This is an increase over the November report of 780,000 bales. The New Mexico crop is estimated at 76,000 bales compared with 101,000 bales in 1931 and 99,000 in 1930. Frost late in October caused heavy damage to both the Pecos and Rio Grande valley crops. The yield per acre on the 112,000 acres remaining for harvest is 325 pounds. The yield in 1931 was 412 pounds and 1930 375 pounds.
