LINCOLN AND COLONIZATION. An Interesting and Timely Contribution to History.

From the New York Nation,

The Southern people may not be very wise at this time in suggesting the plan of colonizing the colored prople as a solution of the race question, but in doing so they are only carrying out Mr Lincoln's favorite idea. He did not believe that the two races could get on in a condition of freedom. It is to be hoped that he was wrong in this conviction, but it is honestly held, and the southern people are just as honest in holding it as he was. He pressed the colonization of the colored people in his annual messages to Congress in December, 1861, and December 1862; in his message of April, 1862, approving the bill for the abolition of slavery in the Distriet of Columbia; in his appeal to the border States in July, 1862; and in his Emancipation Proclama-April 16, 1862, the section passing in the Senate by a vote of 27 to 10, as a part of the bil abolishing slavery in the District of Columbia; the act of June 7, 1862, for the collection of taxes in insurrectionary districts; and the acts of July 16 and 17, 1862, in relation to confiscation.

The State Department at Mr. Lincoln's instance, instructed our ministers to promote it with foreign governments havinging tropi al dependencies, as England, France, Holland and Denmark (Seward to Adams, September 30, 1862, Adams to Seward, October 30, 1862; Seward to Adan.s, November 18, 1862; but Earl Russell declined to co-operate in the scheme. Mr. Lincoln directed, September 12, 1862, the Secretary of the Interior to procure information as to the best places for the colored people to be sent to, and central America and the province of Chiriqu in New Granada were favored as points for colonization. Mr. Lincoln persuaded Senator Pomeroy, of Kansas, who had opposed the scheme in the Senate, to assist in its execution, and the Ile-a-Vache, a Haytian possession, was finally selected as the place.

Mr. Lincoln, with his own signature—an exceptional act for a President and showing his extraordinary interest (Schator Doolittie, a subscribing with ss)-entered, Decemper 31, 1862, into a contract with one Bernard Koogler, of New O leans, to ship 5000 negroes to that Island, but this contract being rescinded, another contract wamade April 6, 1863, with Paul S one-eighth miles long.

Forbes and Charles K. Tuckerman, of New York. A ship load of 453 colonists, gathered mostly about Fortress Monroe, sailed April 13 to the island, and arrived May 3. They had a sad time of it, and, being thinned by disease, death and desertion, these who were leftabout 300-were brought back by our Government, and reached Washington March 18, 1864. The firm of Forbes & Tuckerman lost money by the venture, and Tuckerman received the Mission to Greece as a compensation.

So ended the attempt, backed by the Government, to solve the great problem according to the plan on which Mr. Lincoln had set his heart.

Roscoe Conkling's Love.

The recent publication of "The Life of Roscoe Conkling" reminds me of an interesting and romantic story told me by the editor of a prominent New York state journal, who was a close friend of Senator Conkling, and which has never been published. The editor was sitting late at night with Mr. Conkling, after the latter had delivered one of his grandest specches during an exciting campaign. They sat for some time in silence before a brightly glowing fire into which Conkling gazed intently. At last he spoke upon the theme of all themes-love. He sp ke with the same eloquence and brilliancy that had distinguished his effort of the evening.

"In my boyhood," he said, "I fell in love. In love with an ideal-in love with that glorious character. Mary Qeen of Scots. What a woman! What grace, what beauty. what magnetism, what power; I have loved her all my life.

The editor listened to his rhapsody and thought it a graceful fancy of a great man.

"I should never again have thought of it." said he in concluding the story, "had it not been for the circumstance of a few months later. I was calling upon a beautiful and famous woman, whose name had for many years been associated with that of Senator Conkling. As I rose to go I passed the mantel and a handsomely framed cabinet-sized photograph caught my eye, I bent my head and saw that it was the picture of the lady upon whom I was calling, taken in the costume of Mary Queen of Scots."

Gold Refining.

gold at the Australian Mints, ac-Journal, is different to that resortseems in Australia that when gol is melted in the crucibles, which are first heated to a dead red. borax is placed upon the metal in a melted state, then chlorine gas is passed through a pipe, which is gradually depressed until it reaches the bottom, and when the compressor is relaxed, so that the gas bubbles up through the gold in its mol ten state, but without causing the projection of any globules. Hydrochloric acid from time to time is also introduced into the generator, and by this means a rapid evolution of chlorine is kept up. When the gas first passes into the gold, fames escape from the holes in the crucibles. These consist only of the chlorides of inferior metals that are attached to the valuable ones, none of the chloride cf silver escaping. When any silver remains in the gold nearly the whole of the chlorine continues to be absorbed afterwards when the refining is near completion fumes of a darker color make their appearance, and the end of the operation is indicated by the flame or luminous vapour appearing first of a bright yealow color, and gradually growing into a deep, redish brown. The value of chlorine in gold refining is certain ly not a novelty, but it is claimed that it has not before been put into ly esteemed by the people or more practical use, though its action on gold has been no secret to chemists for it does not mix with it at a red heat.-F. and M. Record.

The Electoral College.

The New York Sun has an arti cle on representation in congress and the electoral college under the census to be taken this year. It makes 175,000 inhabitants as a basis for representation in the national house of representatives, and gives the following conclusions.

The states to gain presidential electors will be: Alabama 2 Arkan sas 2, California 1, Colorado 1, Georgia 2, Indiana 1, Iowa 1, Kin sas 2, Kentucky 1, Louisiana 1, Maryland 1, Minneso a 3, Mi sissippi 1, Missouri 4, Nebraska 3, New Jersey 1, New York 1, Nor h Carolina 2, Ohio 2, Pennsylvania 1, Texas 2, Wisconsin 1. The four new states will probably have 14 electoral votes, distributed as follows: South Dakota 4, Washington 4, Montana 3, and North Dakota 3.

According to the electoral vote of 1888, with Montana added as Democratic, the Democratic electoral vo e would be increased from 169 to 189.

According to the electoral vo'e of 1888, with South Dakota Washington and North Dakota added as Republican, the Republican vote would be increased from 219 to 246. The net gain to the Republi cans seem likely, therefore, to be 7.

Without New York's 37 electoral votes the Republican presidential ticket, on the basis of the n w apportionment, would have 209 votes, or 16 less than a majority. Neither the 10 votes of New Jersey nor the 6 of Connecticut would be sufficient to change the result.

With the 37 electorial votes of New York cast for the Democratic nominee, he would have just 226 votes, enough to win without the gain of any other state. With ut the 37 votes of New York, Indiana, California, Ohio, Iowa or Massachusetts could not in any one case furnish votes enough to turn the scale against the Republicans.

As to sectional division, the south will gain 17 electors, the west 25, the middle states 3, and the Pacific states 4. New England will lose 1.

In a political way the most important fact established by the figures given above is the continued and increased importance of the electoral vote of New York. Without them neither party can have any expectations of winning.
