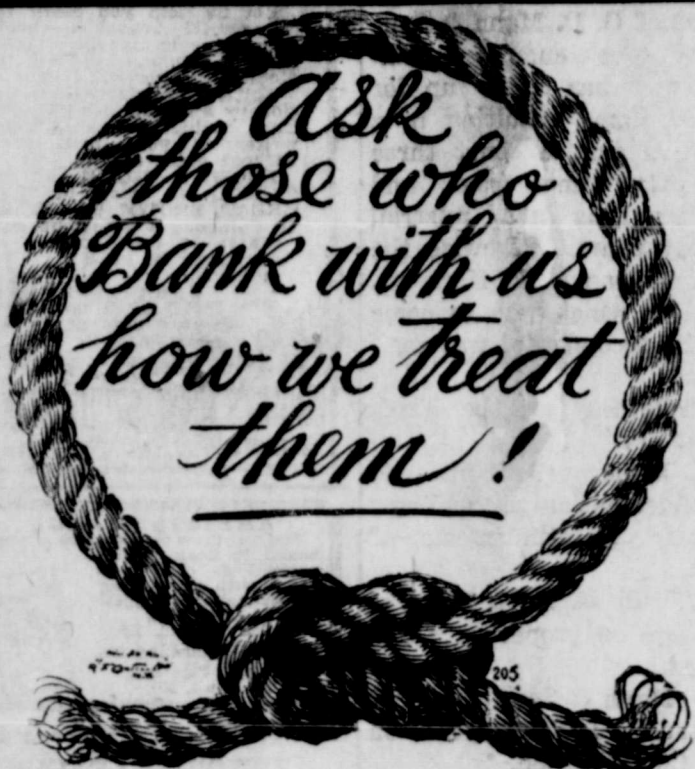

### CUTTING AFFRAY.

Andrew Olson Killed at Brownwood by Renter.

H. T. Knape, of the East Sweden community, was in Brady Saturday, having just returned from Brownwood where he attended the funeral of his cousin, Andrew Olson, who died at Brownwood Wednesday as the result of knife wounds inflicted by his renter, A. J. Parker, of the Ebony, Mills county community.

The trouble arose over rents, and following a heated argument, they came to an encounter in which Parker cut several gashes in Olson's leg, from which the latter bled to death before medical assistance could be obtained.

The deceased was well known in Brady, having at one time made his home here. His brother, Albert Olson, is a prominent contractor, and built the McCulloch county courthouse, the Commercial National Bank building, and various other public buildings here.

Both parties to the affray stood well in their communities. Parker surrendered to the officers and was placed in the Brown county jail.

## COMMENDABLE SPIRIT.

A matter that has been brought to our attention is the number of compromises that have been reached in cases that have been up in county court, and The Standard desires to commend the spirit that prompts these amicable adjustments of differences. It is not generally known that the law provides for arbitration boards where parties, desiring to avoid court and jury costs, may have their differences settled, and whose decisions may be as binding as any court ruling. The tendency to rush into court with every trivial matter is being discouraged generally, and the time will some day come when the majority of differences between individuals, as well as between nations, will be settled by arbitration.

## COUNTY COURT.

### Three Important Cases Settled by Compromise.

Several cases have been disposed of in County court since the civil docket was taken up, among them being three cases that were settled by compromise out of court. Of these, was that of O. D. Mann & Sons vs. J. W. Meek and A. J. Kinney, which has come up for trial five times, resulting in a mistrial in justice court three out of four times tried, and again resulting in a mistrial in county court. Likewise the case of Wilbanks & Kerr vs. Dr. Holley which was to come up for its second trial was compromised.

J. E. Keeler vs. Santa Fe Ry., condemnation proceedings. Verdict for plaintiff in sum of \$1,400.

D. W. Hill vs. S. H. Mayo et al, damage on property. Compromised.

O. D. Mann & Sons vs. J. W. Meek and A. J. Kinney, suit on debt. Compromised.

Wilbanks & Kerr vs. Dr. Holley, suit on account. Compromised.

J. T. Lake vs. J. C. Woodward, suit on notes. Judgment for plaintiff.

The Federal Government reports the 1911 hay crop of the United States will approximate 46,939,000 tons as compared with 60,978,000 in 1910, making a shortage of 14,009,000 tons in the 1911 crop as against the 1910 yield, and the 1910 crop was 3,000,000 bales below the annual ten year average. In 1911 Texas produced 600,000 tons of hay, and in 1910 we produced 711,000 tons. We consume probably four times more hay than we produce.

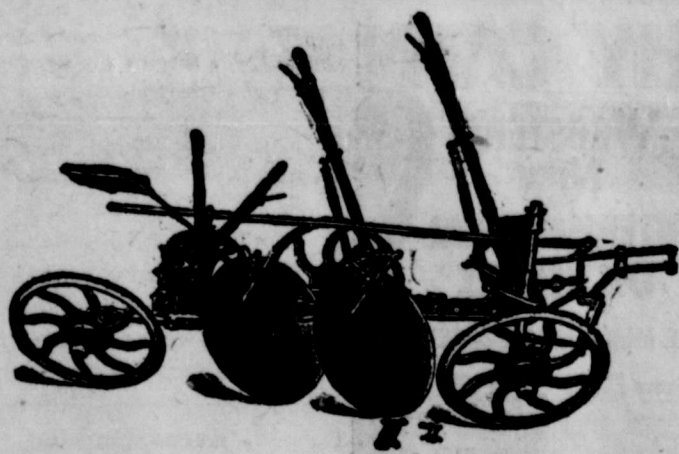

### TEXAS INDUSTRIAL NOTES.

Mr. J. F. Peck of Sulphur Springs, has just marketed nine acres of potatoes which brought one hundred bushels to the acre. The net profit which Mr. Peck realized from his nine acres after deducting the cost of cultivating, fertilizer, etc., was six hundred and ninety-four dollars, and the land is now planted in cotton. There are unlimited possibilities for the diversified farmer in Texas and the experience of Mr. Peck is only one out of many hundreds throughout the state.

A rich silver mine was recently discovered near Marathon, Brewster county, by a party of young men who were out prospecting.

Another oil gusher, the second brought in recently, is reported from the Electra field. The new well is owned by the Producers Oil Co.

Mrs. C. P. Taft, wife of the brother of the President, is preparing to make extensive improvements on her land in Southwest Texas. Mrs. Taft is one of the largest single land holders in Texas and has over a quarter of a million acres of land in Dimmitt, La Salle and Webb counties. Mrs. Taft has great faith in the future of Texas and is preparing to have over one hundred thousand acres of this land brought under cultivation in the near future.

The Mart fair association is working for the development of the state and that section in a very successful way. In addition to the big list of premiums on corn, cotton, calves, pigs, etc., a special list of premiums will be offered for the finest babies. The fair will open on the morning of July 19th and it is expected that one of the finest collections of babies ever seen in the state will be on exhibition at Mart. President Bass, of the fair association, deserves great credit for thus encouraging the stork in Texas and when the same encouragement is given to the raising of babies as is the case with fine stock Texas will take a long stride forward in her development. Texas needs more babies and better babies.

The Agricultural Bulletin issued by the Federal Census Bureau on cotton production for 1910 shows 32,403,000 acres of cotton harvested in 1910, yielding 13,432,131 bales of 500 pounds each; the average production per acre being 171 pounds. The average price of cotton was \$14.69 per hundred pounds. The average number of bales ginned by the Texas gins was 724. The distribution of our cotton production shows 39 per cent manufactured in the U. S., 52 per cent exported and 9 per cent remained in the country at the close of the year. There was imported in the United States during the year 136,740 bales, the cotton coming from Peru, China, India and Egypt. The total stock of cotton in the country at the close of business February 28th, 1911, shows 38 per cent held by manufacturers, 43 per cent in independent warehouses and 19 per cent in other hands. The United States produced 60 per cent of the total quantity of the cotton crop of the world; British India, 18 per cent; Egypt 8 per cent and Peru, 4 per cent.

Probably the first bank in the United States for the exclusive use of students will be established at Texas Christian University with the opening of the fall term this week. All students entering the university who have any surplus funds on hand will be urged to place it on deposit in the bank, and they can thus meet all their

college bills with checks on their deposits there.

The Rural High School Law is adapted to the needs of every county in the state regardless of population and educational development. It is one of the wisest and best laws ever passed in Texas, and in a short while we will be seeing the advantages that it has brought to our girls and boys.

The State Board of Education recently purchased \$53,000 of school bonds of various counties at 5 per cent and par, for the benefit of the school fund. The board made appropriations for state aid under the act of the Thirty-second Legislature, varying from \$500 to \$2000, for the purpose of establishing departments of domestic science, agriculture and manual training in various common and independent districts throughout the state.
