Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners.

Following is the report of the minutes of proceedings of the Hon. Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln county, New Mexico, held at Carrizozo, N. M., August 8th, 1910. Board met pursuant to adjournment of its regular session, July, 1910.

Present—Hon. R. H. Taylor, chairman; W. R. White and R. A. Duran, members. J. G. Riggle, clerk, and Leo Oswald, deputy sheriff.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

An election of the qualified voters of Lincoln county, Territory of New Mexico, is hereby called to be held in the several precincts of said county of Lincoln, as established by the said board, on the 6th day of September, A. D., 1910, for the purpose of electing three delegates to the Constitutional Convention, as provided for by the act of Congress, entitled "An Act to enable the people of New Mexico to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states; and to enable the people of Arizona to form a constitution and state government and be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states," approved June 20th, 1910.

Said election shall be held and conducted, the returns made, and certificates issued to the persons elected as delegates to such constitutional convention in the same manner as prescribed by the laws of the Territory of New Mexico regulating elections therein of members of the legislature, as they existed on the 3d day of November, A. D. 1908.

The polls in the various precincts shall be open from 9 o'clock a. m. to 6 o'clock p. m. of said day.

Witness the seal of the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Lincoln, Territory of New Mexico, and the hand of its chairman and clerk this 8th day of August, A. D. 1910.

Precinct No. 9—Isaac Friedrichs, Henry Silva and Ben Renfrow. Election to be held in school house.

Precinct No. 10—F. A. Miller, L. F. Avant and Jose Mano Lueras. Election to be held in Hale school house.

Precinct No. 11—Chas. Siegler, Miguel Sanchez, Geo. Dillard Sr. Election to be held in the hall.

Precinct No. 12—W. G. Wells, P. L. Krouse and Tom Brown. Election to be held in the Angus school house.

Precinct No. 13—Tom DuBois, A. J. Atkinson, Joe Holzman. Election to be held in school house.

Precinct No. 14—B. F. Goff, Wm. Kasper and Jose Torres. Election to be held in justice of the peace office.

Precinct No. 15—Eugene Jones, Robt. Young and J. A. Martin. Election to be held in school house.

Precinct No. 16—H. Comrey, James Cooper,

Jr., and J. E. Wilson. Election to be held in school house.

The resignation of J. E. Koonce as justice of the peace of precinct No. 11 was accepted.

The petition of J. L. Goodall and others praying for the changing of the White Oaks, Capitan and the old Las Vegas road was laid over.

Board adjourned until 1 p. m.

Board met pursuant to adjournment, all members present as before.

A warrant for \$25.00 was ordered drawn in favor of W. H. H. Llewellyn ns salary as district attorney for the quarter ending June 30th, 1910.

The bill of Szily & Goetz, architects for 80 per cent of the estimate of work performed and mileage, making a total of \$205.73, was, after consideration, allowed in the sum of \$195.73 and a warrant ordered drawn for that amount.

A petition was presented by J. V. Edwards et als., praying for changing the Carrizozo and Three Rivers public road as follows, to-wit,

Beginning at a point where said road crosses the line between sections 24 and 25, township 10 S., range 9 east, N. M. P. M., thence in a straight line in a southwesterly direction to the northwest corner of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of said section 25; thence in a straight line in a southwesterly direction to the southwest corner of the SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of NW $\frac{1}{4}$ of said section 25; thence south along the west line of section 36 in said township 1067 yards; thence in a southeasterly direction to the south line of said section 36, and along said line to a junction with said Carrizozo and Three Rivers road, or as the said road is now traveled, it being the desire of the petitioners to have the road as now established and traveled declared a public road, and the old road between the points of intersection of the old and new roads be abandoned.

After due consideration the said petition was approved and the following persons were appointed viewers of said road: A. S. Lacey, Geo. Killen and W. Harper.

A. S. Lacey was ordered to post three notices in the most public places along the said proposed road at least five days previous to the time set for the viewing of the said road. It was further ordered that the above said viewers are to meet at a point on the said proposed road at the Otero county line on August 22, 1910, at

10 a. m., and to file their report in the clerk's office on September 3d, 1910, at Carrizozo, N. M.

The bill of Ben Bechtel for \$4400.00 for work done and material, less 20 per cent., \$3520.00,

Bill of Ben Bechtel for extra work for \$1300.63 was allowed and warrant ordered drawn for same.

The bill of Lute Skinner for \$248.50 for fencing right-of-way on the Carrizozo and Roswell road was allowed and a warrant drawn for same, to be paid out of the special road and bridge fund.

The treasurer was instructed to honor warrants to the amount of \$500.00 out of the special road and bridge fund, drawn by road overseer Wm. Ferguson.

The claim of Henry Emerson for easement on Carrizozo and Roswell road, for \$50.00, was allowed and warrant drawn for same to be paid out of the special road and bridge fund.

The bill of Wm. Ferguson for \$82.50, as overseer on the Carrizozo and Roswell road was allowed and a warrant drawn for same on the general road and bridge fund.

The petition of T. J. Moore et als. for the appointment of Thos. W. Henley as justice of the peace for precinct No. 11 is laid over.

M. S. Crockett is hereby ordered by the board to remove the fence from the public highway running along the east side of his place, or it will be removed by the road overseer at his (M. S. Crockett) expense.

The following contract and agreement was entered into with the Pauly Jail Building Company, of St. Louis, Missouri, for placing steel cells in the new county jail.

CONTRACT.

This agreement, made and entered into on this 8th day of August, A. D. 1910, between the Pauly Jail Building Company, of St. Louis, Missouri (a corporation duly organized under the laws of the state of Missouri, and having its principal place of doing business in the city of St. Louis, in said state, hereinafter designated as the "first party"), and the county of Lincoln, in the territory of New Mexico by the Board of County Commissioners thereof (hereinafter designated as the "second party"),

Witnesseth: That for the consideration hereinafter named and agreed to be paid to said first party by the said second party, the said first party agrees to manufacture, deliver and erect in the cell room of the county jail, or in a

room of proper size in some other building to be provided by said second party, in the town of Carrizozo in the aforesaid Lincoln county, New Mexico, (3) jail cells, finished complete, ready for occupancy, including all the attachments and appurtenances thereunto belonging in accordance with the specifications therefor, marked "Exhibit A;" also to manufacture and deliver at or convenient to the aforesaid county jail, the iron work described in the specifications therefor, marked "Exhibit B," and to set up and fully complete the iron cells specified therein—all of said specifications now being on file in the office of the clerk of county commissioners of said county, and are hereby made a part hereof.

The said first party further agrees to commence said work within a reasonable time after the date hereof, and have the same fully completed and deliver the same to said second party on or before the first day of November, A. D. 1910; provided, however, that in the event of delay in the final completion thereof, caused by strikes, riots epidemics, the action of the elements, or by any other unforeseen or unusual difficulty, casualty or misfortune that may be encountered in the prosecution of the work, or resulting from circumstances beyond the control of the said first party and by no fault of its own, including unusual delay in the transportation of material therefor, such further time shall be allowed to said first party for the completion of the work as may be just, and not less than the amount of time lost by reason of such difficulties; and such allowance and extension of time shall in no manner affect the rights, liabilities or obligations of the parties hereto, but the same shall subsist, take effect and be enforceable precisely as if such allowance and extension of time had not been granted.

In consideration of the foregoing covenants and agreement being well and faithfully kept and performed by said first party, the said second party agrees to pay said first party, or order, the sum of thirty-one hundred and six dollars (\$3106.00), as follows, to-wit:

Payment of 50 per cent of the contract price on completion and acceptance of the work. The balance of 50 per cent to be paid within twelve months from the date of contract. In case the county should not be able to pay this balance of

ROAD and FARM IMPROVEMENT



FARM NOTES.

Any farmer can make his farm a model with time, planning and work. Getting along with anything that will do is not making the most of conditions.

With corn, as with animals, do not forever be mixing and crossing breeds. By fertilization, cultivation and selection, try to improve the breed, and seed corn to sell.

It is best to manure corn ground in the winter and plow or disk it under in the spring.

Every beekeeper needs one or more books on bee culture, dealing with the keeping of bees.

Farmers in general now are building in a more substantial way. The use of concrete is responsible for a part of it.

New corn as part ration is good for horses doing fall work, and it is excellent for fattening beef cattle.

Corn should not be planted on sod which was broken up this spring for the first time until late in the season.

The barn set on a concrete foundation looks substantial, and it is so, and will last longer than the one set on wooden posts or blocks.

As soon as the corn plants are tall enough so the driver can see the rows, go into the field with a disk cultivator and disk the ground twice.

On a hard and shallow soil white clover does not ordinarily last more than two years, but on the richer and moister lands it will grow for many years without reseeding.

Many farmers are so intent on making money for the money's sake that they take no thought of the great possibilities of perfect living in the country.

Alfalfa is so unlike any other forage crop that it requires method of curing altogether different from that used in curing timothy, clover or any other meadow grasses.

A prolific queen bee will during her life lay 1,500,000 eggs, each one-fourteenth of an inch long. Put together they would make a chain 13.4 miles long.

Bees are worth all the trouble they require to fertilize the stigmas of the flowers in your orchard. The yield of honey is clear profit.

ANTHRACNOSE SPOT ON BEAN

Nearly Everyone Is Familiar With Spotted Appearance of Wax-Podded Varieties.

Anthracnose is a bean disease of fungus origin and goes under a number of names, as rust, wilt, pod spot, etc. As there is a true rust and a wilt, caused by bacteria, the name pod spot or anthracnose is preferred for it.

Practically all parts of the bean plant except the roots are subject to attack of the fungus. The most common indication of the presence of the disease is the occurrence of brown or black sunken areas on the stems, leaves and pods. They may also appear on the leaves and stems of the plant soon after it appears above ground and cause considerable losses through a reduction in the stand. On the older plants the attack is most serious on the larger veins of the leaves and the leaf may be wholly destroyed or its efficiency greatly reduced. From the stems and leaves the fungus spreads to the pods, and as many are rendered unsightly considerable direct loss is occasioned.

The presence of the fungus is often unnoticed until it appears upon the young pods. On these it produces small brown or rusty spots, which en-

large and darken until they become nearly black. The affected tissues of the pod dry, leaving sunken areas, in the centers of which may be seen small pink spots, masses of spores which rapidly spread the disease from plant to plant.

The spores by which the fungus is spread from plant to plant are very sticky when wet and are readily

transferred on the hands, clothing or implements. On this account beans should never be cultivated or gathered while wet with dew or rain. If it is too much trouble to observe these precautions for the whole crop it could be done with little extra effort

for a small plot on which to grow seed for future planting.

If the following recommendations are observed but little loss will result from anthracnose:

1. Plant seed free from disease.
2. Keep away from the plants while they are wet.
3. Remove and burn diseased plants as soon as they are observed.

Bad Roads.

There is a matter that makes bad roads a factor of loss. That is in the sale of the farm. A farm ten miles out on a road impassable for five months in a year has five-twelfths of its usefulness impaired, and is certainly worthy of 33 1-3 per cent. intrinsically less than it should be were the roads not so bad. Bad roads are a deterrent to settlement, thus driving an additional value away from farm land due to increasing population. They act as a repellent force to drive the boys and girls and desirable citizens from farm life. Bad roads tend to pessimism, to unhappiness and make an added argument for those who would contend that marriage is a failure and life not worth living.

The tendency with many very careful sheep owners, is to shear earlier than was the general custom a few years ago.

NATIONAL CAPITAL AFFAIRS

Camels Are the Freight Cars of Bagdad



WASHINGTON—Some of the weekly consular and trade reports received in Washington from representatives of the United States in foreign lands tell of interesting things in other countries. Among those recently received was a report on the use of camels as freighters. According to this report nearly 90,000 camels are used in the villayet of Bagdad as beasts of burden and with donkeys they form the only means of carrying goods to the inland points.

Camel caravans go in "strings,"

seven camels to the string, with two men in charge. For a camel 450 pounds is a good load, the neck being divided into halves. A burdened camel travels two miles an hour; on long trips across the desert 12 miles a day is an average march, though swift messengers, like the mounted dromedary posts from Bagdad to Mosul and Damascus, make forty, fifty and even more miles at a stretch.

Freight between Bagdad and inland points in Mesopotamia is commonly packed in pairs of bales, each bale weighing about 225 pounds, for the convenience of camel drivers in loading. The rates charged for carrying freight across the desert vary with conditions, being lowest when camels are cheap, labor and pasture plentiful and freight offerings none too numerous. For a common burden camel \$30 is a fair price.

"Don't Smoke," Moral in Monkeys' Death



"CHICO," the cigarette-smoking orangoutang, which died on the United States cruiser Wilmington from the tobacco heart, is held by Yeoman Harvey L. Miller of the navy department to be the nearest "almost human" creature he has seen in his wide travels in the navy.

"Chico" was four months old, and stood two feet nine in his bare feet, as all true soldiers are measured, when he came into the navy. He was purchased by Yeoman Miller at Tamatave, Madagascar, for two francs.

"Chico's" end was due to tobacco. One of the greatest pleasures of the sailors is to smoke, and, it is said, the ones that do not are either saving up to buy a library or else it is a case of "my wife won't let me." Chico soon formed the habit of snuggling up against Yeoman Miller when he was reading or smoking. The monkey would move right into the clouds of smoke and would sniff with evident

relish.

One day Yeoman Miller was writing a letter and had just lighted his pipe. The bugle called "collision quarters," and he dropped his pipe and started to the station on the run. Republican Differences.

The members of the old republican gang in New Mexico, who desire to have the constitution written in the interest of corporations and special interests, are finding that some of the purest and best of the members of the republican party have other plans. There are those who believe, with the progressive republicans, like Garfield and Cummins, that the issue is between the special interests and corporations on the one hand and the common people on the other.

Garfield demands actions and measures that will immediately check and ultimately prevent the sinister influence now exerted over the public officers and political activities by the "special interests," and he suggests the initiative and referendum, a corporation commission and the enforcement of penalties for the use of corporate funds for political purposes among other remedies.

Senator Cummins, of Iowa, a life long republican, who has for years been fighting in the interest of the people against republicans of the stripe who are now opposing, in New Mexico, the initiative and referendum, a corporation commission and an equalization board elected by the people, defined the issue between republicans in his speech as temporary chairman of the Iowa republican state convention as follows:

"It relates wholly to those questions which concern the control, regulation and restriction of the powers and practices of combined or concentrated wealth. Or to phrase it again—to the undue and disproportionate share which corporate capital is able to wring from the profits of industry, and the injustice it is able to inflict upon helpless individuals and defenseless communities."

We trust that the progressive republicans of New Mexico will be successful in their efforts to have the issues clearly presented to the members of that party.

The republican central committee by corporate and other special interests, failed to give expression to its sentiments regarding any feature of the constitution, but the progressive republicans are demanding that candidates for the constitutional convention define their positions, especially with reference to the election of all officers from constable to governor. It is fully realized that the special interests will not only oppose direct legislation by the people and a corporate commission, but will advocate the appointment of judges and many other officers, under the specious pretence that the people are not capable of governing themselves.

What Chief Justice Brewer Says:

"The two supreme dangers that menace a democratic state are despotism on one hand and mob rule on the other. The more constant and universal the voice of the people makes itself manifest, the nearer do we approach to an ideal government. The initiative and referendum make public approval the controlling factor of government. The more promptly and the more fully public officers carry into effect such public opinion, the more truly is government of the people realized."

Justice Brewer of the greatest tribunal on earth, the supreme court of the United States, and recognized as an eminent authority on government, recommends the initiative and referendum as the remedy for the disastrous results that will surely ensue between mob rule and monopoly.

And yet Charles Spiess, T. B. Catron, W. H. Andrews and the balance of the standpat machine insist that it is wrong to protect the public rights.

The initiative and referendum are the simplest methods of self-government by the people.

Democratic candidates for delegates to the constitutional convention are declaring, through the press, where they stand in reference to the important questions which will come up in the convention concerning the formation of a constitution, while the republicans are contenting themselves with generalities which mean nothing, and are asking the voters of New Mexico to trust them to make a "safe and sound" constitution. Few voters will be deluded by promises such as the republicans are making.

One of the most ingenious French aviators is trying out a combined dirigible balloon and aeroplane, a cigar-shaped gas bag helping to raise and support the machine.

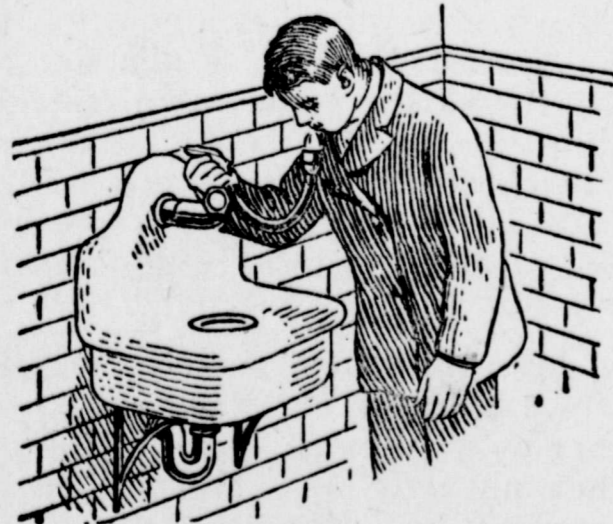
A patent has been granted on a roasting pan for meat which automatically bastes its contents by collecting the juices through a percolator and delivering them in the form of spray.

DRINKING TUBE IS SANITARY

So Arranged That When Mouthpiece Is on Level With Person's Mouth Water Spouts Gently.

A common fault of ordinary sanitary drinking fountains is the waste of water, but a drinking device of this, and, although only running when in use, it is likewise claimed to be impossible to get a drink from it before the mouthpiece is thoroughly cleansed.

It is attached to a water pipe in the same manner that a faucet is attached flush to the wall. When a drink is wanted, the lever is pushed upward and the mouthpiece forward on a line with the drinker's mouth. The water spouts up gently with a sufficient scouring action to cleanse the mouthpiece and in a stream sufficiently great to obviate the necessity of touching it with the lips. In this



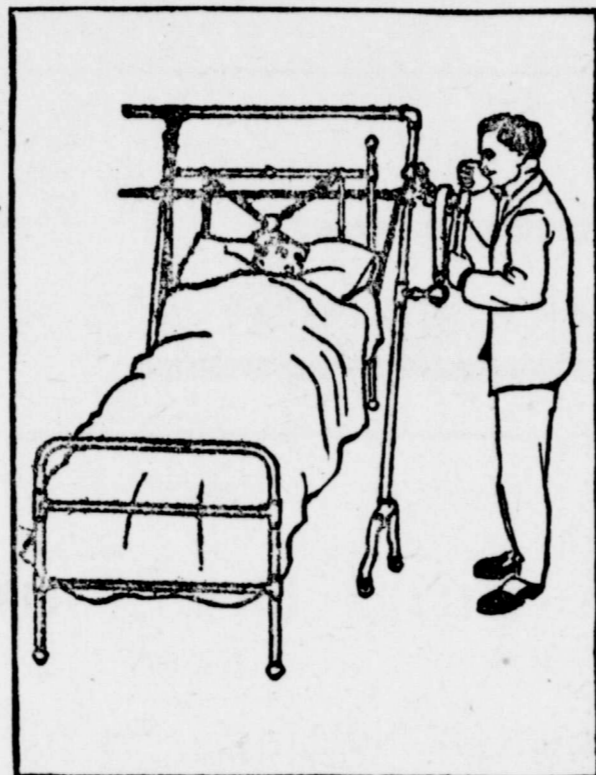
Fountain Drinking Tube.

it embodies the principle of the flowing cups which are frequently found on street fountains, with the added advantage that the water is running only when a person is drinking. When the lever is let go the water is automatically shut off.

USEFUL BED FOR HOSPITALS

Can Be Lowered or Raised at Head to Any Position Comfortable for Patient.

A boon to the bed-ridden and to thousands of hospital patients throughout the country is the invention of a Kentucky man. This is a bed which can be raised or lowered at the head to any position comfortable to the patient, and having a rest for the legs in addition. A pair of standards with a crossbar, looking like a horizontal bar on rollers, holds the upper end of the bed suspended. At one side of the standards is a wheel and gear by which the head of the bed may be raised or lowered to change the posi-

tion of the person occupying it. Running up from the foot of the bed is a T-shaped bar to be placed under the legs of the patient, so that when the bed is tilted at a steep angle he is kept from sliding downward, the bar beneath his legs giving him the feeling of being in a reclining chair. Any person who has been forced to lie abed for any length of time, unable to change his position, will appreciate the relief such a bed will afford.

WIND GUIDE FOR AERONAUTS

Furnishes Aid Corresponding to Pilot Charts of Ocean Navigator—Record of Years.

A unique sign of the times is Dr. Richard Assmann's guide to the winds of Germany, prepared from the records of the direction and force of the winds kept at forty-nine well-distributed stations for an average of nearly twenty-one years. It furnishes the aeronaut with an aid corresponding to the pilot charts of the ocean navigator. For each season and each station it shows how often, on the average, the wind blows from each of eight directions, and the average frequency of the various degrees of wind between a calm and a hurricane. It indicates the best places and times for making ascents, with the direction airships without high power will probably drift. More than this, it suggests the best location for airship sheds and ports, and gives evidence that not only are places near the coast unsuitable, but that many inland stations are uncomfortably stormy. Friedrichshafen, chosen by Count Zeppelin for his great sheds, is an unfavorable place for handling the huge airships. The records show that it has an average of twenty-four stormy days a year, while Celle has only twenty-two such days, Berlin and Cassel only four, and seven other stations less than ten.

Stomach Telescope.

A stomach telescope, invented by a London surgeon and in constant use in a hospital in that city, enables a doctor to see the exact condition of the entire interior of a patient's stomach.

For Mixing Concrete.

For mixing concrete a spade has been invented with long, oval holes in the blade, the perforations allowing the finer cement to flow through and give the face a finer finish.

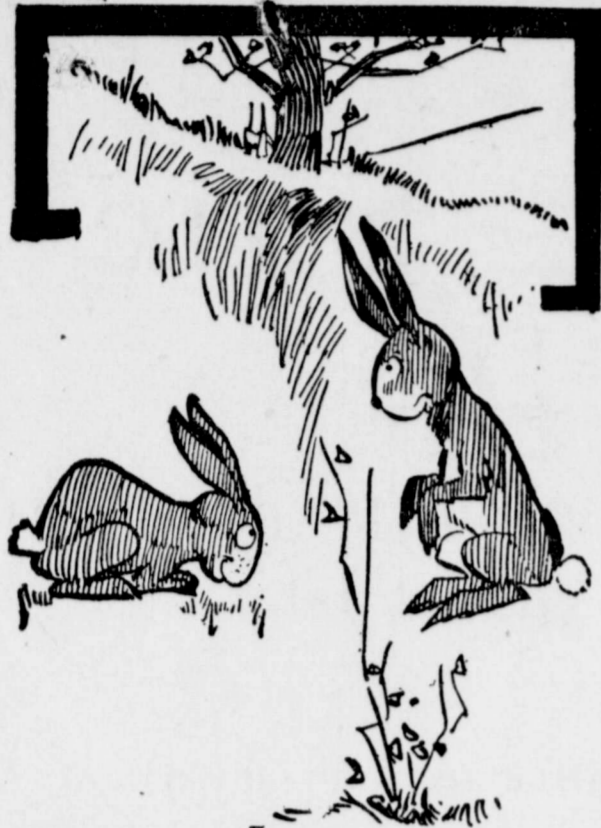

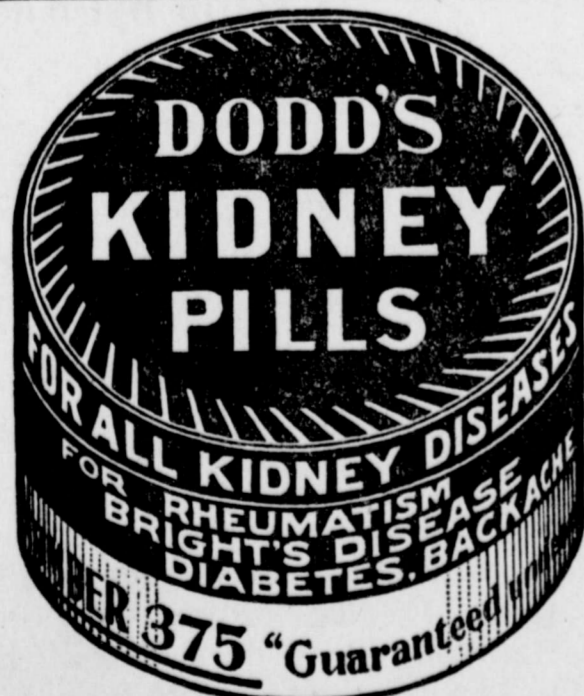

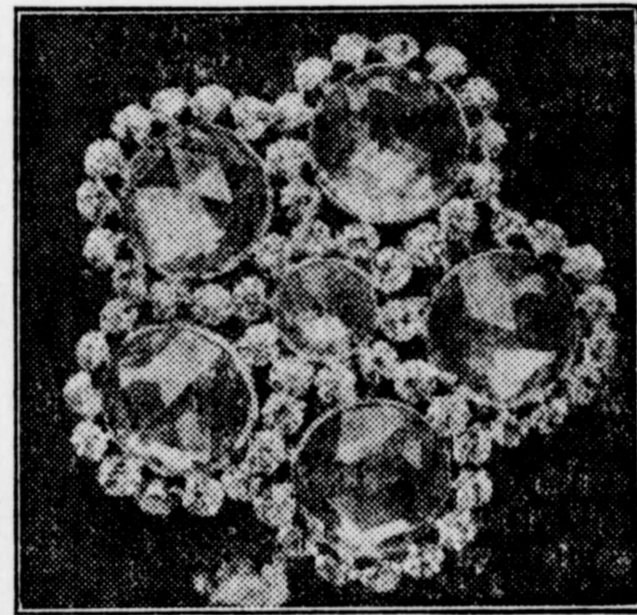
SHOW LESS GLITTER

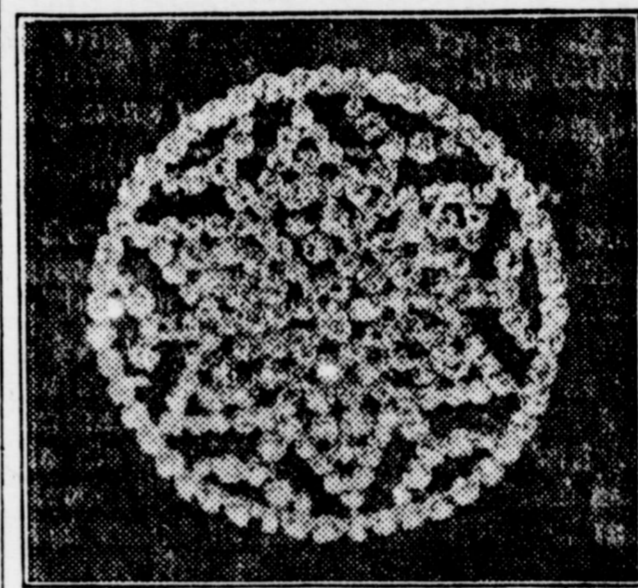
EASY TO IMPROVE OLD FLOOR

Application of Stain and Varnish Will Not Infrequently Make It Good as New.

Sometimes an old floor, if not too badly worn, can be dressed up to look very creditable. In any event it can be improved. The floor, first of all, should be thoroughly cleaned; the grease spots and splotches of old paint can easily be removed with caustic potash. The surface should be smoothed and sandpapered, and the cracks filled with putty or with a preparation made for this purpose which can be purchased at almost any paint store.

A dark stain—walnut color—can be made with burnt umber, ground in oil, and boiled linseed oil. Use only a small quantity of umber at first and gradually add color until the desired shade is obtained. The consistency of the mixture should not noticeably exceed that of the oil; a little turpentine should be added if it needs thinning. The stain should be applied with a rag or brush, preferably a rag, and should be well rubbed in. If one coat does not make the floor dark enough give it another.

Twenty-four hours later the waxing may be done. Shave a pound of beeswax into thin strips and let it soak over night in a gallon of turpentine and apply to the floor with a rag, being careful to spread it evenly. Additional coats of wax from time to time will add to the polish.

If an oak finish is desired, after cleaning the floor with caustic potash, make a solution of lye obtained from wood ashes to which sufficient copperas has been added to give the wood the desired shade. This solution must be applied with a mop and serves the same purpose as does the burnt umber stain for a walnut finish. Varnish when dry.—Beautiful Homes.

50 per cent at the expiration of 12 months the county is to pay the money available in their treasury and the balance to draw 6 per cent interest of the balance.

Provided, however, this contract shall be void if the supreme court of the territory of New Mexico decides that Lincoln is the county seat of Lincoln county.

It is hereby further agreed, by and between the parties hereto, as follows:

(1) Should any misunderstanding or disagreement arise between the parties hereto in relation to any part of the work or material provided for or embraced under the terms of this agreement, or in relation to any of the stipulations hereof, which cannot be settled between themselves, the matter in controversy shall be referred to two disinterested arbitrators (one of whom to be chosen by each of the parties hereto), and in case of disagreement between said two arbitrators, they shall jointly choose a third, and their decision in the matter shall be final and binding on both parties hereto; the expense of such arbitration to be borne equally by both parties hereto.

(2) Upon final completion of the work embraced in this agreement, the said second party shall examine the same, and if completed according to contract, shall immediately accept the same and make final settlement with said first party therefor, as hereinbefore provided and stipulated—but no such settlement shall be made with, nor any payment be made hereon to any agent of said first party or any other person whomsoever, except to an officer of said first party, or upon the written order of said first party signed by one of its officers and bearing its corporate seal.

(4) The foregoing contains all the understandings and agreements had between the parties hereto in relation to the furnishing of said prison work and the payment therefor, and neither of said parties is to be held to the performance of any supposed understanding or agreement not herein expressed, or set forth in the specifications referred to herein and made a part hereof.

In testimony whereof, the aforesaid parties hereto have caused duplicate copies hereof to be signed by the proper and duly authorized agents or representatives of the said principals, and attested by the signature and official seal of the clerk of county commissioners, of said second party, on the date first herein written.
