All in all, we thought the 1977 version of Bull Town Days was a success, and we commend chairman Steve Sherrill, and all of the hard working community-minded individuals who were in any way responsible for the events.

The meal consisted of boneless beef, pinto beans, cantaloupe and onion slices. The last two named items were contributed by Gateway Farms of Bovina. Bovina Schools Start

The Bovina Schools start the 1977-'78 school year this coming Monday at 8:55 a.m.

Classes will begin each day at 8:55 a.m. and dismiss at 3:35 p.m. for all students in grades three through 12. Kindergarten through second grade students will be dismissed at 3:20 p.m. each day, according to Superintendent Larry Wilson.

The lunch period will be adjusted according to class schedules being developed.

Two early classes are scheduled in driver education and short hand. They will begin at 8 a.m. and end at 8:55 a.m.

All students, with the exception of those enrolled in the 8 a.m. classes, are asked not to report to the school campus before 8:45 a.m. each morning, unless a teacher conference is requested.

Students in kindergarten through sixth grades will register the first day of school, with junior high and high school students registering on Friday, August 26.

High school students will register in the library Friday, with seniors registering from 9 to 10:30 a.m.; juniors from 10:30 a.m. to 12 noon; sophomores from 1 to 2:30 p.m. and freshmen from 2:30 to 4 p.m.

Junior high students will register in the cafeteria, the seventh grade from 10 a.m. to 12 noon, and the eighth grade from 1:30 to 3 p.m. New students are also requested to register at the times listed above.

Kindergarten and first grade pupils who were not pre-registered should bring complete immunization and birth records the first day of

school, according to Jim Noyes, elementary principal.

Kindergarten classes in Bovina Schools will be offered once again on the same basis as the past four years for all five-year-old children. Kindergarten students who will attend the second semester term

beginning in January will not register until that time.

All school-age children, under the state's compulsory immunization law, must be immunized against diphtheria, measles, tetanus and polio before they will be allowed to enroll.

Ponies Look Good In 1st Scrimmage

With the first of two scrimmages over the Mustang coaching staff is well pleased with the progress the players have shown in the past few days.

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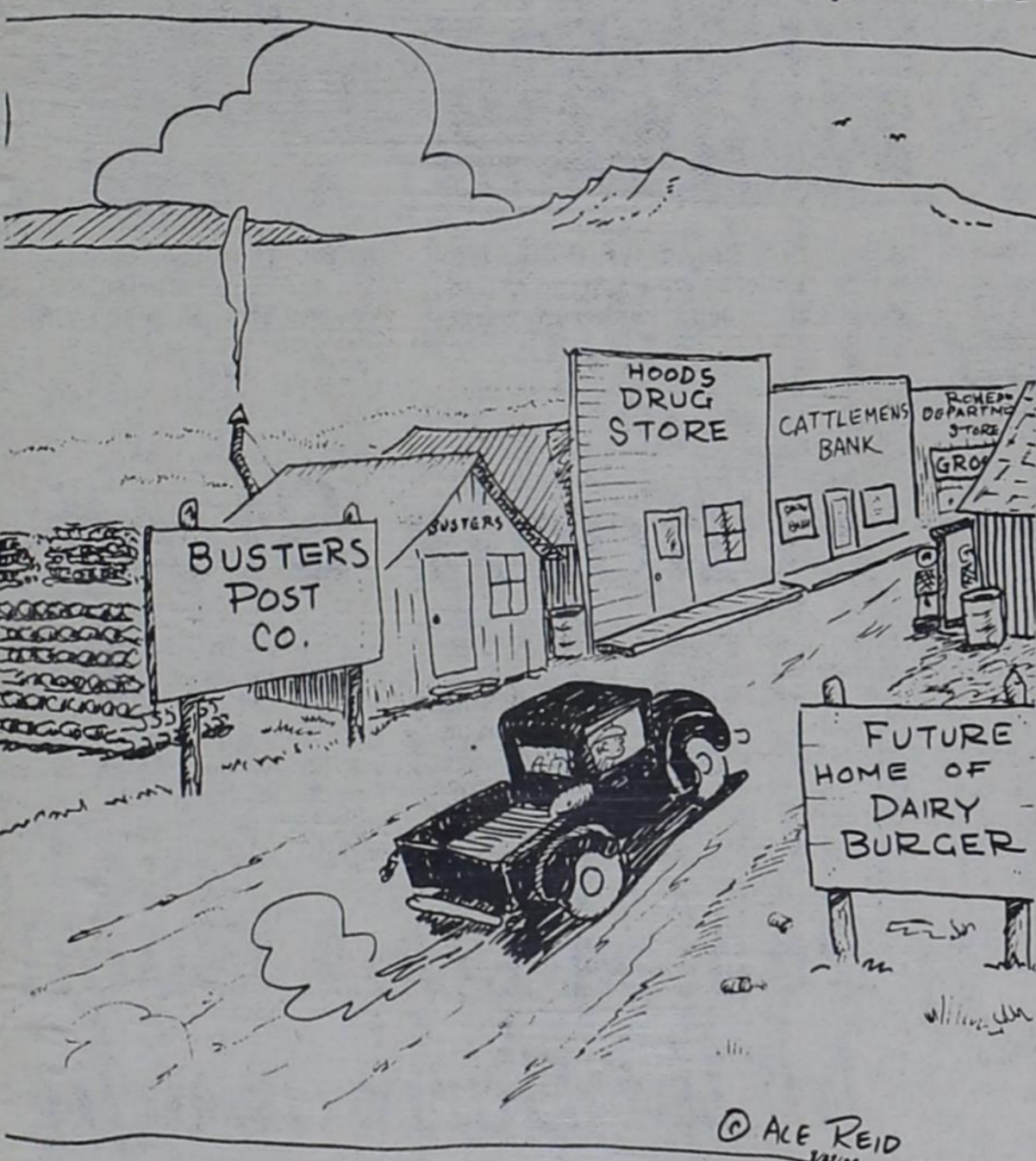

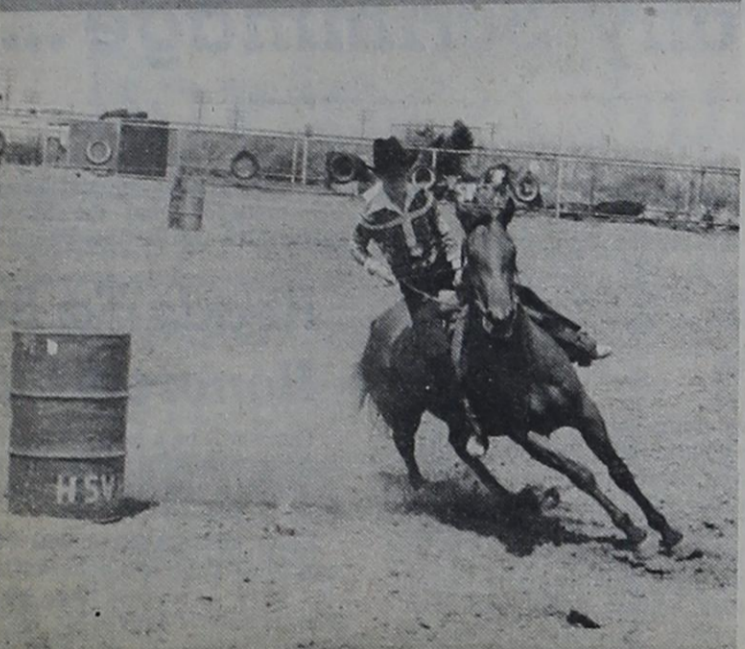
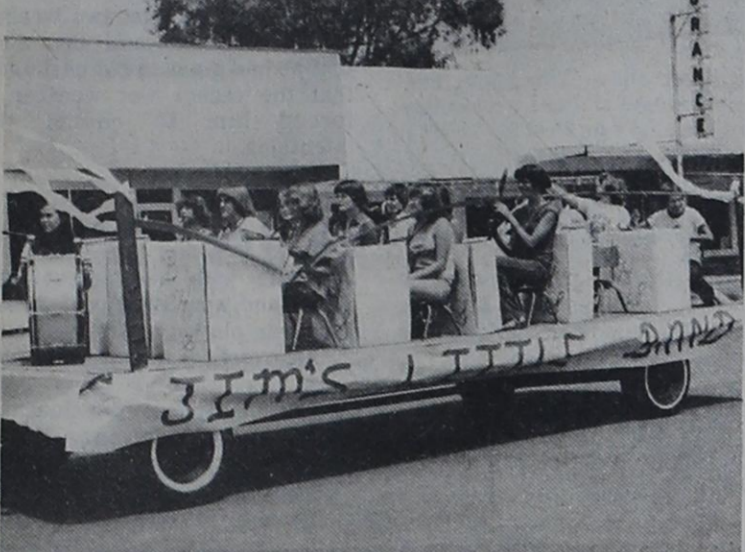
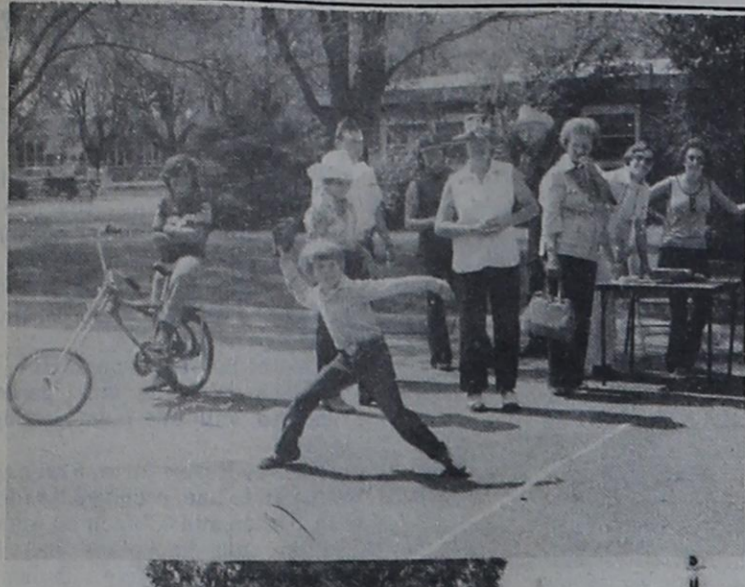

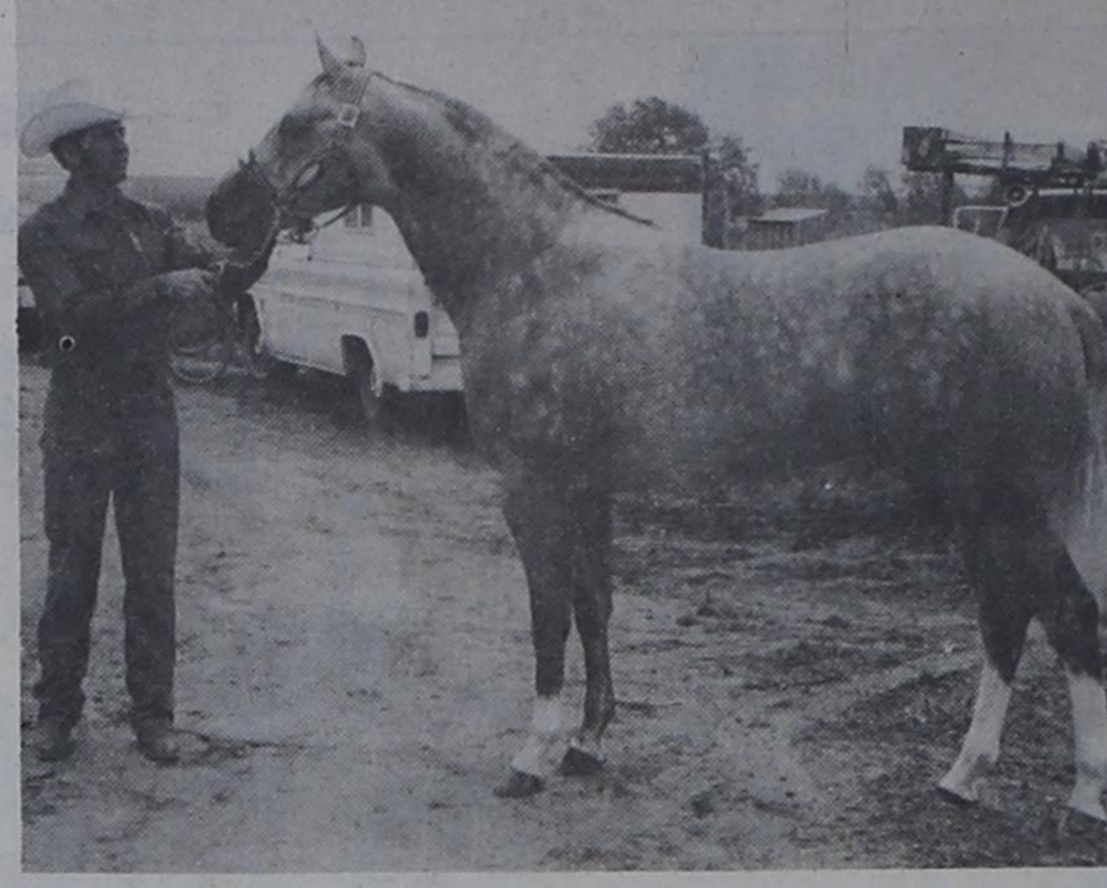

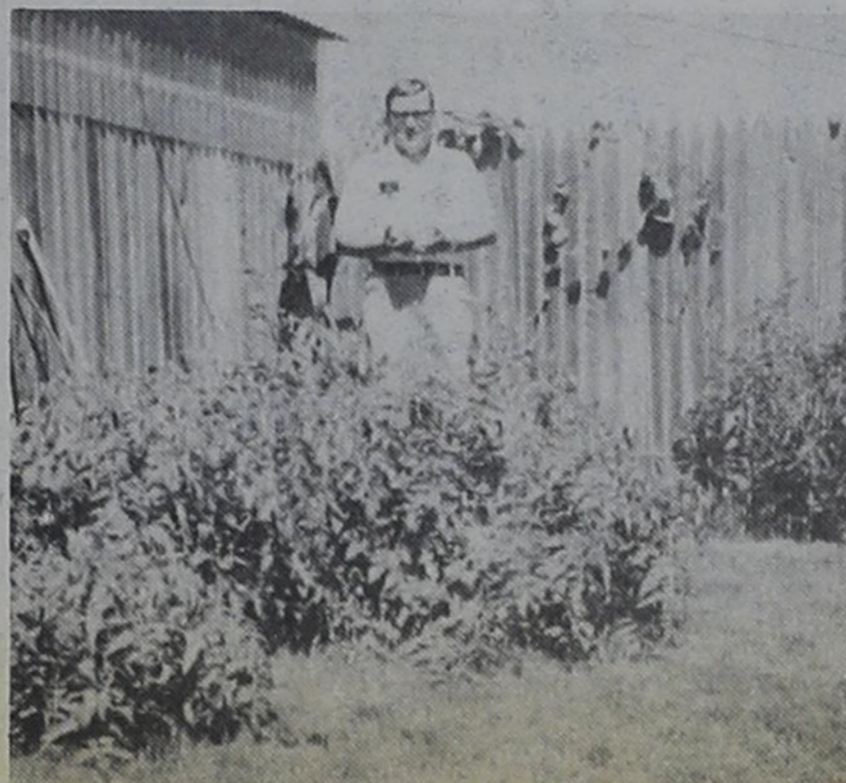

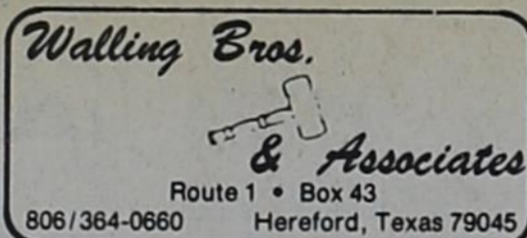
