score of evil deeds done in the body greater than the last．They seem to hold imp icitly to the belief that every sin committed must bo paid for in suffering，and，the more pain one endures here，the less he will have hereafter．These poor，deluded venitentes are not attempting any moral improvements．They are merely endeavoring to shorten their stay in puatory and borrid work they make of it．Anyone who was ever so unfortunate as to be locked into one of then lodges must admit that a feeling of uneasiness and un－ cert inty crtpt over them while there Perthance a dim light，as the scene may be described，made awfully indis inct and the ghastly rude form of Christ on the cross； the man stretched out full leugth on the gound，more like corpses th in living beings，and the wretch－ ed oljects who pied the scourge on themselves and the others．mak－ ing the blood spurt at every stroke， whil the yels，wails and howls were iudis ribably terrible，

## OUR GREAT GAIN.

An occasional victory in local elections would be of no siganficance. but a successiou of gains in local elections and different and widely -caltered stater means that putlic sentiment 2 s setring in a chat.ged direction. Wituin a month flections have been held in many of the Pennsylvania, Ne, York and Iowa cities, and in several of the New York country towns. Two of these states are strongly Republican, and the third was carried by the Republicans in 1888 . In these local elections in three states, including some of the Republican rural dist ricts of New York, the advantage was vary lenghthy on the Democratic side. In the Fourth congressional district of Philadelphia atter a vigorous campaign on the lariff reform issue the Dewocratic candrdate for congress ran 2,700 votes whead of his ticket. In several of the Repubican cities the D mocrats won. In New York the Democrats carried Rochester, which the Republicans have been carrying for 14 years. In several other New York cities the Denocrats won. The Democrats now have 24 mavors of the 30 incorporated cities in the state, and they devel ped the most steength comparatively in the Republican strongholds. In the intensely Repuolican interior of the state the Democrats met with greater success than they ever did before. In 15 ceunies, 12 of which were carried by Harrison and Morton, the Democrats have eiected 133 supe visors as against 87 in 1888, and the Repubicans have elected 150 as againat 18 coin ia $^{\text {a }} 1888$

In Iowa, too, the lucal elections showed decided D mocratic gains. Fur example, in Cliaton, the home of Congressman Hayes, the reguar Democratic ticket won, alinough there was an inuependent Demucrat ic ticket also in the field, and at the previous election the Repubicaus won by 600 or 700 . Judge Hayes is of the opinion that the cariff in.d much more to do wi h those gans than the pronioition question.
