## Justices of the reace,

It cannot be expected that menswho are not law yers should, in this ccuntry at least know the law, and it is ri diculous to see a lawyer before the majority of these courts, even in educational centers, making an ar gument on a proposition of law be fore "his honor," who has about as much idea about what the court should "rule" as a pig does about the manipulation of the electric telegrsph.-Democrat.

Capron, a prominent New England woolen manuficturer writes the following letter to Wade's Fibre and Fabric, a Boston trade Journal which supported the Republican tieket last ye ur, but now advocates free wool: "I am begining to think that the vote I cast, up in New Hampshire, was a mi.take. There are no signs, present or future, that the election of Harrison is going to be of any benefit to the woolen industry, and there is a clamor all along the line of the woo'en men for almost the exact amount of "free trade" Cieveland recommended in his 'free trade' message. The facts are coming to the surface, and they are the only things which bave come out of this free trade eruption. The wool supply and porforce the number of sheep are rapidy diminishing year by year, in spite of protection. Bunching figures dosen't befog this fact. Now the question properly comes in. "Where is the blame" On the wool, on the she p or on the protection?-which don't seem to protect enough to hart. The things don't mix anyway. The pauper la bor cry is a humbug. The differ ence in cost of labor between Europe and Ameri a is not the difference which euables those foreign cusses to shut us off from miking the ciass of goods they send over here. If we did not pay a blamed cent for labor, they could do ja:t what they are doing all the same. We can make cheap goods just as cheap as they can, because our cheap wool is free. Perhaps you are a party man; I am not. Through my glasses Is e notaing tut humbugging on the part of the G. O. P. Through the mouths of its speakers it shied the truth like a son of a gun. I thought myself too old a bird to be caught with political chaff, but they stuffed it down my throat, and I was such a dogoned fool I didn't choke. Which way shall we turn for wisdom? The doctors disagree, and the free trade and protection devil is after the hindmost man. Prutection coes not amount to much and free trade do 't free anything up to date. Don,t mistake me. I believe in protection that protects, but $I$ don't believe in tha kind of protection which lets the foreigaurs in on top of us. Tuat

The New Mexican of the 14th, gives the following interview, which will be of interest to our many readers, who are iuterested in statehood.
J. A. Erwin, esq., editor of the Roswell Register, is visiting Sunta Fe to-day. He said to a New Mexican representative this mraing Lincola county could be relis 1 up. on as certion to senl up a big mijority in favor of statehood for New Mexico. The sen'iment of the Democrats there is that they would rather see a Republican stats than a Democratict ritory. "I am not in $f$ :vor, however," siil Mr. Erwin, "of agitating stat hood on purty lines. It is a questiou of overto wering importance to the commonwealth and not of moment to either one pariy or the oth se-not a plitical qu stion at all- In this way are the poople of Liacoin county in favse of it, Dumjerats and Republicans alike.
I believe a majority of the poople woull vote to sustain the constitution alredy frumed, but at the same time they have an abiding faith that congress at its present session i- going to give New Mesico an enabling act, providing for a new constitution, and if this is done, it woull be better al roand, and the Republicans and the Democrats of Lincotn would ignore party lines and send the best delegation possible as represontatlves in the new conveution.

## a ne.v district wanted.

Mr. Erwin said there was another question of public note which Lincola citizons were greatiy interested in jast n w. They want a uew judicia! district, to be composed of the counties of Lincoln, Chavez and E.ldy, the latter coming in as full fledged counties on January 1 next. Said Mr. Erwin: "Roswell is over 250 miles distant from the headquarters of the present district. This great stretsh of travel deprives our poople along the Picos region of chancery business almost entirely. Climats can not pry attorn ys for going to Las Cruces to attend to their business. Eddy is worse off than Roswell by at least 100 miles. The distriet as now censtituted is overburdened wit
work, and every reason exist why a new district should be established. The question of headquarters fur the new districe is one that can set_ tle itsolf at home. We want congress to give us another judqe and we believe we w 11 succe ed. I have spoken to Judge M.Fie on this subject and he is for it. I believe the suprems court will indorse it, provided the Bur association take up the question and recommend it at its meeting on the 20th inst. Mr. Josep' has promiselto help us in congress, and we have other friends there. With that support at homs which the exigencies of the case demand I believe New M xico can secure from congress an additional justice at the sa:ne time that similar relief is granted Idaho and Wyoming, both of which territories are now agitating the question at Washington.

Columbus, Jan. 14.-Gov.-elect Tames B. Campbell took his oath of office at noon yesterday. The message is comparatively brief.He strongly cominends the system of ballot reform commonly called the Au tralion system, and sketches briefly the suceesses which it has met in other countries and states. The argument that it will be a hardship to illiterate voters is substantially ans wered.
It is strange that the Republicans have not thought of applying the Australian system to congressional elections in the south. If a fair vote and an honest count is what they want in the southern states why do they not snggest the system they favor for the Democratic city of New York? It is because they do not want a fair vote and an honest count. An honest southern election is the last desideratum of the Republican party ; they want the count.New York World.
