

On the 5th day of last month Mr. Falconer took sick at the Myles Ranch. As he and I had been friends for some time, I went to see him. The manager of the Ranch, Mr. McWilliams, told me he was going away, and that there would be no one left with Mr. Falconer at the Ranch but the cook Not suspecting what the disease was, but thinking it was a bad case of cold, I asked Mr. Falconer to come to my house and stay till he could get well. On the night before he came to my house he drank a large-size bottle of Simmon's Liver Regulator and a 50 cent size bottle of Jamaica ginger, besides taking a large course of strong pills and some quinine the next day. His blood was in a very bad condition, he having some large running sores on his hands. All this-and especially the heating nature of the medicine he had taken and his running in and out at the Ranch all night in his night clothing—caused him to take cold and drove the small pox into the confluent type; the pustules instead of forming and coming to heads, all ran together in a solid sheet over his entire body. As to "his doing well and me moving him into an open house and his having bad nursing," etc., he was never doing well after he took sick. I moved him three days before he died into our cook room-which was plank room, twelve by fourteen feet square-every crack of which was well canvassed and the entire wall and over head, closely and tightly papered, as fifty good men here will testify. I moved him on 3.75 the advice of Mr. Robert McGee, who had had the small pox and who told me that my dwelling -which is a box house and some of the strips not nailed on-was too open. I got Mr. Scotty to go and hire a Mexican who claimed to be an experienced nurse in small pox. I did this after faithfully trying to get an American nurse, as many of my neighbors will testify. I gave Mr. Falconer my personal attention up to the last and though the weather was very mild, I kept a good fire burning in his room both night and day. His every want was supplied, and he who says to the contrary but attempts to

This charitable (?) "Kernel" further states that "Mr. Kennedy, his wife and youngest son is down and is receiving proper attention and will soon be up." The truth of the matter was, not only my wife, my son and myself were down, but also a crazy woman. And after having made repeated efforts to get assistance, Mr. W. H. Wood succeeded in getting Mrs. W. W. Paul and Mr. Franks to come and stay twelve days. This "Kernel" tries to make it appear in his letter that himself-or some one-was doing a great work of charity in giving me and my family "prope r attention," when the truth of the matter is I failed to get him or any of his sort to pay in what they justly owed me. And at the expiration of the twelve days Mrs. Paul and Mr. Franks charged me one hundred dollars for their services, which I willingly paid.
