He crossed Callahan from the west, en route to Dallas — stroking a golf ball all the way and following it on the custom-built golf cart.

Baird senior teenage baseball players had two close games during the past week as they edged the Gorman Cats 6-5 in district play at Gorman last Friday night, then beat Carbon, Tuesday, 2-0.

Richard Windham was the winning pitcher against Gorman, giving up only one hit. However, five walks and eight errors accounted for Gorman's runs.

Kelton Jones led Baird in the hitting department with a triple, double and single. Windham and Stanley McGowen each had two.

Baird scored three in the first, two in the second and one in the fourth. Gorman scored two in the first, two in the second, and one in the bottom of the seventh. Gorman had two on base with a runner on third when the third out was made to end the game.

Only two hits were accredited to Baird as Bell put one out of the park for a home run in the first inning. Baird's only other run came in the sixth as Bell scored Harris on an error. Jones' single accounted for the other hit.

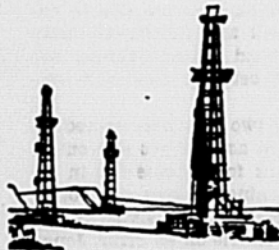

## Outdoors In Texas

Nature has a way of taking care of her own problems.

If you take a tract of land and never touch it, the balance of nature to available habitat will remain fairly stable all the time. Nature has many devices for such control — predators disease, starvation. None of them are very pretty, but nonetheless they are quite effective.

The real trouble starts when someone begins tinkering with this delicate balance of nature.

As things now stand in Texas, there are no lands left which haven't felt the presence of civilization.

This, of course, compounds the problem. When a rancher chains the brush off his land, he destroys much of the wildlife habitat. As some of the predators are killed, it also knocks the balance out of proportion.

The more the balance is altered, the bigger the need for competent wildlife biologists to try and get things back in some semblance of order again. Perhaps heavier hunting pressure is desired to compensate for the lack of natural predators.

But despite all the work of man, nature still makes her presence felt, quite dramatically at times. Experience has shown us that there are cycles of wildlife, diminishing populations in years of plenty. Nothing we can do will alter this natural cycle.

A drastic die-off of deer in Llano County a couple of years back was a dramatic example of this. It was, simply, nature's way of balancing the deer herd to the available habitat.

Contrary to popular belief, game can not be stockpiled. Only so much wildlife can survive on any given number of acres.

A covey of quail, for example, never will get any larger in numbers no matter how much it is protected. It may diminish in lean years, but even during good years it will go only to a certain level and remain there. This, whether the birds are hunted or not.

Natural attrition annually takes care of about 80 per cent of the birds. This means that 80 of every 100 quail each year will be young birds.

This also is true of deer. Many ranchers, upon seeing a drastic increase of deer on their lands, attempt to resort to artificial

feeding. According to James Teer, with the wildlife management at Texas A&M, this only compounds their troubles.

"Such feeding programs only prolong and aggravate the problems," he said. "Such programs only treat the symptoms, not the disease. The symptoms are poor deer; the disease, poor range."

Teer points out that deer are increasing in numbers, despite the fact that more have starved, annually, than legally were taken by buck hunters. Parasites also take a heavy toll. Yet we still have more deer today than ever before.

"Removing surplus deer is a vital part of deer herd management," said Teer. "And common sense tells us that harvesting both sexes is sound and practical on some ranges."

He asks landowners to look at the problem like this: Selling only bulls, rams or billies from herds of domestic stock is impractical management. Unless both sexes of livestock are marketed, the pastures soon become overstocked with females that the range can not produce enough forage to feed them. The number of deer generally is determined by carrying capacity of rangelands, not the annual harvest of deer by hunters.

This, then, points up some of the problems encountered when man starts tinkering with nature.

"Most deer never reach what is considered a ripe old age for whitetails," Teer went on. "Although some deer do live 20 years, a buck that escapes hunters and the toll of nature for five years is considered old. As far as the total deer production is concerned, deer over 7 1/2 years are not common members of the herd. About 95 per cent never see their fifth birthdays."

But nevertheless, the Old Lady Nature still makes herself felt quite dramatically and strongly in our everyday scheme of things, particularly in the great outdoors.

W. O. Tyson, trustee, of Fort Worth staked No. 3-A Mrs. Jessie Klutts as a proposed 785-foot cable tool project in Callahan County Regular Field.

Location is five miles southwest of Cross Plains on an 80-acre lease.

It spots 180 feet from the north and 275 feet from the west lines of Block 43, Comal CSL Survey 181.

## County Confirmation Looms as Producer

Sojourner Drilling Corp. of Abilene No. 1-A Mabel Kennard, Section 94, Block 13, T&P Survey, looms as a second producer for a Callahan County area 7 1/2 miles north of Clyde.

No. 1-A Kennard was waiting on cement after 4 1/2-inch casing at 1,600 feet with 80 sacks. Total depth is 1,770 feet.

A drillstem test was taken at 1,532-43 feet in the upper Tannehill Sand. With the tool open 2 1/2 hours, gas surfaced in one hour and 29 minutes.

Recovery was 205 feet of free oil, 70 feet of oil and gas-cut mud, and one gallon of brackish water. The oil was 39.5 gravity.

Initial shutin pressure in 30 minutes was 540 pounds; and final in 30 minutes, 480 pounds and still building. Flowing pressure was zero to 110 pounds.

## Fertilizer, Water, Mower Keys To Attractive Lawn All Summer

To keep a lawn attractive throughout the summer, proper fertilization, watering and mowing are very important.

Fertilization should continue throughout the growing season, says County Agent Pat C. Garner. Nitrogen is the key element in turf growth and should be applied every eight to 10 weeks at the rate of one to two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. It produces the deep green color that homeowners desire.

Garner says that lawns should never be watered until the grass shows a definite need. When watering, the soil should be soaked to a depth of six inches or more. Water should be applied only as fast as the soil can absorb it.

Deep watering encourages a deep root system that is capable of utilizing plant nutrients more efficiently and is more resistant to diseases. Light sprinklings will produce shallow root systems which encourage weed infestation and disease. Garner suggests that the lawn should be watered for a healthy root system during excessively dry periods in the winter since the root system is still alive.

Improper mowing results in the deterioration of many lawns. Mowing too close encourages thinning of the turf, shallow rooting, soil drying and heat damage to grass during the summer. Clipping too high results in many of the same problems.

Bermuda should be mowed at a height of one and a half to two inches. It is a good practice to cut only one inch off St. Augustine lawns at each mowing.

Ornamental plants frequently suffer damage or die as a result of various diseases. Certain viruses, bacteria, fungi and nematodes cause parasitic plant diseases. One of these, powdery mildew, is caused by several fungi. This disease may attack ornamental plants early in season, Garner said.

Powdery mildew is common on roses, euonymus, zinnias, and similar plants. It appears on leaves a powdery white coating. The disease thrives readily in warm, humid weather, says Garner. A severe attack may result in stunted plant growth; the leaves may curl, become dried and drop off. The powdery

coating may completely overgrow buds and stems. New infections are caused by tiny fungus spores which are carried by the wind to other leaves and plants.

As a preventive against powdery mildew, protective fungicides such as acti-dione PM, phaltan, karathane and sulfur should be used, suggests Garner. A protective coating should be kept on the leaves, especially in damp weather. Leaves that have been infected and have dropped off should be raked and burned.

Additional information can be obtained by referring to Extension publication MP-574, "Diseases on Ornamental Plants."

## Following Simple Rules Can Keep Down Complications From Mishap

Vacation time is here. Soon millions of people will be driving about the country, and automobile accidents will occur with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. STOP. Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.

2. RENDER AID. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) Stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both. (4) Do not move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.

3. PROTECT THE SCENE FROM FURTHER DAMAGE. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have someone turn his headlight beams on the wrecked vehicles.

4. CALL AN OFFICER. Police-men, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.

5. GATHER INFORMATION. WRITE IT DOWN. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess — be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver — and he must do the same.

6. BE CAREFUL WHAT YOU SAY. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission. You may learn later that the other driver was equally at fault or more
