A Lost River.
According to the Los Anceles Herald the SouthernPacific railroad company has lost a river, and in consrquence has a bridge whose oecupation is gone. The Whitewater river has flowed from the Sierre Madre mountains across the sands of the region just this side of Seven Palms as long as any (ine can remember. The station of Whitewater was located where the railway crosses the river and was supplied w'th water from its current. During the last heavy rains the Whitewater rose in its might and devastated the whole countryround about, washing out the bridge and the roadbed, and playing the mis. chief generally. Soon the rains and the niver stopped simultaneously, and the river has not been found since. It appeared to become ashamed of itself for doing se much harm, and has apparently slunk away in disgust and sorrow. It is entirely gone. At no point does it cross the railroall, as it would have to do were it still in exisence in some ner course The railroad company in order to secure water for its starion at White water, has been obligod to build a pipe line way up to the mountains at considerable experse. All last summer, during the hottest, dryest weather, the river ran placidly along -in fact, it has never failed until after its "jag" of this winter. Now it forms one of the mysteries of that mystertous region, the Colurado river desert, and perhaps is flowing by tha Pegleg mine, and possibly rippling beside the treasure-laden Spanish galleon which lius somewhere in that region buried $\ln$ sand.

Houghten, of Las Vegas, temporary chairman, Committees were appointed, and the report of the committee on permanent organization recommended that Hon. T. M. Patterson, of Denver, be seiected as chairman, that Jefferson Reynolds of Las Vegas, J. Y. Hewitt of White Oaks, T. C. Ford of Trinidad, E. B. Bronson of El Paso and Anthony Joseph, at large, be elected vice-presidents and T. W. Heman of White (Iaks, secretary. The report was adopted with 2 hurrah.
The chair appointed a committeo on basis of representation, ennsisting of J. S. Hart, El Paso; P. C. Ford, Trinidad; Jeffersen Reynold: Las Vegas and J. Y. Hewitt, White Oaks.
While the committee on representation was out, W. S. MeCutcheon, chairman of the loeal committee on entertainment, stated that on Thursuiay might the delegates would be entertained by the great and only McGinty Ciub, and that visiting delegates would be called for at the Grand Central hotel at 7:30 and escorted to Mesa Garden. He said that on Thursday evening the delegates would enjoy a free excursion to the historic city of Chihuahua, Mexico, tendered them by the Mexican Central railroad and that the delegates could taka their wives and daughters with them; that the Puilman Company had refused to make any reductions and therefore delegates would have to pay four dollars for round trip berths. The party would leave Thursday evening and arrive in Chihuahua for breakfast Friday morning, and returning leave there Friday night and arrive in El Paso Saturday morning at 7 o'clock.
