An outbreak of rabies among coyotes in western Texas adjacent to southeastern counties of New Mexico, has caused the U.S. biological survey state office to order precautions taken by its field men in Lea and Eddy coun-

ties, it was learned last week. Six hunters are already working in the Texas area, and additional men are expected to be assigned there in an effort to prevent the rabies from spreading,

it was said at the survey office. Coyote infestation in southeasttern New Mexico is comparatively light, and possibility of the infection spreading here is considered small, but the New Mexico field men have been instructed to watch for rabies signs and immed-

iately report any manifestation. Rabid coyotes attack humans as well as animals, and have caused great losses through infection of livestock.

There should be no saturation point whatever to the demand of the public for education if the total economic situation permits it. Further, if the education, whether of youth or of adults, is wisely done, its results should be cumulatively good. A better and better educated electorate should mean better and better government and ever-increasing sanity and happiness in the living habits of the people .-Robert A. In a balanced diet green leafy vegetables supply most of the vitamin A and vitamin C. they also furnish vitamin B and vitamin G. Two of the vitamins, however,

B and C, are easily destroyed in cooking. Therefore, some of the foods that contain these vitamins should often be served raw, according to nutritionists. Raw cabbage, either shredded for salad or dressed for cold slaw, is especially rich in vitamin C. All the salad greens, lettuce, romaine, His life is filled with trouble and endive, watercress, celery, parsley, are good. The green leaves, however, are much richer in vitamins than are the bleached leaves and stems. A salad with green leaves of lettuce, raw carrots sliced or grated, or with tomatoes, is rich in at least four of the essential vitamins, A, B. C. and G.

Check Machinery Before Opening Season's Work

With the severe conditions un-der which chains operate on most farm machinery they should be carefully checked before the opening of a new season's work. Proper alignment of sprockets should always be maintained in order to

prevent side-pull causing excessive wear on the sides of sprocket teeth. Worn sprockets should be replaced when new chains are placed on drivers to prevent a difference in pitch giving improper chain action and causing excessive strains on chains.

Proper adjustment and oiling are also essential. Too much tension places unnecessary loads on the bearings and chain. Rusty chains should be cleaned with kerosene or light oil. When running they should be lubricated occasionally with a good grade of oil.



\$300,000 THIS YEAR

SANTA FE-A decrease of \$300,-000 in the state's school apportionment this year is forecast by Rupert F. Asplund, director of the New Mexico Taxpayers' associa-

Basing his forecast on revenues from the common schools land grants, which he says are shrinking, and on receipts for the six month period ending December 31, 1931, Mr. Asplund estimates a decrease of 25 per cent.

This decrease, Mr. Asplund said will have to be "taken into consideration when the school budgets are made up for the next term. If budgets are kept up at present level, the deficiency will have to be made up by property taxes."

The per capita apportionment made out of the state treasury last July was \$9.06 and based upon the school census. This year Mr. Asplund places it at \$7.

"The total estimated loss," he said, "will be equivalent to about proceeds of a one mill levy on the whole state."

PREVALENCE OF CANCER

Cancer is a unversal disease. It attacks the entire animal kingdom including man. Growths of much the same nature are common also in plants and trees.

The ancient Egyptians were familiar with cancer. The earliest writing of India make mention of And the most primitive races of man were no doubt afflicted by it from the very beginning of their existence.

Cancer attacks both old and the young. Babies are born with it, and the oldest people die of it. Cancer is largely a disease of adult life, however, occuring chiefly between the ages of forty and seventy.

Women are afflicted by cancer more often than men. This is due to its frequent occurrence in the female breast and the female genital organs. Women have 100 times more cancers of the breast than men, and about four times more cancers of the genital or-For the last five years the per


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
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
