

The walls were shamefully cut and carved by thousands of vandals who think, no doubt, no place com- plete without their names or ini- tials are found thereon. I turn- ed in sadness from the room and made my way through the litter- ed and unkept ground to my car. I then drove around the mission yard and viewed it from all an- gles. The mission stands on a high hill overlooking the San Antonio river in a very beautiful location. Although I spent something like an hour wondering about the place I saw not a human being, nor indeed did I see any indica- tion of any keeper. There is not a monument, nor even a printed sign to indicate the sacredness of what should be with the excep- tion only of the Alamo the most sacred place in Texas, yet but for the sacrifice of those brave men here Houston's men at San Jacinto would never have fought with the blind fury that could not be withstood; and but for that furious charge it is doubtful whether Texas could ever have conquered the overwhelming forces of Santa Anna. I can not but wonder how a State as rich as Texas could so soon forget its heroes.—F. M. A tiger and two tigresses es- caped when the "Maravilla' cir- cus train was wrecked in 1913 near the Villa and they are be- lieved to have been the progeni- tors of numerous beasts of their kind that now dwell in the mountains. Bengal tigers do not exist anywhere else in America. It will be necessary, therefore, to exclude from the benefits of this law the following classes of students: 1. Scholastics who reside in the rural district but who were ommitted from the scsholastic census in March. 2. Scholastics who are of high school grade who have become residents of a rural, non-high school after district after taking of the census, unless such pupils have been enumerated wthin the county or in an adjoining district of a contiguous county and have been transferred to the district of their new residence. 3. Pupils over seventeen years of age. These pupils are not subject to transfer and are not allowed to attend school, even in their home district, without the payment of tuition. 4. Pupils enumerated in one county who desire to attend high schagl in another county, unless the high school student resides in a county line district and de- sires to be transferred to a con- tiguous school district in the ad- joining county.
