**GOVERNOR MARK WHITE**, in his "State of the State" message to open the legislative session in Austin this week, made some remarks which were encouraging to residents of our area—if only the governor will be able to follow through, and get the backing of the legislature on his stand.

Governor White, addressing the state's water problem, remarked that much has been said, and a number of studies made in recent years, but that positive action has been lacking.

He pledged to get something going on the water problem during the current legislative session. Striving for unification, he said in part, "This isn't a rural vs a city problem, and it isn't a 'West Texas' problem—it's a 'Texas' problem, and we need to solve it." Like we said, hopefully the governor will be able to put actions to his words. We haven't had a governor since Preston Smith who recognized our water problem, and if our region is to continue to be the "breadbasket of the nation," then it behooves residents of Houston and Dallas to realize the need and pledge their support of a solution to the problem.

The governor also addressed the threat of the Department of Energy's proposal to locate a nuclear waste site in Deaf Smith County. White showed his opposition to the naming of Deaf Smith as one of the nation's three "finalist" sites prior to Christmas, in a personal appearance in Hereford.

It is really mind-boggling, to think that with all of the nation's desert areas, some of which will not support a jackrabbit on a hundred acres, that land in our particular area would even be given a second thought, let alone be as far along toward being chosen as it now is.

Here again, we're talking about a farming area which is capable of feeding our nation, which would be threatened by the location of such a site. Opponents of the dump site fear for the contamination of the Ogallala aquifer, which is the main source of water for the High Plains region.

The Department of Energy representatives try to maintain that the way the site would be designed, there is "no way" the water aquifer could be threatened.

With the government's track record on things that "cannot happen," we would rest easier knowing that they were not gambling with people's lives and the area's future.

The selection process is by no way complete, and it will be interesting to see what develops. One thing for sure—if you have an opinion on the matter, it behooves you to contact your government officials.

The show will begin at 4 p.m. and the judge will be Bob Robinson, county agent at Randall County, who lives in Canyon.

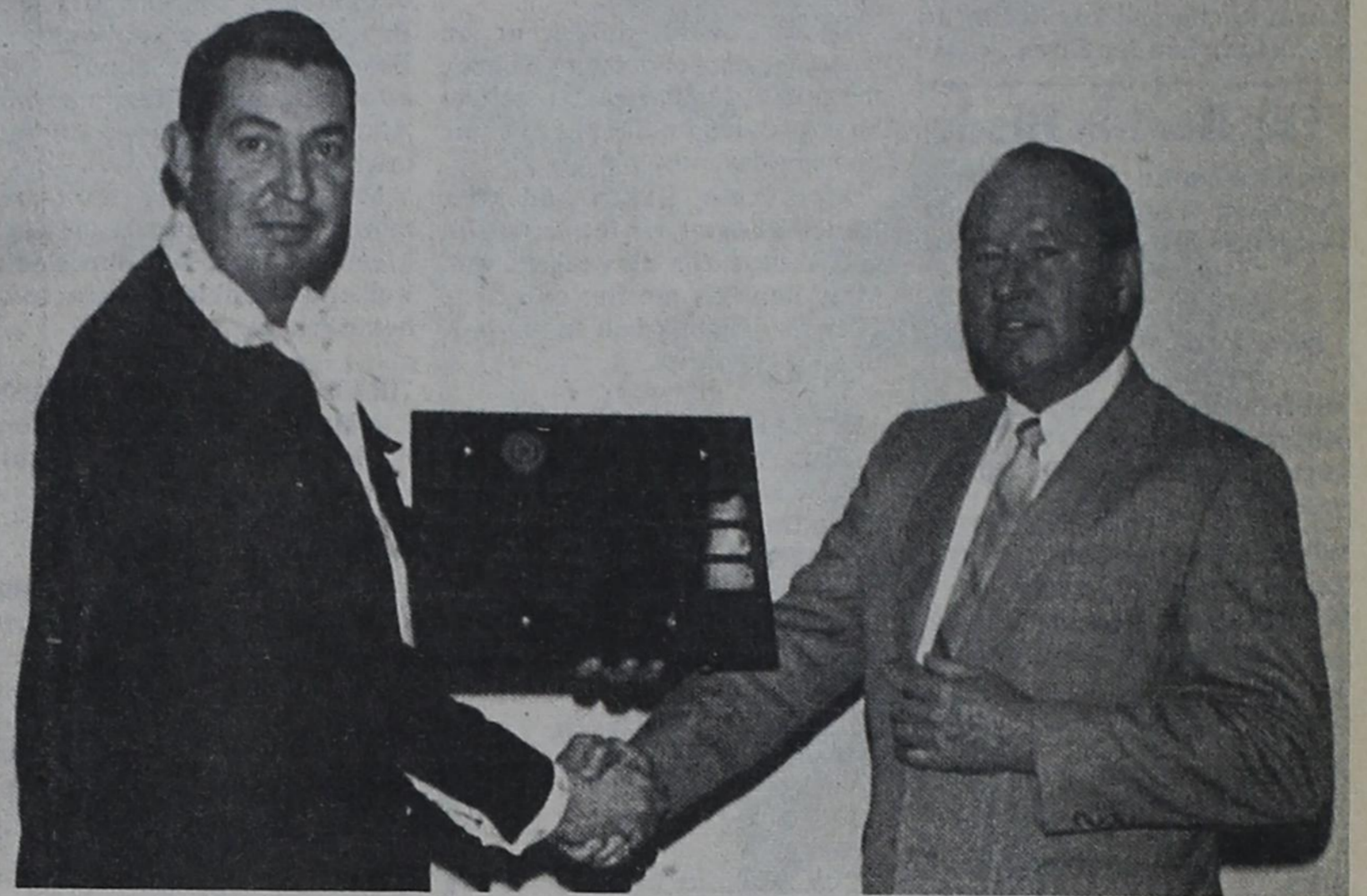
Norma Whitten and Virgie Cary will serve as clerks and Joe Jones will be announcers for the show.

## Bovina Office Wins Award

The Bovina maintenance section of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has been recognized by district officials for outstanding work.

The maintenance section is the January "Section of the Month" for District Five, a 17-county area headquartered in Lubbock.

Foreman Eddie Moore of Bovina received the award Tuesday, January 15 at a meeting in Lubbock. District Engineer William M. Pope presented the plaque to Moore. "This monthly award goes to the section in the district that displays extra effort," said Pope. "Thirty sections in the district are considered for the award, and this month Bovina is tops."

Judging for the award is done by a three member committee that looks at production, safety performance, management cleanliness, general appearance of

location, and morale of personnel.

Fourteen employees make up the Bovina maintenance section and most of them live in Bovina or Friona. "The people of the section won the award," said Moore. "We won it as a group."

By being named a "Section of the Month" winner, the Bovina maintenance section is now eligible for the "Outstanding Section of the Year" award which will be named later. The "Section of the Month" plaque will be on display at the Bovina office during the next couple of weeks.

## BHS Teams Drop Two Olton Games

Bovina High School's varsity basketball teams lost both of their District 3-AA games at Olton last Friday night.

The Fillies lost their second district game to the Olton girls, by a score of 47-36, after which the Mustangs dropped their game, 56-39.

Officials called a whopping 30 fouls on the Fillies, who had four starters foul out of the game, and were obliged to finish the game with only four starters on the court, due to their eight-girl roster.

Bovina had broken on top early in the game, as Marie Pesch scored a pair of first-quarter baskets. Peggy Shepherd sank a shot from the field and one of two from the line, as the Fillies took a 7-4 lead.

But the Olton girls came back with a 17-point second quarter, outscoring Bovina by ten points. Fouls began to play a part in the game, as the Olton team went to the line 13 times in the quarter, making nine shots in the process.

After trailing at the half 21-14, the Fillies came back for a good third quarter. Terisa Shepherd sank a pair of baskets and a free shot, Marie Pesch connected from the field, and Shana Gober and Mindy Neal each sank field goals. This allowed Bovina to trim Olton's lead to three points, 28-25.

But the fourth quarter was a nightmare for Coach Marks Lanham and his team. The Fillies were whistled for fouling 13 times in the quarter, and again, the Olton girls took advantage. The home team hit 15 out of 25 shots from the free throw line during the

period, scoring all but four of their final-quarter points from the foul line.

Marie Pesch scored 12 points before fouling out, and Peggy Shepherd added ten.

In the boys' game, Olton took a 6-2 lead in a low-scoring first quarter, and increased their lead to 19-8 at the half.

Bovina matched the hometown Ponies' point production in the third quarter, but Olton outscored them, 21-15 in the finale, to wrap up the win.

Terry Moore was Bovina's high point man with ten points, and Blake Scaff added eight.

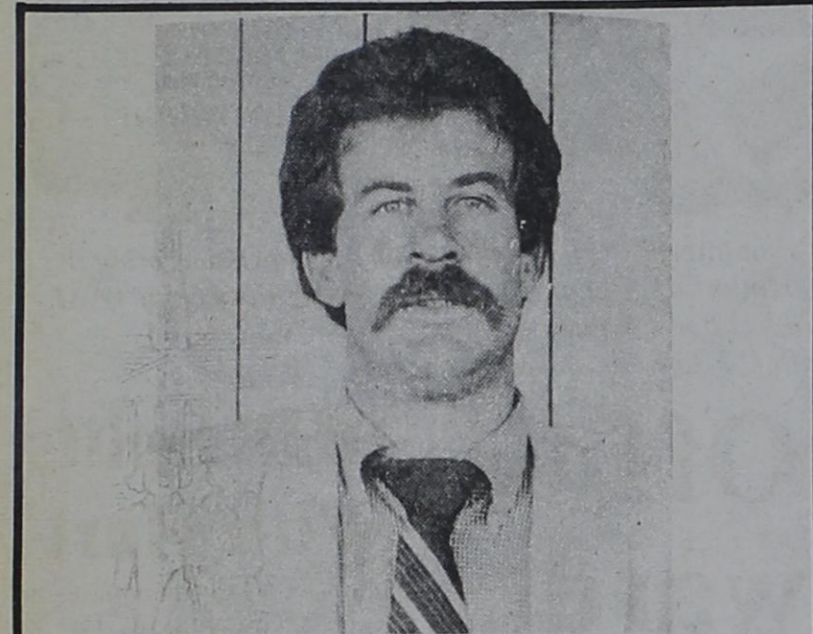
5 YEARS AGO--JAN. 15, 1980

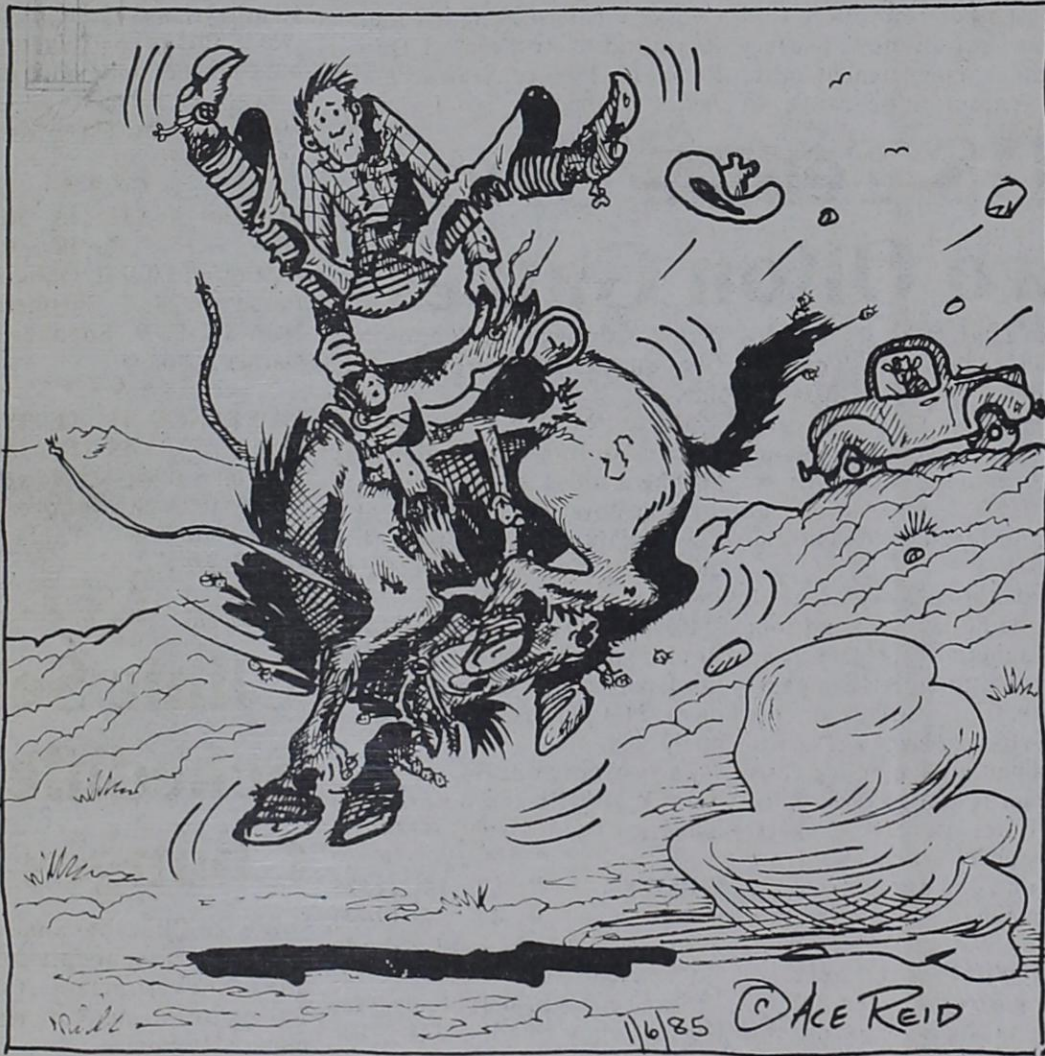

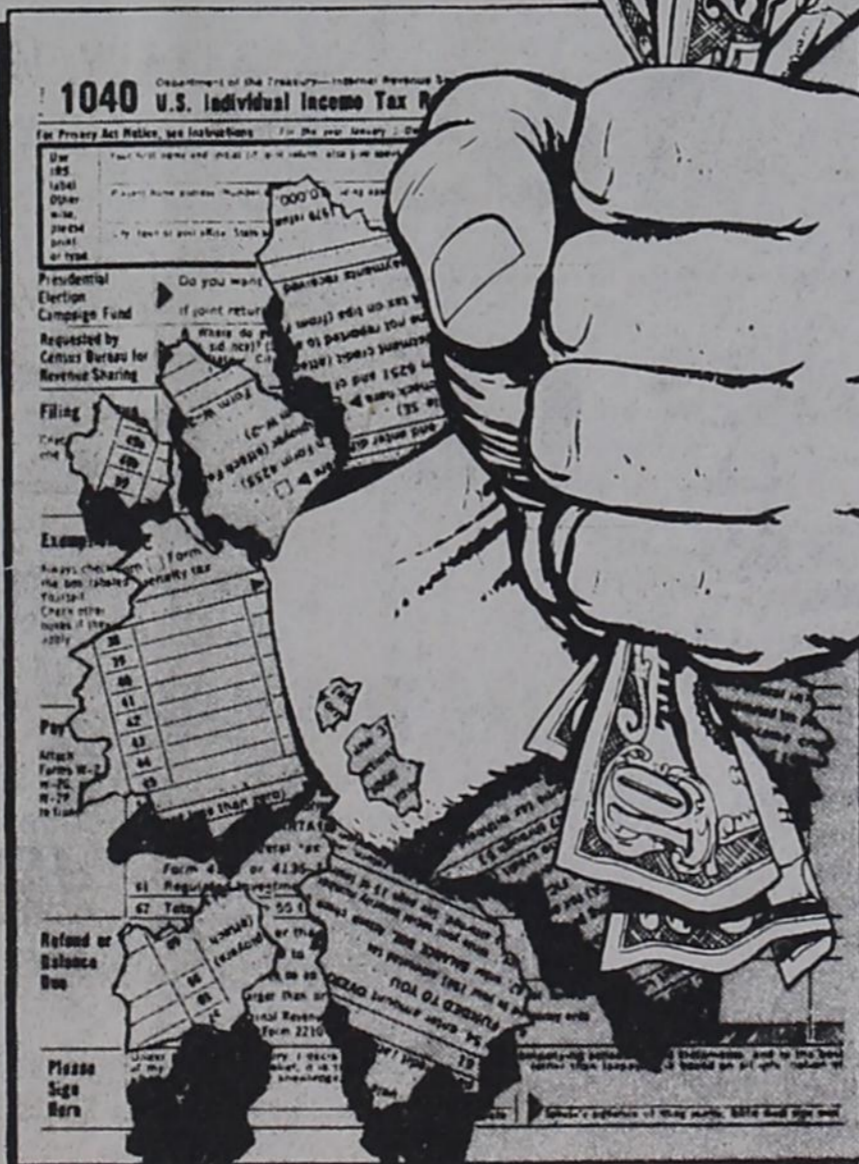

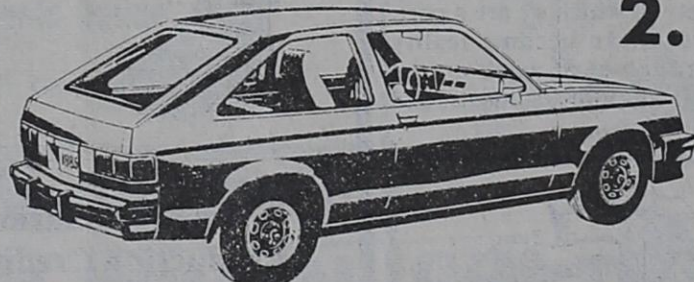
