At a meeting of the business men of Spur the past week it was decided to inaugurate a "Trades Day" for the first Monday of each month, smilar to those previously held here. The July trades day, lowever, will be held on the first Tuesday, since Monday will be the 4th, a national holiday.

The people of this territory are invited to make this Trades Day a day in which to trade, traffic and swap anything from a oneeved horse to a threshing machhise, and to take part in the programs and prizes to be offered by the local merchants. -----

Purses totaling \$1,000 will be paid winners of events in the West Texas Rodoe and Race Meet staged in Abilene June 17 and 18, Gaston Brock and F. E. Modgling, sponsors, have an-Complete programs nounced. carrying lists of rules regulations and awards for all contests have been distributed to cowboys throughout Texas and New Mex-

The meet will be staged two days, with winners each day to receive prizes, and average moneys for competition both days to be awarded. Events scheduled are calf roping, bron riding, steer riding, wild cow milking, goat roping and horse races.

In the calf roping contest, four shows will be staged for a purse of \$250. Day moneys will be \$40 00 first, \$25.00second, and \$15.00 third. For the best total time on two calves, prize of \$50.00, \$30. 00 and \$15.00 are offered. Four shows will be staged in the bronc riding event, with \$2.50 mount money to be paid on all horses and \$3.50 to be paid for a qualified ride of eight seconds. The length of time has been set in the qualifying ride for the steer riding contest, prizes for which are \$2.50 qualifying ride, and \$1.50 mount money.-Post Dispatch.

By MELVIN A. TRAYLOR President First National Bank, Chicago

Sentiment in Banking

No sentiment in banking? Will you recall just one day's activity at your desk-what were the problems you considered? Did they apply solely to the cold-blooded conduct of the affairs of your bank, weighing, measuring, analyzing, valuing securities, extending credit, driving the best bargains possible, having in mind only the material return from your day's labor? Certainly such is not the case. I recall many days-happy days, too-in my experience in a very small country bank, in which I am sure not onetenth of my time was given to the real consideration of the financial return

Open Markets

I believe in an open market for the actual purchase and sale both of commodities and securities. But so long as the actual rate for credit in this country swings up and down according to the demand for funds for speeuative purposes, little influenced by central or other banking policy, then something is wrong somewhere. Moreover, if business is influenced-as is almost universally charged-by the state of public mind; and if the state of public mind is influenced, as in recent years it most certainly has been, to run the scale from extreme optimism to extreme pessimism according to the characters on a ticker tape, then something is wrong with the public mind, or the conduct of the forces back of the tape. Those responsible must provide the answer.
