CHANGES IN BUSINESS

TWO DEALS THIS WEEK CAUSE SURPRISE.

Palace Drug Store and J. V. Searcy Co. Consolidate—Martin Hardware Co. Sells.

Two changes in business circles were made public yesterday and caused no little surprise among Brady citizens who had no idea of either of the moves being contemplated. The first was the announced consolidation of the Palace Drug store and the J. V. Searcy Co., under the name of the former. As soon as the stocks can be invoiced, that of the Palace store will be moved to the building at present occupied by the J. V. Searcy Co., which will be the quarters of the new firm.

In the consolidation, all the present members of the firms will retain stock in the new corporation, the capital stock of the Palace Drug store being increased so as to cover both stocks. Messrs. Camp, Lowrey, Searcy and Quicksall will be active in the business.

That the consolidation is for the best interest of all concerned and for the public, as well, is not only the belief of the parties directly interested, but the consensus of public opinion as well. The gentlemen who will look after the interests of the new corporation are all popular, enterprising and substantial business men, and the centralization of their efforts means that they will not only be able to give more efficient and effective service than ever, but will enable them to expand their business in every direction. Both of the stocks are clean and up-to-date, and the consolidation will give them a stock unsurpassed by any drug store in Southwest Texas. Special attention will be given to the jewelry line, Mr. Searcy having this department under his personal supervision. The stock will be largely increased, and a line equal to that of a city carried. Also the watch and repair business will come in for special attention.

With one accord the friends of the new firm predict success in the highest degree.

The deal of John and P. J. Martin, whereby the interest of both in the Martin Hardware Co., together with all of the

former's property interests, pass into the hands of L. L. Baker, of Hillsboro, is one of immense proportions. The deal was closed on Monday, although it was not made public until yesterday, when the invoicing of the stock of the Martin Hardware & Furniture Co. was begun.

As above stated, the interest of P. J. Martin in the Martin Hardware Co. is his only connection in the deal, he having retained all of his Brady property. John Martin, however, has disposed of all of his holdings here, including his interest in the Martin Hardware & Furniture Co., at Brady, his stock conducted under the same business name at Rochelle, the building occupied by the former on Blackburn street, and his home and residence property. All the property in this vicinity retained by Mr. Martin is a section of land in Kimble county. In the deal Mr. Martin acquires a ranch in Pecos county, and a farm in Hill county, near Hillsboro.

Mr. Baker, accompanied by Messrs. J. F. Hubbard and J. H. Davis, arrived Wednesday, the latter two gentlemen coming to assist in the invoicing and final transfer of the property. Mr. Baker had no announcement to make of his future plans, except to state that the local business would be continued in the same stand. The Standard is glad to welcome Mr. Baker to our city, and can assure him a hearty reception from Brady citizens.

P. J. Martin has been engaged in the hardware and furniture business in Brady for the past five years, part of which time he was associated with J. M. Satterwhite. The latter sold his interest to John Martin something over a year ago. Both P. J. and John Martin have been popular in business circles, and had come to be looked upon as fixtures here. P. J. has not made any plans for the future as yet, but will remain in Brady. John, likewise, is undecided in his plans, although it is likely that he will move to Pecos county to look after his property there. Wherever he goes, the best wishes of the Brady citizens will accompany him.

TAX ROLLS COMPLETE

LARGE INCREASE OVER 1910 ASSESSMENTS.

Assessable Values \$7,756,129 as Compared With \$6,246,989 For Last Year.

The county tax rolls have been completed and show a large increase over last year, the assessable values being \$7,756,129 as against \$6,246,989 in 1910, or an increase of nearly 26 per cent. As published recently, the county ad valorem tax rate has been placed at 16 2-3c, the special tax rate at 2 1/2c, and the tax rate in Road District No. 1 at 33 1-3c on the \$100 valuation, besides the school tax.

The state ad valorem tax rate is 12 1/2c on the \$100 valuation, as against 4c last year, an increase of over 300 per cent. The state school rate is 16 2-3c on the \$100 valuation. These rates were named by the State Automatic Tax board a week or so ago.

The number of poll taxes assessed was 2,128, as against 2,616 last year, a loss of 488.

The county and state total taxes to be paid this year will be \$78,000 as compared with \$48,000 in 1910.

BRADY SERVICE.

Freight and Passenger Service Begins Monday.

According to H. Y. Williams, traveling freight and passenger agent of the Santa Fe, the scheduled freight and passenger service over the Santa Fe between San Saba and Brady begins September 11th. This will be an extension of the service inaugurated between Lometa and San Saba August 8th. Daily service will be given each way, and trains will be run through from Lometa, a distance of sixty-eight miles, without change.

The Santa Fe expects to complete the line to Eden in October, and although surveys have been made from Eden to San Angelo, and also from Eden to Eldorado and Ozona, it is likely that Eden will remain the terminus for several years.

 * NOTES. *

A request has been received by the Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association from Panama for a supply of literature on Texas' resources. The request comes from Mr. J. C. Forman, of Texas, who is now a resident of Panama. Mr. Forman, who is employed by the Government on the canal work, accidentally came across a booklet on Texas, issued by the Commercial Secretaries, and he immediately wrote the association asking for a supply of literature to be distributed in the Canal Zone. While pleased with the conditions in Panama, Mr. Forman has a warm spot in his heart for Texas and plans to return on the completion of the big ditch.

The average number of bales of cotton produced in Texas during the past five years was 3,125,150 bales per annum. During this period the bumper crop was 4,066,472 bales in 1906 and the smallest crop was 2,267,293 bales in 1907. We have in Texas in 1911 an increase in acreage of 518,000.

Too much importance cannot be attached to intelligent exploitation in town building. Exploitation is accomplished mainly through the newspapers, magazines and trade journals, through booklets, pamphlets, etc., by securing conventions and having fairs and other kinds of public gatherings. Still another very valuable avenue is by exhibits at different fairs. But exploitation covers such a large scope that further than those above enumerated cannot be detailed.

This is a day of progress and organization in every line, and the city or town that is in the race for commercial supremacy and is not making this race in an organized manner, such a place is doomed to defeat already.

Conventions and public gatherings are good advertising for a city, provided they are well taken care of. Fairs and exhibitions are essential in exploitations, and every town should have exhibits at the different state fairs, if possible, and too many exhibits are not possible. Country fairs, trades days and things of this kind are also very desirable, and, in addition to their value from this standpoint they are also valuable in stimulating town industries, a harmonious feeling and are generally productive of immediate and material results.

If your town will support other industries than those she has, get them. Offer inducements that are in harmony with the good that will accrue to your town, but beware of the bonus hunter. Many towns have crippled themselves by undertaking to give large bonuses for different things, and, perhaps after it was secured, the thing was valueless to the town but some promoter had filled his coffers, and as a result an elephant had been left on the town. Therefore, great care should be exercised in selecting the enterprise wanted.

The estimate of the state comptroller on taxable values in Texas this year shows an increase of eighty-seven million dollars over last year.

The four new counties which the legislature carved out at the last session make a total of 249 counties in Texas at present. The new counties are Culberson, Jim Wells, Brooks and Willacy, and their total areas approxi-

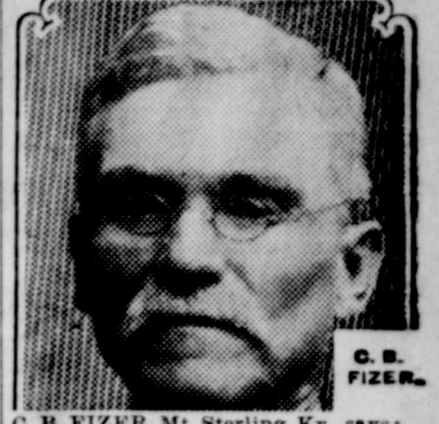

KATEMCEY DEPOT.

Citizens Dissatisfied With Location Selected.

The citizens of Katemcey are greatly dissatisfied with the location selected by the Frisco railroad for the depot site, inasmuch as it is about a mile to the north of the present town-site, and means practically its abandonment.

When the Katemcey railroad committee raised their bonus of something over \$5000 it was with the understanding that the depot grounds were to be located not more than 1000 yards from the present location of the post office. This agreement was made with the Mason railroad committee to whom the notes were made payable. As set forth in the letter from Chief Engineer Jonah, of the Frisco, this location is held to be unsuitable by the Frisco, and unless the Katemcey citizens agree to the new location the Frisco threatens to build through without any station facilities whatever.

It has been charged that some members of the Mason committee had a pecuniary motive for changing the location of the depot site, but this the committee emphatically denies.

The letter from Chief Engineer Jonah reads as follows:

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 28.

Mr. Chas. Bierschwale,
Secretary R. R. Committee,
Mason, Texas.

Dear Sir:—Some time ago I sent you a plat showing where would want the extra widths of right-of-way for the proposed station grounds at Katemcey.

I understand from your letter, that this location is not exactly where the Katemcey people would like to have it, but in explanation of same, want to advise that this line is being located on a one per cent grade line, which means a rise of 53 feet to the mile, and in the neighborhood of Katemcey, we have a very long piece of one per cent grade. There is only one flat place in this grade line, and that is just where we have selected the station grounds.

We could not undertake to put a station on the one per cent grade, because we would have trouble in starting trains if we stopped them there, and unless the Katemcey people can agree to furnish us with the depot grounds where we want it, we will be compelled to go by there without any station facilities whatever, and we will not put any station at Katemcey at all, but will go to the top of the hill about three miles south.

Mr. Smith, who came before the
council and requested that they
do not grant this franchise, but
after considerable discussion of
the matter, it was finally passed.

OKLAHOMA OIL BOOM.

**Gets Fever Following Success
at Electra.**

Lawton, Okla., Sept. 5.—Good-
man Bros., operating in the Tula-
sa oil field, today closed a con-
tract with the Chattanooga
Commercial club to prospect on
8,000 acres of land surrounding
the town for oil and gas.

They must bore a 2,000-foot
well. The leases were easily se-
cured.

C. O. Rossa, a prominent op-
erator of the Coffeyville and
Tulsa fields, is also in Chatta-
nooga securing leases. The oil
fever is sweeping Comanche
county, following the opening
up of the Electra field just
across the Red river in Texas.

The above dispatch shows the
efforts being made elsewhere to
develop oil fields that are no
more promising than those al-
ready developed here in McCul-
loch county. As will be noted,
the contract calls for the boring
of a 2,000-foot well, whereas, in
the two wells at Lohn, oil bear-
ing sands were struck at a depth
of a fraction over 200 feet.

AN ORDINANCE.

Whereas, it is deemed necessary, for the security of life, and for the safe operation of engines and trains on the line of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company, as same is located and is to run through the city of Brady, that certain streets and alleys within the city and at places where the same now extend across the right-of-way of said railway company in said city be closed, and,

Whereas, said railway company has requested that same be closed and is willing, in consideration thereof, to pay to the said City of Brady the sum of One Hundred (\$100) Dollars, and,

Whereas, the said proposal and request of said railway company, as above set out, and the consideration above expressed is deemed reasonable and full and adequate compensation to the said City of Brady for the proposed closing of said streets and alleys, and it further being deemed by this council to be in the interests of this city that said streets and alleys should be closed, and that the public welfare requires the same; therefore, in consideration of the premises,

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Brady:

Sec. 1. That the following streets and alleys located within the City of Brady, and at and between the points where the same cross or have been proposed to cross the right-of-way of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company within the said City of Brady, be and the same are hereby declared to be forever closed and not opened as streets and alleys, to-wit:

High Street.
All that portion of High street included between the south line of North Third (3rd) street and in a line 150 southward and parallel with the located center line of the Lometa west extension of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company, said located center line crosses the eastern line of said High street at Location Station 18887 plus 87, at a point 98 feet southward along said eastern line from the northwestern corner of Block No. 59 of the original town of Brady, and crosses the western line of said High street at Location Station 18888 plus 53, at a point 98.5 feet southward along said western line from the northeastern corner of Block No. 60, of the original town of Brady.

Walnut Street.
All that portion of Walnut street included between the northern right-of-way line and the southern right-of-way line of the Lometa west extension of the G. C. & S. F. Ry. The said southern right-of-way line crosses the eastern line of said street at a point 65.9 feet southward, measured along the western line of Block No. 61 (Melton Heights Addition) from Location Station 18898 plus 57 in the located center line of said railway, and

crosses the western line of said street at a point 57.5 feet southward, measured along the eastern line of Block No. 62 (Melton Heights Addition) from Location Station 18899 plus 23 in said located center line.

The said northern right-of-way line crosses the eastern line of said street at a point 34.1 feet northward, measured along the western line of Block No. 61 (Melton Heights Addition) from Location Station 18898 plus 57 in said located center line, and crosses the western line of said street at a point 42.5 feet northward, measured along the eastern line of Block No. 62 (Melton Heights Addition) from Location Station 18899 plus 23 in said located center line.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and publication.

AN ORDINANCE

Granting the Right-of-way to the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company to lay certain tracks in the City of Brady.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Brady: That the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company be, and it is hereby granted the right-of-way and privilege of constructing, maintaining and operating a track upon, over and along Magnolia street in Lühr's Addition to the City of Brady, entering said Magnolia street through the south line of Eleventh (11th) street and running thence north along said Magnolia street, the center line of said track being 22.5 feet from and parallel with the east line of said Magnolia street, along the west side of Block 82, 81, 64, 63, 46, 45 28, 27, 10 and 9 and crossing 11th, 10th, 9th, 8th, 7th, 6th, 5th, 4th, 3rd and 2nd streets of said addition, to the north line of said addition, same being the north line of Blocks 8 and 9, and such side tracks connected to above described track as shall be needed to serve industries located or which shall hereafter be located along or adjacent to said Magnolia street.

Section 2. That should said Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe railway Company avail itself of this grant, it shall construct and keep in good repair all necessary ditches, rains, culverts and street crossings thereon; its tracks shall be laid in such grade lines as are practicable, and upon such grades as shall be established by the city and furnished by the City Engineer, or other engineer appointed by the city for that purpose; and the city reserves the right to change the grades thereof, if deemed necessary, and in event of such changes, said company shall make its roadbed conform to such change free of expense to the city. Said company shall cause its tracks to be at all times so laid and kept as to offer no

obstruction at any time to easy passage of vehicles at such places as it may be lawful for them to pass.

Section 3. That the said City of Brady shall not be held responsible for any injury done to, or for the taking of any property not belonging to the said City of Brady for the use and benefit of said Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe Railway Company.

Section 4. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage and publication.

Passed and approved this 5th day of September, A. D. 1911, under a suspension of Rule 21.

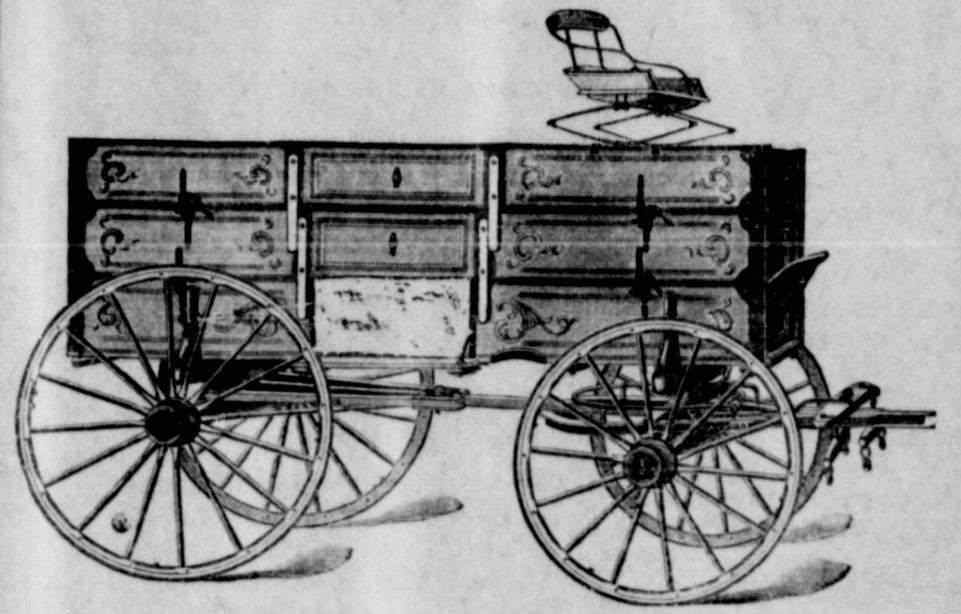
