The Red River to Gulf highway now being laid out by R. J. Potts of the A. & M. College party, is exciting statewide interest and an effort is being made by the commercial clubs in the Panhandle to run a loop from the Fort Worth branch through the Plains country.

Headlines on special edition, July 22, 1911—Texas gone dry by big majority—It is now conceded that the state has voted a majority exceeding 25,000 for state-wide prohibition—Dickens County also gives prohibition a majority—In Dickens County only one precinct was reported giving anti-prohibition a majority of 1 vote—Spur gave prohibition the largest majority, the vote being more than two to one favoring the amendment.

CHAPMAN WINS ATTORNEY RACE

RUN-OFF IN JUDGE, CONGRESS, REPRESENTATIVE RACES

Unofficial returns show that Alton E. Chapman, present County Attorney of Dickens, won in the race for District Attorney of the 110th, by a lead of some 2200 votes over his opponent, Tony B. Maxey of Floydada.

A. J. Folley and H. A. C. Brummett were placed in the runoff for District Judge with Folley leading in the four counties of the district.

In the race for representative of the 118th district, Judge Leonard Westfall of Stonewall County, and Joe A. Merritt, present representative of Scurry, will enter the second primary.

George Mahon was given a big lead over seven opponents in the race for Congress of the new 19th district carrying 16 of the 25 counties over the district. His opponent will be Judge Clark Mullican, of Lubbock. Fred C. Halle who placed fifth in the race carried Dickens County by a two to one lead over his nearest opponent.

Loyce Laverne Allen Meets Tragic Death

Loyce Laverne, 3-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. M. Allen, of Dumont, met a tragic death Monday morning when she fell from a wagon and was run over by the wheels. The little girl had accompanied her father to the field to cut some feed and while he was thus engaged the team started suddenly throwing her from the wagon and under the tires.

Loyce Laverne was born April 13, 1931 and died July 30, 1934. She is survived by her parents, four sisters and one brother and was the third child in the family.

Funeral services were held at the Dickens Baptist Church conducted by Rev. W. T. Harris and Rev. W. A. North. Interment followed in Dickens cemetery.

Felix C. Gipson, County Pioneer, Died Friday, 27

Felix C. Gipson, pioneer farmer, rancher, and druggist, for almost 35 years identified with the progressive civic activities of Dickens and Dickens county, died in a Lubbock hospital Friday, July 27, at 12:40 o'clock. His death followed an operation for appendicitis.

Mr. Gipson was born in Hunt county, Texas, on the 9th of March, 1872, where he spent the greater part of his boyhood. He came to Dickens county in 1899, after having spent about a year in Taylor county. Here, with his young wife, he farmed for about four years; later entering the drug business. For a time he was also engaged in the hardware business, and served two years as County Judge of Dickens county. Having progressed with his drug store endeavors since 1904, the pioneer Dickensite was a few years ago superseded by one of his sons, Jack, in the drug business, and since that time has spent the greater part of his time attending to his ranching interests.

A good citizen, progressive, sincere and fond of the liberal democracy of the astral clime, Mr. Gipson was respected and liked by all who knew him. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Funeral services were held at the Church of Christ at Dickens Saturday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock, a trio of ministers, John T. Smith, Lubbock; Guy Woods, Kirkland; and Albert Smith, Spur, speaking the solemnities. Interment was made in Dickens cemetery.

40 of St. Louis' Prettiest Girls Chosen From Among 500 Contestants to Model at Fall Fashion Pageant

ST. LOUIS, MO.—Dame Fashion will hold the center of the stage in St. Louis during the two weeks from August 6 to 20, when a bevy of manikins chosen from among 500 of the city's prettiest girls will present glittering previews of feminine styles for the coming fall and winter.

The fashion shows—the most elaborate ever to be staged in St. Louis in recent years—will be outstanding features of the convention of the American Retailers' Association which has more than 5,000 members in forty-one states.

Fashion pageant performances will be presented by the forty "Queens of Fashion" on the nights of August 6, 8, 10, 13 and 15, with the ornate Gold Room of the Jefferson Hotel providing an appropriate stage setting. Styles from "head to foot" will be shown by the galaxy of girls chosen by rigid tests of pulchritude and grace from among the 500 who sought the privilege of displaying the feminine ap-

parel for fall and winter. Interspersing each promenade will be an elaborate program of entertainment.

Plans are being made for the largest delegation of retail merchants ever attracted to a convention of the American Retailers' Association. Three fashion shows were the most ever held during a previous convention, and sessions of the Association heretofore have been confined to one week.

The enlarged program was decided upon by officials of the Association in view of the improvement in general business conditions and the increase in retail trade in virtually all parts of the country. The business sessions of the convention have been designed to be of maximum help to the attending retail merchants in meeting problems confronting them.

Reduced railroad rates of a fare and one-third the round trip will be in effect during the convention for merchants of thirty-four states and

the District of Columbia, and reduced fares, on the basis of 2 cents per mile each direction on round trip tickets will be in effect for the retail merchants of nearly all the remaining states.

Features of the convention program for the visiting retailers include A. R. A. nights at the St. Louis Municipal Theater on August 9 and 16, a dinner dance at the Meadowbrook Country Club on the night of August 14, and a steamboat excursion on the Mississippi River the night of August 7.

The open-air municipal theater in Forest Park is the home of the St. Louis Municipal Opera, the best known institution of its kind in the country. The productions for A. R. A. nights will be "The New Moon" on the night of August 9 and "Show Boat" on the night of August 16.

Mayor Bernard Dickmann of St. Louis joined with Association officials in urging all retailers to come

to St. Louis for the convention.

"As Mayor of St. Louis, I take sincere pleasure in inviting the people of your community to visit this city," the Mayor's letter said. "See our parks and public gardens; world famous Zoo; Art Museum; Lindbergh's trophies; our great Municipal Opera; and enjoy while you are here the convention program of the American Retailers' Association."

Officers of the American Retailers' Association for the coming year will be elected at the final session of the convention. Julius Dupont, of Helena, Louisiana, is the present president.

Vice Presidents are W. F. Beall, Jacksonville, Texas; M. H. Forester, Ottawa, Kansas; B. F. Hart, Harrisburg, Illinois; John F. Lottes, Perryville, Missouri; L. K. Sharpe, Checotah, Oklahoma, and Louis Weisberg, Longmont, Colorado. Scott R. DeKins, of St. Louis, is secretary and treasurer of the Association.

Better Breakfasts



IN the rose covered cottage over which the June bride presides, her new husband soon finds out whether he has married her for better or for worse breakfasts. What good are all the lovely wedding china and the crisp new linens if the morning finds only tomato juice and coffee on the breakfast table? One of the fundamental rules for a long and happy marriage is: "Begin every day with a substantial breakfast and make it as interesting as possible."

Here's a good menu for the June bride's book:

Tomato and Sauerkraut Cold Cereal with Cream French Toast with Fruit Cover Coffee

French Toast with Fruit Cover: Beat two eggs slightly. Add a few grains salt and half a cup milk. Dip four large thick slices of bread in this mixture, coating

thoroughly. Sauté in bacon fat or butter until a nice brown on both sides. Split four large slices canned pineapple each into two thin rings and sauté them in a little butter until golden brown on both sides. Lay a slice of toast on each breakfast plate, cover with two pineapple rings and top them with cold juicy rhubarb sauce. This serves four.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION
NUMBER 16**
Be It Resolved By The Legislature
Of The State of Texas

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 1. Taxation to be equal and uniform as to real estate and to be equal and uniform as to all reasonable classifications of property; and occupation and income taxes; exemptions; limitations upon counties, cities, etc.

"Taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform. All property in this State, whether owned by natural persons or corporations, other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as may be provided by law. The Legislature may by general laws make reasonable classifications of all property other than real property for the purpose of taxation, and may impose different rates thereon; provided that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform. The Legislature may impose a poll tax it may also impose occupation taxes, both upon natural persons and upon corporations, other than municipal, doing business in this State. It may also tax incomes of both natural persons and corporations other than municipal, except that persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits shall never be required to pay an occupation tax, provided that Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family in the State, shall be exempt from taxation, and provided further that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town for any persons or corporations pursuing any profession or business, shall not exceed one-half of the tax levied by the State for the same period of such profession or business."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of Texas shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election, all voters favoring said amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations, shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax and exemption from mechanical and agricultural pursuits; and exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family, and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property, other than real property, for the purpose of taxation; and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose poll tax and occupation tax and income tax, and exempting from mechanical and agricultural pursuits; exempting from taxation Two Hundred Fifty (\$250.00) Dollars worth of household and kitchen furniture belonging to each family, and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

Be It Resolved By The Legislature
Of The State of Texas

Section 1. That Section 16, Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 16. All land mentioned in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the University of Texas shall be subject to the taxation for county and school district purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned, provided they shall be reeded for taxation upon the values fixed by the State Tax Board and that the values fixed for school district purposes shall not exceed the values fixed for county purposes on the same land; and provided that the University of Texas from the University Available Fund, shall remit annually to each of the counties and school districts in which said lands are located an amount equal to the tax imposed upon said land for county and school district purposes."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of

the State at the next general election, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school district purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located."

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
NUMBER 41**

Be It Resolved By The Legislature
Of The State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5, of Article XI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5,000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent (2½ per cent) of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two percent (2 per cent) thereon, provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every twelve (12) months."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934; at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months;" and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months."

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
NUMBER 42**

Be It Resolved By The Legislature
of The State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 30, Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 30. The duration of all offices not fixed by this Constitution shall never exceed two (2) years, except that the elected officials of a city that has adopted and amended its Charter as provided in Section 5, Article XI of the Constitution of Texas may, by amendment to such city's charter, hold office not to exceed four (4) years; provided, that when a Railroad Commission is created by law it shall be composed of three (3) Commissioners who shall be elected by the people at a general election for State officers and their term of office shall be six (6) years; provided, Railroad Commissioners first elected after this Amendment goes into effect shall hold office as follows: One shall serve two (2) years, and one four (4) years and one six (6) years, their terms to be decided by lot immediately after they shall have qualified. And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said vacancy by appointment until the next General Election."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted

to the qualified electors of the State on the next General election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words, "For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years," and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years."
