The proposed rate of 80 cents a gallon natural sparkling wines is the same in effect before proalbition.

OUTLOOK FOR THE WORLD WHEAT CROP

The 1933-34 world wheat crop is now indicated to be about 220, 000,000 bushels smaller than las year in the world outside Russia and China, according to the United State Bureau of Agricultural Economics. Shipments from Russia to date this year have been but little larger than during the corresponding period of last year, and it does not seem likely that the total shipments for the year will greatly exceed last year's shipments. Consequently the new crop plus shipments from Russia and accounted for stocks as of July 1 may be estimated to be 4,380,000,000 bushels compared

with 4,487,000,000 for last year. World shipments of wheat to date this season have been some-what smaller than last year, being somewhat larger from July mid-September, but smaller subsequently than in the corresponding period of last year. Thus far shipments have shown no tendency to increase above the level of approximately 10,000,000 bushels moderate increase seems likely late in the season as supplies from the record crop in Europe are reduced. In the event of such an increase resurting from improved import demand rather than from distress selling of exporters, some improvement in the level of world prices seems ing. likely. European import markets during the past month have been subject to the depressing effect of exports of soft wheat from continental countries, especially Germany and France. The increase in the estimate of the Italian crop, together with an announcement of a complete prohibition of the use of foreign wheat in that country, makes it appear unlikely will be imported by that country sex. for the 1933-34 crop year.
Prices in world markets thus

far have shown no sustained improvement from last year's levels as a result of the smaller world Liverpool prices reached their highest point for the season in July, December futures averaging about 60 cents per bushel in terms of gold during that month. From mid-July to mid-October they declined rather steadily and since the latter date have been fluctuating in the vicinity of 40 to 45 cents per bushel in terms of gold. This is lower than any level reached during last season, and indeed lower than wheat has ever been before at Liverpool in modern history.

In the United States, on the other hand, there has been a marked improvement in prices. This has been due to the fact that United States prices are measured in terms of a currency which has depreciated in relation to foreign currencies during the past few months, and in part to the im-provement of United States prices relative to those of world markets. At Kansas City, No. 2 hard winter wheat, which averaged only 45.2 cents in October 1932, averaged 83.0 cents in October of this year. Even when measured in terms of gold, No. 2 hard winter was above its price of last year, averaging 55.8 cents in October 1933, compared with 45.2 cents a

World Trade: World shipments of wheat thus far during the current season have averaged about 10,000,000 bushels weekly. During July, August and September this was above the level which prevailed last year, but in 1932 there was a marked increase in shipments during September, and, for the months of October and November, they averaged about 13,000,000 bushels weekly. Clad in full armour Joan was M. placed on a charger at the head of the French troops.

For many years English kings Detroit, Michigan. had fought to possess the French throne. France had divided into two parts taking sides for and against them. Although the soldiers of France acknowledged no head in even the king they bent their knees to this young girl. Fired by her bravery they ratsed the siege and defeated the Eng-lish in four other fights. Charles was then crowned king of France.

Joan was later captured by the English who threw her into prison. She was tried for heresy because she said that mission had been revealed to her in visions. 1920 she was canonized by the church of Rome.


