EDUCATION VERSUS UNEMPLOYMENT

SERVE GREENS RAW AS WELL AS COOKED

Dandelion greens, and other spring greens for that matter, come at the time of year that grandmother used to dose the family with sulphur and molasses. So it was according to a distinguished authority on foods, that sulphur and molasses got the credit, while dandelions did the work. In other words says the Bureau of Home Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture, the appetizing dish of spring greens which grandmother served, cooked no doubt with salt pork or bacon fat, was what the family needed in the spring and not the dose of medicine.

Nowadays the housewife does not have grandmother's winter food problem. Green foods are shipped at all seasons to the parts of the country where they do not grow, and fewer families need to be without "greens" in winter.

Properly speaking, "greens" is the term for all the green leafy vegetables lettuce, and other salad greens, as well as the leaves that are cooked. To grandmother, however, and to many people nowadays, "greens" are the green leaves of plants such as dandelion, mustard, or spinach, and the green tops of beets and turnips; in other words, the greens which are usually cooked.

At first it was for their mineral content—calcium and iron especially—that greens were considered valuable. Now it is for their minerals together with their vitamins. In a balanced diet green leafy vegetables supply most of the vitamin A and vitamin C. They also furnish vitamin B and vitamin G.

Two of the vitamins, however, B and C, are easily destroyed in cooking. Therefore, some of the foods that contain these vitamins should often be served raw, according to nutritionists. Raw cabbage, either shredded for salad or dressed for cold slaw, is especially rich in vitamin C. All the salad greens, lettuce, romaine, endive, watercress, celery, parsley, are good. The green leaves, however, are much richer in vitamins than are the bleached leaves and stems. A salad with green leaves of lettuce, raw carrots sliced or grated, or with tomatoes, is rich in at least four of the essential vitamins, A, B, C, and G.

Check Machinery Before Opening Season's Work

With the severe conditions under which chains operate on most farm machinery they should be carefully checked before the opening of a new season's work. Proper alignment of sprockets should always be maintained in order to prevent side-pull causing excessive wear on the sides of sprocket teeth. Worn sprockets should be replaced when new chains are placed on drivers to prevent a difference in pitch giving improper chain action and causing excessive strains on chains. Proper adjustment and oiling are also essential. Too much tension places unnecessary loads on the bearings and chain. Rusty chains should be cleaned with kerosene or light oil. When running they should be lubricated occasionally with a good grade of oil.

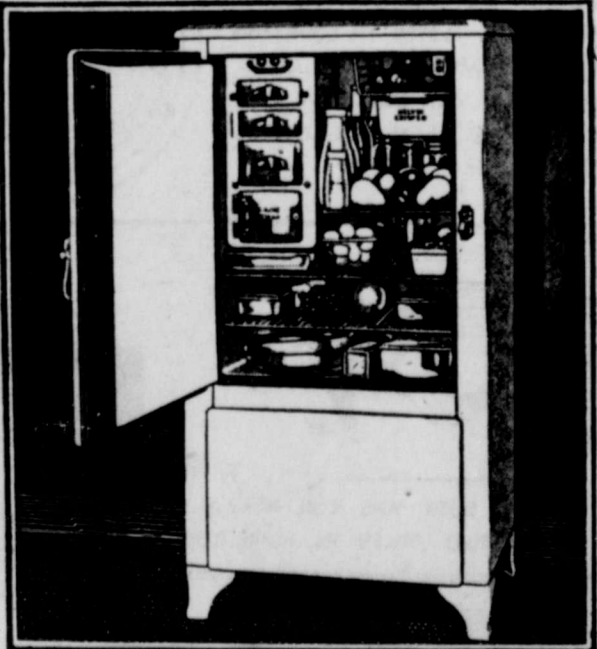

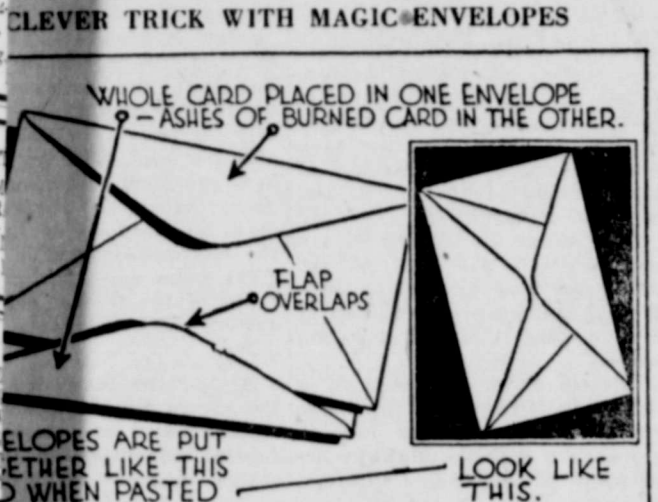
TORNADO STRIKES IN SOUTH--KILLS MANY

TRAFFIC ON WESTERN HIGHWAYS INCREASES

Traffic on the federal-aid highway system in eleven western states, will, in general, increase by 45 to 60 per cent in the period 1930 to 1940, according to a report issued by the Bureau of Public Roads of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The federal aid system is approximately 7 per cent of the total rural road mileage in each of these states and is made up of the important state and interstate routes.

This report is the result of a traffic survey conducted from September 1929 to October 1930 in co-operation with the highway department of Arizona, California, Colorado, Idaho, Nebraska, New Mexico, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming.

The investigation was undertaken to obtain essential facts about the present density, type, capacity and distribution of traffic units as a basis for planning highway development to serve present and future traffic. The data presented in the report may be used by each of the states as the basis for the preparation of a program of road construction, reconstruction and maintenance consistent with traffic requirements for each year up to 1940.

The routes of the federal aid system are classified as having light traffic when there are less than 600 vehicles per day; as
