RAIN COVERS COUNTY

THREE DAYS' PRECIPITATION TOTALS 4.6 INCHES

Heavy Downpour Tuesday Night Much Needed Stock Water Received in Abundance.

The much wished-for "hard rain" has been had, and stockmen who have had to haul water, no longer look askant at the skies, for the tanks throughout the McCulloch country are filled to overflowing. Three days of rain, with a total rainfall of 4.6 inches, has filled every desire, and the sunshine this morning is again welcome.

The heaviest rain was had Tuesday night. Big spattering drops began falling at 12:45 p. m., and for a little better than an hour the rain fell in sheets.

At 2:05 the rain gauge at the Commercial bank had registered 1.6 inches.

The rain continued falling practically all day Wednesday and Wednesday night and last night another shower was had.

The rain gauge registered the following:
September 15th2.65
September 16th1.35
September 17th60

Total4.60

Cotton picking, which had just opened in full blast, has been temporarily stopped, and the cotton grades will doubtless be lowered by the rain. Nevertheless, the securing of stock water, and the splendid season given maize and late feed will more than counterbalance the harm occasioned. With cotton prices steadily climbing the farmers are all in good spirits, and greater prosperity than ever is anticipated.

The portal is Italian Renaissance in form and treatment, but much of the ornamentation is of more recent origin. The photograph gives no idea of the great dimensions of this portal, which is sixty-six feet in height to the tip of the ornamentation surmounting the arch. The eagles above the line of pilasters of the portal are six feet in height. The Exposition palaces are constructed of grayish cream plaster in imitation of Travertine marble.
