John W. Graham, 24 years of age, son of Calvin Graham, vicepresident of the First National the Roswell attorney, serving for Bank of Hagerman, committed Welch through the trial, showed suicide about six o'clock Sunday up in town and filed a satisfac- evening, the act apparently was precipitated by several weeks of ill health.

About five-thirty, John left for a half hour later, his younger brother, Bill Jack, found his body in the barn, with a .38 calibre automatic pistol caught in his shirt front, after a shot had been fired into his heart. The lad summoned his parents, who were in the house, but who didn't hear the shot, and later, a coroner's jury from Hagerman was called. This jury rendered a verdict that the deceased had met his death by means of a shot fired by his own hand.

The tragic passing of Johnnie Graham was a distinct shock to friends in the Lake Arthur and Hagerman communities, because John West, 23 years of age, the young man had been of friendone of Hagerman's most popular ly and social inclination, and had gained many acquaintances. 

CREDIT ORGANIZATION MAY BE ESTABLISHED

A recommendation that New Mexico organize both a state credit corporation to operate under the Federal Reconstruction Finance corporation and a regional credit corporation under the national levestock marketing association will be made in the New Mexico relief conference this morning at Santa Fe.

The special committee which reached this decision last night will also recommend that work of organizing the state agency to work under the Reconstruction Finance Corporation be turned over to Guy Rogers of Albuquerque.

Organization of the Regional Credit corporation endorsed by the New Mexico Cattlemen's asssociation would be carried forward by Executive committee or special committee of the Cattle Grower's association. have to raise \$100,000 capital She through cattlemen and banks to go with \$400,000 from the National Marketing corporation, which would give it in excess of \$3,-000,000 borrowing power through re-discounts with federal inter-

mediate banks. While the reconstruction unit would be to meet emergency conditions, the Regional Credit corpo ration would be permanent and under the federal plan would gain complete control of the credit corporation over a period of ten years.

The recommendation is largely a plan placed before the special committee by Guy Rogers of the First National Bank of Albuquerque and Jan Van Houten of Raton, both members of Gov. Arthur Seligman's relief commission for New Mexico.

The special committee consisted of State Bank Examiner John Bingham, chairman; Bankers, Tom Quebedeau of Albuquerque; Jan Van Houten of Raton; P. B. Mc-Swain of Las Cruces; A. G. Ramsower of Aztec and Guy Rogers
