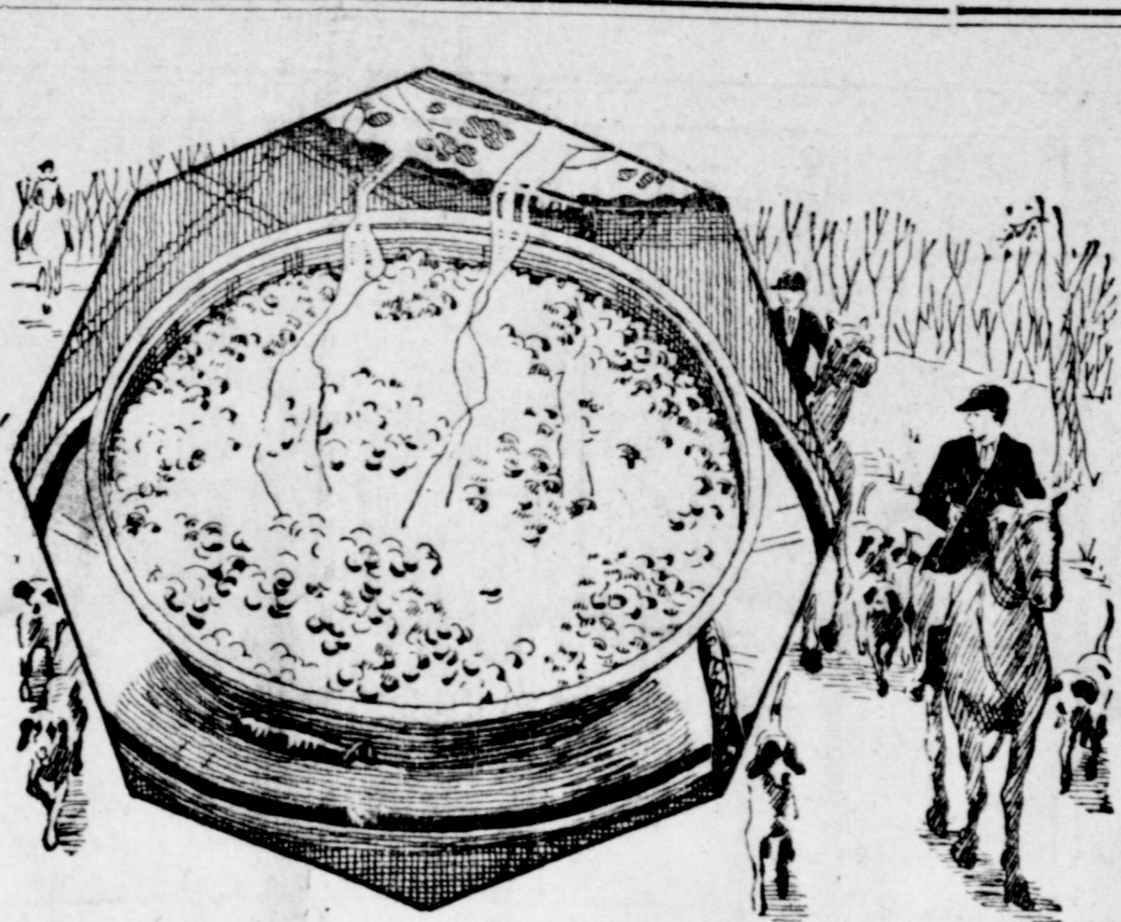

Consider Corn Puddings

COOLER weather—warmer food. These very early fall days give zest to appetite, and the housewife finds new enthusiasm in preparing nutritious dishes, which her family will acclaim. Corn is an excellent fall food because it is energy-giving and if combined with eggs in a delectable corn pudding, it is worthy of being the main dish on the dinner menu.
●If your heart is in the work, you can make a corn pudding like those they serve at a certain ancient hotel in Lexington, Kentucky, formerly a famous tavern on the old Post road. It is delicately browned on top, yellow and crumbly inside—and "right now" you know you are eating genuine Southern corn pudding.
Corn Pudding: To the contents of one No. 2 can of corn add two beaten eggs, then add one-half cup milk, one teaspoon salt and a few grains of pepper. Pour into a buttered baking dish. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake about thirty minutes in a moderate oven—350 degrees. This serves six persons.
Corn and Cheese Pudding: Combine the contents of one No. 2 can of corn, one-fourth cup chopped green pepper, two tablespoons chopped pimiento, two teaspoons chopped onion, one cup grated cheese and one teaspoon salt. Add two beaten eggs and pour into a buttered baking dish. Bake in a slow oven—325 degrees—for thirty to thirty-five minutes. This serves eight persons.*

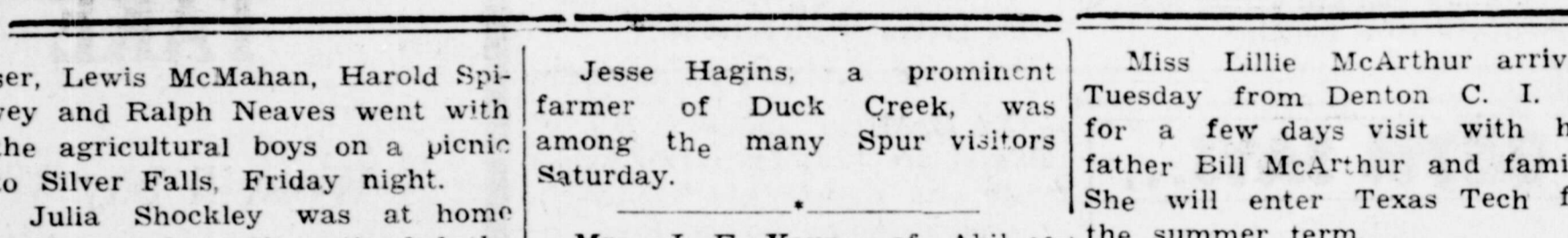

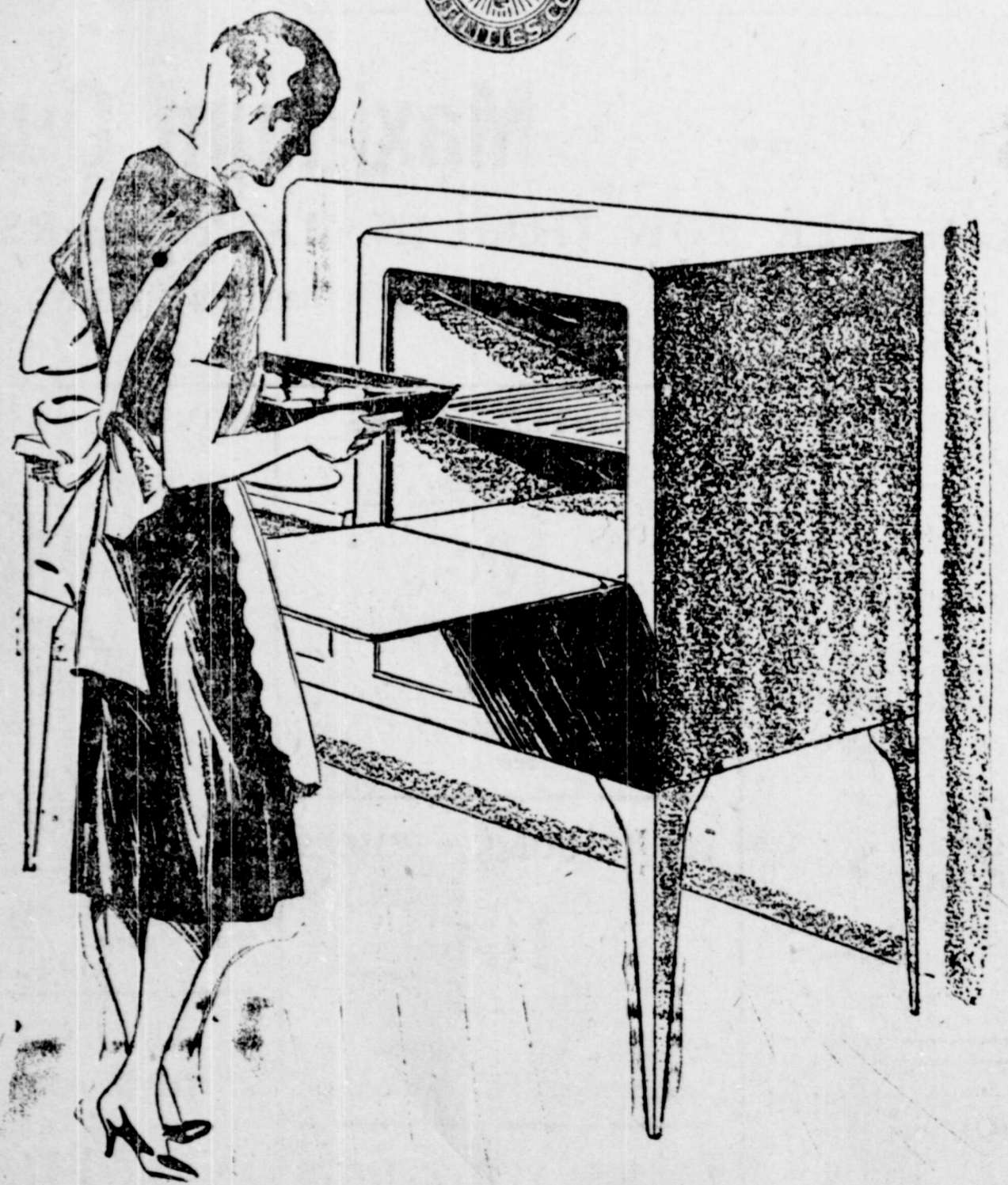
