THE 1932 BEEF

A radio talk by C. V. Whalin, livestock, meats and wool division, Bureau of Agricultural Economics, delivered through WRC and a chain of radio stations associated with the National Broadcasting Co., recently, follows:

Althought conditions in the cattle industry are being influenced to a large degree by the business situation, there are certain internal factors in the industry that need to be considered carefully by those interested in the cattle outlook. Cattle numbers, after falling off for ten years, have been increasing gradually since 1928. In the last four years, numbers on farms and ranches have increased 5,700,000 head, or 8 per cent. During this four-year period, slaughter has been decreasing but most of the decrease has been in cows and heifers.
