The emergency compaign last dicated 1933 production by 4,-Between acts special music was 400,000 bales, was a big step in ing surplus which would have The stage was beautifully light- followed the record production of more than 17,000,000 bales in the plow-up campaign. More than 13,000,000 bales

were produced this year, however, in spite of the emergency reduc-tions, and the surplus problem still remains.

The carryover of the United States cotton before the 1933 crop was harvested has been placed at 11,600,000 bales. Add to this the estimated 1933 crop, after the plow-up reduction, of 13,100,000 bales, and there is a total indicated supply of 24,700,000 bales, for the coming year.

Total disappearance of United States cotton during the year is not expected to be more than Harold Dye spoke on the Lane 14,700,000 bales, leaving the big liquor law, explaining its in estimated carryover of 10,000,000

Further reduction of the surplus is necessary. The supply of cotton must be brought in line with effective demand at a fair ex-

change price. Chief aim of the new cotton adjustment program is to make possible this needed reduction.

Swedish Christmas Day Dinner Important Event

CHRISTMAS dinner in Sweden the subject of the special care and thought of the Swedish housewife. A typical Christmas day dinner is this: A consomme, boiled fish with potatoes and fried buttersauce, ham with fried potatoes, mash of apples and sweet plums, porridge of rice and milk, and "klenets" and jam.

The rice pudding is made of the very best rice, well cooked with tradition, an almond, but only one, has to be hidden in the porridge or girl who finds the almond; it is said that they then should be married within the year. 
In 1644 parliament passed an act ordering all citizens to observe Christmas day as a solemn fast, to be spent in silent atonement for previous festivals that had passed in riotous living and merrymaking. This order remained in force for 12 years.

The authorities in several towns tried to reduce Christmas day to the level of other days. In Canterbury, by order of the mayor, it was proclaimed that "Christmas day and all other superstitious festivals should be put down."

People who attended service in the cathedral were mobbed. The inhabitants formed themselves into two parties, and feeling in the matter frequently resulted in the exchange of blows.

In 1652 it was proclaimed that "no observation shall be had of the five and twentieth day of December, commonly called Christmas day, nor any solemnity used or exercised in churches."

The order was enforced by soldiers. Ovens and larders were searched, and where seasonable dainties or decorations were found they were carried off and destroyed. A changed attitude towards the Puritan dislike of Christmas festivities came with the restoration of


