SAN ANGELO VOTES \$150,000.00 IN BONDS TO PAVE STREETS

San Angelo, Nov. 30.—A \$150,000 street paving bond issue was voted Tuesday by property owners, 564 to 313. The proceeds from the bonds, bearing 6 per cent interest and maturing in 30 years, option of being redeemed in half that time, will pave 5 miles of streets and connect important highways. The vote was the heaviest polled in several years.

CIVIC LEAGUE HAS INTERESTING MEETING—LOWER WATER RATES ENDORSED

The Civic league held an interesting meeting on last Friday night, at which numbers of matters of interest to the community were taken up for discussion. Among other things, H. L. Hughes reported on the progress of the Brady band, stating that the band members were fortunate in having a very able instructor, which accounted for the remarkable progress that organization had made. The Civic league is interested in providing a band stand for this organization, and hopes soon to have its plans consummated.

Dr. B. L. Cradeock briefly outlined a suggestion that the citizens of Brady co-operate to wage a fight on mosquitoes and flies during the coming year, suggesting that all tanks, barrels and other containers of water be given applications of coal oil from time to time to kill the wigglitais, and thereby eliminate the mosquitos favorite breeding place. It was also suggested that all housewives punch holes in the bottom of discarded tin cans, so no water could collect in them. Another suggestion was that every citizen provide himself with fly traps the coming spring and use them persistently. In this way, the flies can be killed before they have time to breed.

Another matter of interest was the better lighting of Brady streets, and following discussion of the subject, a committee was appointed to take the matter up with the city council and the water and light commission, and ascertain what steps might be taken to provide for the lighting of both Blackburn and Bridge streets. The same committee was also instructed to take up the matter of reducing the water rates during the coming year, the Civic league voting in favor of a rate of \$1.75 for the first 1,000 gallons, 50c for the second 1,000 gallons, and 25c for each additional 1,000 gallons. With a rate in line with these figures, the body felt that much civic improvement and beautifying of homes might be accomplished during the coming year.

IMPROVING METHODIST TABERNACLE TO PROVIDE ENTERTAINMENT PLACE

Brady's lack of a suitable auditorium for the holding of entertainments, lyceum numbers and the like, has been overcome by the action of the Epworth league, with Jas. T. Mann as leader, in enclosing the Methodist tabernacle, and as well the rebuilding of the platform and rearranging of the interior. The enclosing of the screened side walls, serves to protect the auditorium from wintry blasts, and two great heaters will make the interior warm and comfortable. Windows on both sides and the rear of the tabernacle will enable light and ventilation under ordinary circumstances. The side walls are hinged, which will enable their being thrown open in the summer time, enabling practically the same light and air as before the tabernacle was enclosed.

The lecture platform is being enlarged, and when completed will have a width of 50 ft., with a depth of 18 ft., ample to accommodate any entertainment. The reconstructed tabernacle will be dedicated on next Friday night, at which time the second number of the Lyceum course is to be presented.

ROCHELLE GOOD ROADS ASSN. ORGANIZED MONDAY

A committee of Brady good roads enthusiasts journeyed to Rochelle Monday afternoon for the purpose of talking the road bonds and of assisting the Rochelle live wires in completing a local Good Roads association. Included in the party were Messrs B. Simpson, Evans Adkins, C. H. Vincent, Geo. H. Ehlinger, Howard Broad, C. A. Trigg and Drs. J. G. McCall and J. B. Granville. They report a most courteous reception accorded them upon the part of the Rochelle citizens and business men, who discussed with them the good roads question from various angles.

As evidencing their desire to aid in the work of locating the road in the most advantageous manner, so as to make it of greatest service to the greatest number of citizens, various landowners of Rochelle have volunteered to give right of way along the most direct route. Included in the number was Jack Crew, who very generously offered right of way thru his land, and this spirit was likewise evidenced by other landowners along that route.

Organization of the Rochelle Good Roads association was completed with O. E. Rice, chairman, Roy Barton, vice-chairman, R. C. Boyd, secretary and Dr. Sterling Price, treasurer.

The Rochelle Good Roads association plans to hold a mass meeting in the near future, at which proponents of the road bond issue will be invited to present the good roads bond issue. It is expected to have Judge L. C. Matthews and Engineer W. E. Dickerson of Coleman county present at this meeting to give practical experience and advice upon the matter of road building.

Organization of the Good Roads association at Rochelle is to be followed by the organization of similar associations in all the various communities of the county. These community organizations, in turn, will send their chairman, or an alternate, to represent them in the councils of the Executive committee of the McCulloch County Good Roads association. Thus, every community organization will not only have representation upon the Executive committee, but each organization will be enabled to use its influence in the shaping of the course of action of the central committee.

Regardless of the outcome of the Good Roads bond issue, the McCulloch County Good Roads association is to be continued as a permanent organization, and will actively support and assist in any and all future matters affecting the road development of McCulloch county. Hence, the importance to each community to have representation upon the executive board of the organization can be readily seen, and every community should co-operate to see that its interests are in every way taken care of.

LEGAL NOTICE.

ELECTION ORDER.

THE STATE OF TEXAS,
County of McCulloch.

On this the 17th day of November, 1921, the Commissioners' Court of McCulloch County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the court house at Brady, Texas, all members of the court, to-wit:

Evans J. Adkins, County Judge.

Charlie Samuelson, Commissioner of Precinct No. 1.

R. L. Burns, Commissioner of Precinct No. 2.

J. F. Priest, Commissioner of Precinct No. 3.

H. E. McBride, Commissioner of Precinct No. 4.

being present, came on to be considered the petition of Jas. T. Mann and 446 other persons, praying that bonds be issued by said McCulloch County in the sum of \$600,000.00 bearing 5 1/2% rate of interest, maturing at such times as may be fixed by the commissioners' court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty years from date thereof, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said county, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity; and

It appearing to the court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpaying voters of said McCulloch County; and

It further appearing that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said McCulloch County;

IT IS THEREFORE CONSIDERED AND ORDERED by the court that an election be held in said county, on the 20th day of December, 1921, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said county shall be issued in the amount of \$600,000.00, bearing 5 1/2% rate of interest, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the commissioners' court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty years from the date thereof; and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said county, subject to taxation, for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Articles 627 to 641, inclusive, of Chapter 2, Title 18, Revised Statutes, 1911, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 203, Acts of 1917, Regular Session.

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and of this county, and who are resident property taxpayers in this county, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"For the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

At Nine, Precinct No. 2 with D. Harkrider as Presiding Officer;

At Rochelle, Precinct No. 5 with J. P. Waddill as Presiding Officer;

At Cow Boy, Precinct No. 6 with A. A. Jordan as Presiding Officer.

At Milburn, Precinct No. 7 with Joe Long as Presiding Officer;

At Lohn, Precinct No. 8 with Wm. F. Roberts, Jr., as Presiding Officer;

At Waldrip, Precinct No. 9 with Clay Randle, as Presiding Officer;
