READING VARIOUS news-
papers these days, we are often
reminded that Baird is one of
the best-equipped towns in this
entire section of the state when
it comes to a municipal water
supply.

Almost every day we read
where some West Texas town
has been forced, because of a
low water supply, to impose vol-
untary — or involuntary —
curbs on the use of water.

This, of course, has not hap-
pened in Baird. Nor is it likely
too, except in the event of an
unexpected accident or change
in present conditions.

BAIRD HAS ONLY one major
drawback in its otherwise rosy
water picture. This drawback is
a drop in pressure in some parts
of town during peak water use
periods.

The solution to the problem
is twofold — replacement of
some existing lines with pipes
of larger capacity which would
allow more water to circulate to
homes, and construction of ad-
ditional overhead storage facil-
ities.

This extra overhead storage
would boost pressure immedi-
ately in areas where the size of
water pipe is adequate. But it
would not be completely success-
ful in making water more plen-
tiful in every home unless the
pipe replacement program were
carried out at the same time.

There would be one fringe
benefit to this better pressure.
Baird would then have suffi-
cient overhead storage to insure
enough water and pressure in
the event of a major fire which
happened to coincide with a
heavy-usage period.

THERE ARE STRONG indica-
tions that the city might go in-
to the water system improve-
ments if funds were available.
But the cash is not available
because of some \$15,000 in city
money being used to relocate
utility lines in the area of the
new Interstate 20 bypass.

In fact, moving those pipe-
lines has put a minor strain on
the city's pocketbook. But the
city is making the most of the
situation by installing lines big
enough to take care of future
needs. This foresight will pay off
sometime in the future.

It would seem to us that there
is merit in attempting to pro-
vide our town with more water
storage and a better distribution
system before another hot sum-
mer rolls around.

THE MOST OBVIOUS solution
to revamping our water system,
it would seem, is a bond issue.

But it suggests another big
problem which will loom even
larger in Baird's future than it
does today. For any number of
reasons, we need many more of
our residential streets paved.

Residential pavement would
cut down on dust or mud, de-
pending on the season, and
would make our blocks more
valuable and more comfortable.
Pavement on W. 7th, for ex-
ample, would mean our children
would no longer have to occa-
sionally wade through mud to
get to school.

This, then, would seem to set
the stage for a modest general
improvements bond issue in
Baird, with the amount made
large enough to cover an exten-
sive paving program, refine-
ments on our water system,
and \$15,000 to cover cost of uti-
lity work in the bypass area.

Such an issue could, because
of Baird's solid financial posi-
tion, be paid for with a tax in-
crease which would literally cost
each taxpayer only pennies a
month.

Baird Drops First Game

Two big innings for Burnet
busted Baird into the loser's
bracket of the district teenage
baseball tournament Wednes-
day night at Brownwood, 9-2.

Baird was to square off against
Pecos at 4:30 p.m. Thursday in
a game which eliminated one of
the two from the tourney.

Winning first round games
were Midland over Robert Lee,
6-2; Brownwood over Pecos, 3-0
and Burnet. Odessa received a
first-round bye.

Odessa meets Midland and
Brownwood faces Burnet in
the top bracket Thursday,
while the Pecos-Baird tilt was

the only one scheduled in the
lower bracket.

Glen Ferguson, a pick-up
player for Baird, started on the
mound but lasted only a third
of an inning against Burnet.
Tim Warren, also a pick-up, fin-
ished the game.

Burnet struck for three runs
on four hits and a brace of er-
rors in the first inning, added
one in the second, and came
back to ice the game away with
four markers in the fourth. Bur-
net also scored once in both the
fifth and sixth innings.

In all, Burnet collected 11 hits
for the night and had consider-

able help from five Baird mis-
cues afield.

Baird got its two runs in the
sixth when Stanley McGowen
was safe on a fielder's choice
which erased Richard Wind-
ham's single, and Wally Harris
drilled a home run over the left
field barrier.

Windham and Harris each had
two hits for the night to lead
Baird's attack. The losers col-
lected eight hits and left men
on base in all but the fifth
inning. Eleven Baird runners
were left stranded during the
game.

Baird collected two double
plays for the night, one going

Warren to Windham to Tommy
Barton, and the other from
Bruce Bell to Richie Crow to
Barton.

A loss to Pecos eliminates
Baird from the tourney. A win
would put the Callahan Coun-
ty team into a game at 4:30 p.
m. Friday against the Brown-
wood-Burnet loser. A win
there would put Baird back in
action at 9:30 p.m. Friday.

To win the championship,
Baird must win five straight
games because of being dumped
into the loser's bracket. The
finalist in the winner's bracket
needs only three victories for
the district title.

Hospital Adds X-Ray Machine

A modern new x-ray machine
has been installed at Callahan
County Hospital and has been
put into service. It replaces a
machine which was some 30
years old.

The new machine is a Mattern
Astro "Two-200" model.

Among the models features is
a spot filming device which en-
ables the physician to examine
a large body area with a flouro-
scope, then to make an x-ray
of an exact spot where the pic-
ture seems necessary.

Other features include a motor
driven table, floor-ceiling tube
support and a full wave elec-
tronic timed radiation generator.

assistant to Massachusetts
Senator Edward (Ted) Ken-
nedy, was scheduled to fly
from Washington to the Sen-
ator's home state the night
Kennedy's plane crashed.

But Evans decided to take
a later flight when his staff
planned a party to observe
his birthday. Edward Moss of
Andover, Mass. was asked to

take Evans' place in the Ken-
nedy flight.

Moss was killed in the crash
which also gravely injured
Sen. Kennedy.

Evans, a native of Baird, is
the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. J.
Evans of Clovis. His grandpar-
ents are Mr. and Mrs. T. E.
Powell and Mr. and Mrs. Will
Evans, both pioneer Callahan
County couples.

Evans is a graduate of
Clovis High School and at-
tended Pepperdine College, the
University of London and Prince-
ton University. He received
the political science from Yale
University in 1956.

High Voltage Wire Dangerous

Electricity is probably one of the most helpful tools on the American farm. However, it can be one of the most dangerous if it is abused says Pat C. Garner, Callahan County agent.

Today, electric power is distributed to nearly every farm in Texas. The power lines which bring it to the farm seem harmless, and they are if left alone by inexperienced people.

Each year, a number of Texas farmers are killed because they got a joint of irrigation pipe too close to a power line. The pipe doesn't have to make contact with the line because the high voltage can produce an arc large enough to bridge a gap several feet long, says the county agent.

Other farm equipment which can get tangled in high voltage lines might include tractor loaders, augers, elevators, cranes, or booms and well digging equipment, says Garner. Remember when working around these lines, they carry 2,400 volts or more.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for

needed medical services. The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services, as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and pro-

viding that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

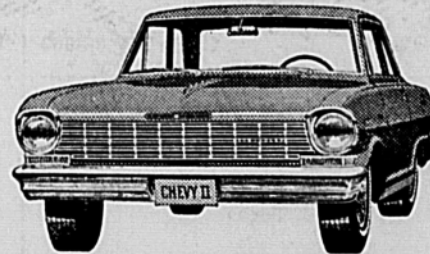
"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

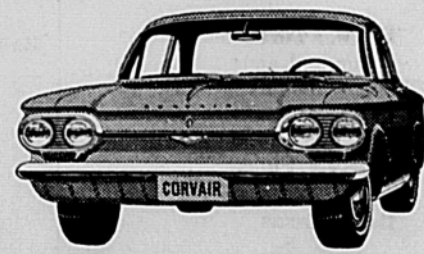

Make sure the ladder is in good condition. Check to see that all joints are tight and there are no cracks or break before you start to climb.

Place ladder in a firm position and use side rails when climbing. Never lean off balance to reach work; instead, move ladder.

By following these and other common-sense rules, a ladder can serve as a useful tool on many jobs, but with careless use can prove as dangerous as an tool on the farm.

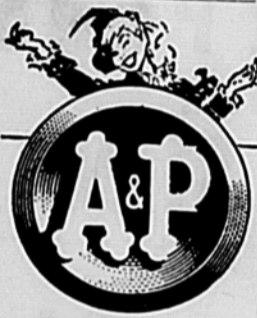

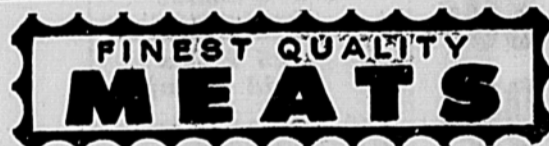
