

H. B. Holt would stand for the protection of New Mexico's wants to write another tariff law. Each time it has written a tariff law, that law has brought ruin to this state by plac-ing cattle, sheep, meats, wool, wheat, corn and other products on the free list. Each time there has been the blackest disaster to the business of the country. As a result of the last Democratic tariff, sixty-one banks failed in New Mexico. Merchants went into bankruptcy, livestock men failed. Mer-chants went into bankruptcy, livestock men failed. The tax values of the state shrunk ninety million dollars. Sixty-six million dollars of the shrinkage was in grazing lands and livestock. The disappearance of almost one-fourth of the taxable property of the state forced higher taxes on the re-maining three-fourths.

Senator Bratton voted against the Republican tariff bill. The best bill for New Mexico that was ever written.

Both Senator Cutting and Congressman Simms voted for the bill.

Against Congressman Simms the Democrats have nomi-nated Dennis Chaves of Albuquerque. Mr. Chaves claims to favor the highest possible tariff for New Mexico products. But he expresses himself no more forcifully on that subject than did Senator Bratton who voted against the bill when it came up for final passage.

#### Bratton's Real Reason

The real reason Senator Bratton voted against the interests of his state was because the eastern and southern Democrats have decided to make the tariff the issue in the campaign this year and in the presidential campaign of 1932. They expect to get help from the big manufacturers who have established plants abroad, where they can hire labor at a cost of from one-half to one-fourth the wages they must pay in the United States. They want to ship back their products of cheap labor to the American markets free of duty.

Holt and Simms will represent the interests of New Mexico, first, last, and all the time. Senator Bratton follows what he believes to be the best interests of the Democratic party.

#### **Judge Botts**

The Republicans have nominated former Supreme Court Justice Clarence M. Botts, of Albuquerque, for governor. Judge Botts is a distinguished lawyer. His private and pub-lic life is "as clean as a hound's tooth," quoting Theodore Roosevelt. He has lived in New Mexico for more than 25 years, as schoolteacher, lawyer, justice of the Supreme Court and pub-lic spirited citizen. He has been in every part of the state and knows its needs. If elected governor he will deal with state conditions impartially and for the public good. Like Governor Dillon, he loves people. He likes to meet them, shake hands with them, talk to them. He talks their lan-guage. He is one of them, and knows it. He is proud of it.


