Baccalaureate Address by Dr. C. S. Potts—31 Pupils Receive Certificates of Award.

The close of the Brady public schools for this term was marked by the commencement exercises of the Class of '13 Thursday night. On Sunday, May 11th, Rev. D. R. Hardison

Owing to threatening weather, many were unable to attend, but the pupils and parents and the friends and acquaintances of the graduates began to assemble at 7:30 o'clock, and when the exercises were opened the large auditorium was quite well filled.

The spacious platform was decorated in white and gold, the class colors, and green live oak formed a most attractive background. Upon the arched curtain in letters of gold upon a white background was the class motto: "Aut invenimus viam aut faciemus," while in the center were the words, "Class of '13."

The services were opened with prayer by Rev. I. T. Morris. Supt. W. L. Hughes announced the omission of the musical numbers on the program on account of the absence of some of those who were to take part.

The addresses of the two graduates followed. In a sweet, musical voice Miss Bernice Bell rendered her essay, "Looking Backward." Both Miss Bell and Mr. Doole made a deep and lasting impression upon the audience, not only by the excellence of their papers, but the splendid manner in which they carried out their part of the exercises, and were loudly applauded. At the conclusion of their numbers, each was showered with beautiful bouquets, among which could be seen the class flower, the daisy.

Dr. C. S. Potts of the State University delivered the baccalaureate address, telling of the needs of the schools of Texas, and of the necessity of increasing the salaries of the teachers to assure the securing of the very best talent. He was frequently interrupted in the course of his remarks by the hearty applause of those present.

**BRADY TAKES SERIES**

WIN THURSDAY AND FRI-  
DAY'S GAMES.

Brady High School Team Lays  
Claim to West Texas Cham-  
pionship—To Play Mason.

The Brady high school base  
ball team defeated the Coman-  
che team in a three-game series  
here Thursday, Friday and Sat-  
day, winning Thursday's contest  
by a score of 1-0. This was  
about the best exhibition of the  
national sport seen on the local  
diamond this season, the fea-  
ture of the game being the feur-  
ing of both teams. The battery  
for the locals was Morris and  
M. Fuller and for the visitors,  
Adams and Carwile.

In the second game of the se-  
ries, with Davidson on the rub-  
ber for the locals and M. Fuller  
doing the receiving the locals  
were again victors, winning by  
a score of 8 to 6. Graham and  
Carwile were at the points for  
Comanche.

Saturday's game was hotly  
contested from the start, the  
boys going down in defeat by a  
7th inning rally by the visitors,  
by a score of 10 to 5.

Up to the beginning of the  
seventh inning the score stood  
4 to 3 in favor of High, but the  
visitors seemed to recover their  
batting eyes in this inning and  
with the assistance of several  
glaring errors on the part of  
the locals cinched the game by  
putting five runners over the  
pan. Steffins pitched a good  
game for the boys, but the sup-  
port accorded him was not of a  
class to cause him to do his  
best. He had almost perfect  
control, passing only one man,  
and with the support his work  
deserved should have won his  
game easily. Charlie Fuller on  
third for the high school star-  
red in the error column, while  
Boyd at second led him a close  
second—the former with eight  
chances rolling up five errors to  
his credit, while Boyd collected  
his four bobbles out of seven  
chances. Several of these  
chances were difficult to han-  
dle and the boys were excusa-  
ble to a great extent on this ac-  
count.

The feature of the game for  
the visitors was the pitching of  
Graham, who had pitched the  
game the preceding day and was  
anxious to go in again Satur-  
day in order that he might re-  
deem himself. And he did it.  
He was more liberal in gifts than  
was Steffins, but in the  
pinches he was generally able  
to lob them over where the boys  
couldn't touch them. He pass-  
ed four men and had five strike-  
outs to his credit.

Millard Fuller caught an ex-  
cellent game for the school boys,  
not allowing a single steal and  
laced out a long three-bagger  
to left field, scoring two men  
ahead of him.

The Brady team goes to  
Mason today for one game on Wed-  
nesday and will play Coleman  
here Thursday, Friday and Sat-  
urday of next week.

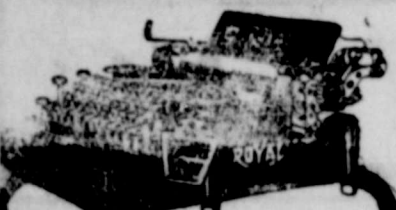

**MORE SPLENDID RAINS**

NEARLY ALL PARTS OF THE COUNTY BENEFITTED.

Heavy Rain in Brady Sunday Afternoon — Seven-Tenths Inches Is Recorded Fall.

Apparently it is an easy matter to have a rain in McCulloch county. Just let a farmer express the wish for some rain about the latter part of the week—and lo and behold, it rains as per order! During the past four or five days we have had more rains than are required to drown all the frogs in McCulloch county.

Thursday prospects appeared good for a general rain, but a bare sprinkle was all that was had, except out in the Gansel community, where a good rain was reported. Gansel appears to have been a prime favorite with the rainmaker, in fact, for another good rain was had Saturday night, and still another Sunday afternoon. Lohn was also visited by good rains both Saturday night and Sunday afternoon, about an inch and a half of rainfall being recorded, and the fields in some places were washed to greater or less extent. The rain was particularly heavy beyond Lohn, while this side it was much lighter. Fife and Stacy had good rains Saturday night, and some hail was reported at Stacy.

Sunday afternoon's rain was partial, and appears to have followed a narrow path through sections of McCulloch county. At Brady the rain commenced falling about 3 o'clock, and continued for an hour and a half, the total precipitation being .7 inches. The rain reached as far east as Bumgardner's, south-east to the stockyards, while but a light sprinkle was had in the southwest part of town. West of town it extended as far as Callan, and northwest to Lohn. Both Brady creek and Live Oak were up, the former being higher than during the last rain, while Live Oak was equally as high as it was a week ago.

Onion Gap had a good rain, while Rochelle had a bare sprinkle. The Voca and Camp San Saba communities were also in the heaviest of the rain, which extended south of these places as far as the Mason mountains. Pontotoc and Fredonia also had heavy rains, the rain Thursday at Pontotoc being accompanied by a heavy hail which is said to have ruined practically everything in the fields. Many farmers went into their fields following the rain and planted their crops over.

Despite the heavy clouds in the north and northeast Sunday night, accompanied by vivid flashes of lightning, no rain in this immediate section was had except at Melvin, where a good downpour is reported. The threatening aspect of the clouds gave rise to fears of a wind or hail storm, and many citizens prepared to take refuge in their storm cellars at a moment's notice, but fortunately the storm did not come.

While the rain was not greatly needed, yet it was welcome and will help out both oats and feed crops, as well as benefitting cotton. Oats are reported filling out nicely, and with the immense acreage in McCulloch a large yield is assured if nothing unforeseen occurs.

**More and More Rain.**

It rained again! That was last night—Monday night, to be more specific. And it rained a very nice shower in Brady, the total being about .15 inches. The amount of rainfall varied considerably, being heavy at some places and lighter at others, but seems to have followed two paths, one from San Saba

A serious difficulty occurred at Alejandro Flores' camp in the Waring pasture Saturday night. Two Mexicans, Dan Rocha and P. Gerrero, came to his tank in the night well tanked on Menard "fire water." About 1 or 2 o'clock Sunday morning D. Rocha was attacked with a dirk knife in the hands of P.
