SANTA FE MAKES BRADY A DEFINITE PROPOSITION

Committee of Brady Business Men Go to Galveston and See Officials --- Road Wants \$60,000, Rightofway and Depot Grounds.

W. D. Crothers, F. M. Richards, G. R. White and Judge F. M. Newman returned Tuesday from Galveston where they were sent by Brady to receive the proposition of the Santa Fe officials relative to the proposed extension of the San Saba branch.

The proposition submitted by the road calls for \$60,000 cash, free rightofway from east line of county to and through Brady, and depot grounds. It was stated by the officials that Brady would be the terminus, for a while at least. This intention on their part is borne out by the fact that they did not ask for rightofway through the county, but "to and through Brady."

The road agrees to build to Brady within two years, and the bonus is payable when road is completed and an engine has been run over it.



Another Big Deal in Menard County Land Made Last Week-Jim Callan

to E. F. Tillman, Et Al.

There are a good many straws showing the direction of the wind in railway circles in this section of Texas just now, and the latest, which seems to presage the building of the Frisco. from Brady to Menardville, is a sale of land in Menard county last week. The particulars of the deal are taken from the San Angelo Standard:

The biggest ranch deal recordit is thought that the trade means more railroad facilities for West Texas.

Callan & Company, of which Jim Callan, president of the Texas Cattle Raisers' Association, is at the head, sold to E. F. Tillman, livestock agent for the Frisco, and his associates, a forty-six thousand (46,000) acre ranch in the eastern part of Menard county at \$7.50 per acre, making a total consideration of \$345,000

This land is located just east of Menardville and on an air line from Brady to Del Rio. The purchase of this immense tract together with that of Burbank's ranch for \$275,000 by the Frisco people seems to indicate that that road intends to push south west from Brady right away. In case such a move is made, the road will run through Fort Me-Kavett and from there to San Antonio or continue in a southwesterly direction to Del Rio.

It is known that the Frisco has surveyors running lines south and southwest from Brady, and it is believed that active operations will begin with 1-4t in the next forty-five days.
